HOOVER FIRES AT OIL CHARGE

President Sees Politics Behind Accusation.

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—President Hoover Tuesday denounced as an attempt to fasten an odious oil scandal upon his administration the charges by Ralph S. Kelley, former head of the Denver field force of the department of interior, that oil companies were obtaining illegally valuable oil shale lands from the government.

The president said that, while publication of the Kelley charges in some newspapers did not represent the high standard of American journalism, the newspapers might have been misled. He said Kelley or the newspapers publishing his stories could have determined the falsity of the charges investigation.

Mr. Hoover said that, though Kelley came to Washington last July and arranged the sale of his story to a newspaper, his charges were delayed so they could be put into the political campaign. He said the newspaper that purchased the story was of political

DR. SLAUGHT, 76, IS FOUND DEAD

Widely Known Physician Succumbs to Heart Attack.

Dr. A. W. Slaughter, 76, widely known Iowa physician, was found dead in his bed at 9 a. m. Tuesday by his daughter, Miss Marguerite Slaughter. Dr. Slaughter had been ill with influenza at his home, 2501 Thirty-ninth street, for two weeks. Members of his family attributed his death to a heart attack.

Dr. Slaughter represented Wapello county in the state legislature for three terms, beginning in 1915. He was a member of the Odd Fellows lodge for fifty years and was also affiliated with the grand lodge and the Ottumwa lodge of that organization.

Practiced in Beaverdale.

He moved to Des Moines five years ago and practiced in Beaverdale up to the time of his illness.

He was born at Hector, N. Y., and was married in 1893 to Miss Anne Matthews in Chicago. After his graduation from the Hahnemann Medical college in Chicago Dr. Slaughter practiced in that city. He moved to Estherville in 1895 and later went to Ottumwa, where he lived for twenty-five years.

Funeral Not Yet Arranged.

He is survived by his widow, a son, Hugh Slaughter of Minneapolis; two daughters, Marguerite Slaughter and Mrs. Warner Cruisberry, both of Des Moines, and three grandchildren, Elizabeth Slaughter of Minneapolis and Marganne and Charles Cruisberry of Des Moines.

Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

MRS. C. C. HOLLEY, LONG ILL, DIES

Koontz' confession, as copied from the original in the sheriff's possession, follows:

"I, Alva Koontz, make the following statement of my own free will and accord, and without threat or promise from the officers of Wapello county, Iowa:

"On October 24, 1930, I came down to Ottumwa from Hedrick, Iowa, to meet the democratic candidates at the democratic headquarters. I had a drink of alcohol that was mixed with pop. I got the drink out at Wes Reeves' filling station and I don't remember when I got the guns at Benson's. I got a shotgun and revolver some place. It was a 12-gauge double-barreled shotgun and a .22-caliber revolver. I did not realize that I had the guns until I got back to Highland Center, either the 24th or 25th day of October, 1930. I had the guns in the seat of the car with me. On the 28th day of October, 1930, I took the guns to the marshal at Hedrick, Iowa, and told him to bring them back to Ottumwa, Iowa, and give them back to the owner and that I would stand all expenses in the matter. I haven't any alibi to offer, I guess I done it although I don't remember it. I am sorry that it happened and I am off liquor for the rest of my life. I realize that this might have been a lot worse. In my condition I might have committed a greater crime."

FOERSTER IS RECAPTURED IN SEATTLE

Federick Foerster, sent to the men's reformatory at Anamosa on January 15, 1927, for a term of five years by a local district court judge for larceny, has escaped from the state institution and has been captured in Seattle, Wash., according to information received

Chicago, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Joe Aiello, gangland boss who fell before underworld machine gun "executioners" last week, went to his grave in Mt. Carmel cemetery today in an \$11,000 coffin.

Archbishop of St. Paul Formerly Bishop Here.

ST. PAUL, MINN. (AP)—The
Most Rev. Austin Dowling, arch-
bishop in charge of the Catholic
archdiocese of St. Paul, was still
gravely ill at his home here
Wednesday. The archbishop, who
is 62, has been confined to his
bed for the last two weeks.

Local Interest — Archbishop
Austin Dowling, former bishop of
Des Moines, was one of the most
widely known Catholic high
churchmen in Iowa. He was con-
secrated bishop of Des Moines
April 25, 1912, and held the epis-
copal office here until his eleva-
tion to the office of archbishop
of St. Paul in March, 1919.

The archbishop was particularly
interested in the educational pro-
gram of the Catholic church, and
led the move to purchase the old
Des Moines Baptist college cam-
pus and buildings, as well as tak-
ing the principal part in the es-
tablishment of Des Moines Cath-
olic college at Ninth street and
College avenue.

He was succeeded here by the
Rt. Rev. Thomas W. Drum, who
was consecrated bishop of Des
Moines shortly after Archbishop
Dowling took up his new residence
in St. Paul.

LESTER LEE THOMPSON was born at Ransom, Illinois, February 20, 1884, and died in Des Moines, Iowa, September 11, 1930. Burial was in Masonic Cemetery, Des Moines. He was the son of William and Martha (Rigler) Thompson. In March, 1894, he removed to Valley Junction, attended school there, was graduated from Valley Junction High School, and from the Law Department of Drake University in 1907. While a student at Drake he acted as justice of the peace of Valley Junction. On graduation and admission to the bar he began practice in Valley Junction in an office with Charles W. Lyon, but not long afterward established an office in Des Moines and practiced alone. On December 16, 1919, Governor Harding appointed him judge of the Ninth Judicial District to succeed Thomas J. Guthrie, resigned. By elections he served in that position until his death. He established a high reputation among lawyers and with the public for fairness, considerateness, ability and courage.

RICHARD PRICE was born in Freeport, Ohio, February 28, 1848, and died at the home of his son in Mount Vernon, New York, May 5, 1922. He removed with his parents to a farm in Dallas County, Iowa, in 1861, attended public school, and when a young man taught school for some time. In 1869 he entered the employ of Getchel & Sons, lumber dealers, at Dexter. Two years later he was placed in charge of that firm's business at Earlham, and four years later at Colfax. In 1878 he was transferred to Winterset and in 1879 he and Fred Strong bought the firm's business at Winterset and conducted it as Strong & Price. In 1887 he was elected senator and served in the Twenty-second and Twenty-third general assemblies.

SAMUEL B. GARTON was born in County Surrey, England, February 3, 1848, and died in Des Moines, Iowa, October 26, 1930. Burial was in Woodland Cemetery. In 1854 his parents removed with their family to Centerville, Wayne County, Indiana, and in 1856 to Polk County, Iowa. He attended rural public schools in winters during his boyhood and later took a business course in night school. In 1868 he entered the bakery business in Des Moines and followed it in connection with the restaurant business until the time of his death, or for sixty-eight years, being then the oldest active business man in the city. A part of this time he was associated with his brother, W. T. Garton. In 1914 he was elected representative and served in the Thirty-sixth General Assembly.

ARTHUR WAYLAND SLAUGHT was born at Hector, Schuyler County, New York, July 6, 1855, and died in Des Moines, Iowa, October 28, 1930. He attended rural school in the neighborhood of his birth, and was graduated from Colgate Academy, Hamilton, New York. After acting two years as assistant postmaster at Hamilton he took up the study of medicine and was graduated from Chicago Homeopathic Medical College in 1887, after which he was continuously in the prac-

tice of medicine until his death. His first practice was in Chicago. In 1896 he removed to Estherville, Iowa, and later to Ottumwa where he practiced for twenty-five years. In 1911 he was elected representative and was twice re-elected, serving in the Thirty-sixth, Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth general assemblies. In 1925 he removed to Des Moines and practiced his profession principally in Beaverdale.

LEVI B. SHANNON was born in Warren County, Iowa, March 28, 1877, and died in Des Moines November 6, 1930. Burial was in Glendale Cemetery, Des Moines. His parents were James M. and Agnes Shannon. While still in his teens he entered the ministry. For twenty-five years he served the Methodist Episcopal church as a pastor, among his locations being Simpson Church, and Jordan Memorial Church, both in Des Moines, and churches at Brooks, Adams County; Cromwell, Union County; Wiota, Cass County; and Tagley, Ringgold County, being pastor at the latter place at the time of his death. In 1928 he was elected representative from Cass County and served in the Forty-third General Assembly.

FRANK GILBERT was born at Clinton, Wisconsin, November 4, 1852, and died in Chicago, Illinois, April 15, 1922. Burial was at Monona, Clayton County, Iowa. His parents, Lovell R. and Lydia Gilbert, removed with their family to near Monona, in 1857. He was educated in rural schools and in Monona High School. During most of his active business life he was a grain and live stock dealer at Monona. He held several local positions of trust, among them being mayor of Monona, and postmaster at that place. In 1919 he was elected representative, running as a Democrat, and served in the Thirty-fourth General Assembly.

WILLIAM J. SAYERS was born in Athens County, Ohio, January 11, 1847, and died in Marengo, Iowa, October 6, 1930. His parents were Ruel and Sarah Hixon Sayers. He removed to Iowa County in 1868, and during all his active life followed farming and stock raising and dealing in the vicinity of Marengo. He was successful in business and was a man of integrity. In 1919 he was elected representative as a Democrat, and served in the Thirty-eighth General Assembly. For several years he was president of the Iowa Valley Canning Company of Marengo.

HENRY E. NICOLAUS was born in Wilton Junction February 29, 1860, and died in that town March 1, 1930. His parents were Henry Edward and Margaret Nicolaius. For many years he followed in his native town the business of a clothing merchant. He served in many public positions, was fire chief, member of the town council, president of the commercial club, was postmaster several years, and in 1899 was elected representative and served in the Twenty-eighth General Assembly. Politically he acted with the Democratic party.




