# SEN. CHAS. OLSON DIED FOLLOWING OPERATION

## Relatives Were at His Bedside When the End Came

Former State Senator Charles Olson, fifty-five, of Beaver, passed away at the Methodist hospital in Des Moines last Saturday, July 11.

Death was caused by peritonitis which followed an operation of last Monday.

Mr. Olson entered the hospital about a month ago, preparing to go through the operation which took place Monday. After the operation the deceased seemed to improve until Friday morning when his condition changed for the worse.

His family was called to his bedside and were present when the end came. The Senator was conscious until the end and knew that his family were with him.

Mr. Olson was born in Sweden May 9, 1870. At the age of two years his father died, and his mother emigrated to the United States, settling near Boone. Mr. Olson received his early education in the public schools, and later attended Drake University. He was engaged in farming practically all his life and in recent years was vice-president of the Beaver Savings Bank.

The body was shipped to Beaver, where funeral services were held on Monday afternoon on the east lawn of the home. Rev. Gardiner of Malcomb, formerly pastor of the Methodist Church at Beaver and an old friend of the family officiated at the services.

The deceased is survived by his widow and four sons, Theodore of Boone and Douglas, Donald and Russel of Beaver.

## CHARLES OLSON ANSWERS DEATH'S GALL

### DIED SATURDAY AT HOME NEAR BEAVER

#### Was a Large Land Holder and Prominent in State Politics,—A Member of State Senate

Charles Olson was born in Sweden, May 19th, 1870. He came with his widowed mother to the United States when he was a lad of six years.

The first home was in Clinton but only for a brief time since which time Mr. Olson, living continuously in Boone County, living in Moingona, Woodward, and Boone and a short time on a farm near Ogden before establishing the present home here in Beaver.

While in Boone he served most acceptably in the office of County Recorder. Here, also, he was united in marriage to Rebacca Benson on November 12, 1900.

The wife, and mother with the four sons given to this marriage survive. The sons are Theodore, Douglas, Donald and Russell.

Mr. Olson served as a member of the State Senate, representing Boone and Story Counties, in the 39th., 40th., and 41st extra session of our state legislature.

Outside his immediate family he is survived by his brother, Oley Olson, and his sister, Christine Olson, both of Woodward.

# SEN. CHAS. OLSON DIES TODAY AT DES MOINES

BODY TO LATE HOME IN BEAVER THIS NOON.  
END CAME IN HOSPITAL IN DES MOINES

Sen. Olson's Funeral Arrangements Are Not Completed.—Is Survived By Widow and Four Sons.—Served Boone-Story.

(International News Service)  
Des Moines, Ia., July 11—Former State Senator Charles Olson, 55, of Beaver, Iowa, died at the Iowa Methodist Hospital here at 7:30 a. m. today.

Death was caused by peritonitis which followed an operation for ulcers and gallstones.

Mr. Olson was conscious to the end. Around his death bed were gathered his wife, his two sons, Theodore of Boone and Douglas, and other immediate relatives.

The body will be shipped to Beaver, his home, this afternoon.

Mr. Olson was born in Sweden, May 9, 1870. At the age of 2 years his father died, and his mother emigrated to the United States, settling near Boone. Mr. Olson received his early education in the public schools, and later attended Drake University. He was engaged in farming practically all his life and in recent years was vice-president of the Beaver Savings Bank.

Mr. Olson served in the state senate during the 39th, 40th and 40th extra sessions of the legislature.

Word received at the News-Republican office shortly after 7:30 o'clock this morning brought the sad news of the death of Ex-Sen. Charles Olson of Beaver, the end occurring at 7:30 o'clock in the Methodist hospital in Des Moines. With the senator at the time was Mrs. Olson; Ted of Boone and Douglas of Beaver. # BOONE COUNTY TAXING BODIES PREPARING BUDGET ESTIMATES FOR REQUIRED PUBLICATION

Taxing bodies of Boone county which are required to prepare and publish estimated incomes and expense statements are already giving notices of their hearing subject, the first in the county being scheduled for July 15.

The budget law which went into effect in 1924 first required all taxing bodies to prepare and publish statements of estimated income and expense, and this was done last year. At the last session of the legislature, however, the law was amended eliminating from its requirements independent rural district schools, other than consolidated schools, and ships. The law remains effective for city and town consolidated schools, county board of supervisors, school districts.

## Blanks Sent Out

Blanks on which to prepare budget estimates and to call hearings on the budget have been supplied taxing bodies by the county auditor. Some of the taxing bodies already have prepared their budgets and have given notice for the hearing. First among these were the Dana and Napier consolidated school districts and Ogden. The first hearing in the county will be July 15.

The object of the law is to give any taxpayer an opportunity to object to any item on the proposed budget of his town, school district or county. It has been suggested that objections be filed in writing and with the secretary of the taxing body which is to hear and pass on the objection.

The law requires the secretary of the taxing body to keep a record of each objection filed and what action is taken by the taxing board. He will also file with the county auditor in duplicate the tax budget and ob-

jections thereto, and a record of the meeting at which objections were heard.

## Hearing Before Director

If the objections made are ruled a hearing may be held before the state budget director.

All budgets, when prepared, must be filed with the county auditor on or before Aug. 15 as required by law. All budget-making boards must hold at least twenty days before the hearing are held on the budgets.

Notice of publication must be given not less than ten days before the date fixed for the hearing. The hearings must be held two or three days before the date of publication. The hearings may be held in any place if proper notice is given.

Few, if any, objections were filed in Boone county to any budget last year. The first year the law was in operation.

### Body Of Late **Sen. Chas. Olson** Reaches His Home At Beaver This Afternoon

Funeral services for the late Sen. Charles Olson of Beaver will be held Monday afternoon from the home just west of Beaver at 3:30 o'clock. The body left Des Moines this afternoon and is now at the beautiful farm home, where he lived for so many years, in happiness and contentment with his family. Sen. Olson died in Des Moines this morning at 7:30 o'clock at the Methodist hospital, where he went several weeks ago for treatment and later an operation. The body will lie in state up to the hour for the services and friends who desire may call at any time. The services Monday afternoon will be held on the sloping east lawn of the home, conducted by the Rev. Gardiner of Malcomb, formerly pastor of the Methodist church at Beaver. Rev. Gardiner was a close personal friend of the Olson family. The body will be buried in the Beaver cemetery.

At the service a large number of men and women prominent in Iowa public life will be in attendance. A delegation of the members of the 39th and 40th general assemblies will be present to pay a last tribute to their colleague.

The first operation of Mr. Olson was performed on Monday morning and his condition seemed to improve. After the relapse Friday when peritonitis had set in, another operation was performed, this one last night, in a desperate effort to save the fast ebbing life of the patient. It was of no avail and he gradually grew weaker until 7:30 this morning. He was conscious to the last and knew those at his bedside.






