

He was a member of the Evangelical U.B. Church in Toledo, the Toledo lodge A. F. and A. M. No. 18, the Eastern Star and the Iowa Consistory in Cedar Rapids.

Also preceding him in death besides his wife was a son, Clark, who died in 1945, also his parents, three brothers and six sisters.

Harrison of Dixon, Ill. His death was attributed to cancer.


