Railroad and Exline boosters are to be the guests of the Association of Commerce at noon luncheon on Monday when good roads and a road work program for this county are to be the feature tickets. According to announcements made by Secretary Chas. H. ... of the Association today it is planned to have the Good Roads Committee take charge of the meeting. This committee is composed of Wm. # HEART TROUBLE CAUSED DEATH THIS MORNING

END WAS UNEXPECTED, COMES  
AS A SHOCK

## READY TO SERVE

Elected in November to Iowa Gen-  
eral Assembly and Was Mem-  
ber Class for Work There

Chas. Harvey Scott, representa-  
tive-elect of Appanoose county, and  
a well-known farmer and truck  
gardener, living near Clarkdale,  
died at 6:30 a. m. today following  
illness superinduced by leakage of  
the heart. Mr. Scott was taken sud-  
denly ill Wednesday. However, it  
was not thought that he was in a  
critical condition, and his death at  
6:30 a. m. today came as a shock  
to his friends and relatives.

Mr. Scott had been a character  
who attracted considerable atten-  
tion and he was known in every  
part of this county. He held vari-  
ous offices, such as member of the  
rural school board, township trustee  
and was elected representative  
from this county in 1928, 1930, 1932,  
1934 and 1936.

When elected to the office of rep-  
resentative Mr. Scott gained con-  
siderable attention in the legisla-  
ture and in the city of Des Moines  
when he refused to be anything  
other than a plain farmer. He  
poked himself as the one that he  
made no show of any kind through  
different clothing or attitude that  
would have been his custom about  
his duties in this county.

## British Coal Strike Ended

(By United Press)  
 London, Dec. 1.—The greatest industrial struggle in history, involving approximately two million and costing England three million dollars, was at an end today.

At midnight last night the emergency regulations under which the country was governed went off the coal strike was over. Earlier last night the government's wire had announced this news to the public.

The fight against reduced wages and longer working hours for the miners ended the strike. Near end of a general strike more than five million workers in other lines participated.

It was called off May 12 with the union the lower.

### All Love Lost

Mr. Scott was stricken with leakage of the heart two years ago and had at various times been seriously ill. For this reason it was not thought that his recent illness would become critical and the announcement of his death came with all of the shock of sudden death.

Mr. Scott had a keen eye for soil and had gained wide recognition because of his statement that he had raised a family of 12 on 40 acres of land, without manure, fertilizer and of any kind. He had had a great deal of success with his small farm and through intense cultivation had made it yield well. He was noted in his neighborhood for gaining large yields from his land and for having very good truck, or garden year to year about him.

### Official Career

Mr. Scott first held local offices such as school director, and township trustee and in 1888 he ran and was elected to the office of representative from his county. In 1898 and 1902 he was re-elected. In 1904 he opposed running for the office for the election to the senate and was defeated. During the recent election he received the nomination for representative again and was elected. His death leaves a vacancy that will have to be filled according to law provided in some cases. Mr. Scott was a Republican in politics.

He was a member of the Methodist church and was a man of good character and had a wide circle of friends. He leaves no brothers or sisters with the exception of one half-sister, Mrs. Alma Schiller of Clearmont.

### Funeral Notice

Funeral services for Mr. Scott will be held Monday, December 2, at 10 o'clock a. m. from the Methodist church in Mystic, conducted by Mr. Alvin E. Edwards of this city. Burial will be in the local cemetery.

payment of a debt imposed on the country in its beginning. He served as county auditor from 1875 to 1878, inclusive. He was admitted to the bar in 1881, but never entered into general practice.

He was elected representative in 1883, 1885, 1908 and 1910, serving in the Twentieth, Twenty-first, Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth General Assemblies.

About the time he left the office of county auditor he engaged in the loan business, handling money for loan companies, and built up a large, lucrative business, and became owner of some 3,000 acres of land in Iowa, and about 1,000 acres in Minnesota.

Mr. Schee was a man of intense patriotism and believed that patriotism should be taught to the youth, and he donated large sums of money for the purpose of having a flag placed on each schoolhouse in Iowa.

HON. CHARLES HARVEY SCOTT

MR SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life and service of the Hon. Charles Harvey Scott, late of Appanoose county, Iowa, beg leave to submit the following memorial:

Charles Harvey Scott was born in Walnut township, Appanoose county, Iowa, September 14, 1862, and died December 3, 1926. He received his education in the rural and grade schools, and when he was twenty-five years of age he was united in marriage with Miss Lura Campbell, who survives him. Thirty-one years ago Mr. and Mrs. Scott moved to a forty-acre farm and garden in Clarkdale and lived there until Mr. Scott's death. Fourteen children were born to this union, two preceding the father in death. The children who survive him are: B. E., of Centerville; W. C., at home; Milo, of Des Moines; Mrs. John Scott, of Centerville; Mrs. Charles Erickson of Chicago; Mrs. Emma Walter of Exline; Mrs. Mary Williams, of St. Louis, Mo.; Ruth, Estel, and Thomas, at home.

Mr. Scott first held local offices, such as school director and township trustee, and in 1916 he ran and was elected to the office of representative in his county. In 1918, 1920 and 1922 he was re-elected. In 1924 he was a candidate for the state senate but was defeated. During the recent election he announced his candidacy for representative again and was elected, but died before taking the oath of office, thus leaving the repre-

sentative, D. Fulton Rice, who was still in office, to hold over under the constitution.

Mr. Scott was a member of the Methodist church. He was a man of good character, and had a wide circle of friends. He had a broad sympathy for all people in every walk of life, which was one of the marked characteristics of Mr. Scott, and his devotion to duty, his loyalty to the interests of the people of his county, as he saw them, endeared him to the hearts of thousands of people who knew him and loved him.

No man has ever doubted his honesty or his integrity of purpose. He stood for a clean, economical administration of the affairs of the state to which he was greatly devoted. His tastes were simple, his manner of life plain, and his purposes were such as to command the respect of all who knew him.

*Therefore, Be It Resolved*, By the House of Representatives, of the Forty-second General Assembly of the state of Iowa, that the foregoing memorial be adopted in the expression of its appreciation of the life, character and public service of the Hon. Charles Harvey Scott.

*Be It Further Resolved*, That a copy of this resolution be spread upon the Journal of the House, and the Chief Clerk be directed to send an enrolled copy to the family of the deceased.

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HON. IRA JOY SWAIN

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life, character and public service of the Honorable Ira Joy Swain of Mills county, Iowa, begs leave to submit the following report:

Honorable Ira Joy Swain was born in Windsor, Dane county, Wisconsin, on the eighth day of March, 1849, and died at his home, near Malvern, Iowa, on the second day of December, 1924.

He received his early education in the public schools in and near Beaver Dam, Wisconsin, and, after completing his studies in high school, he was enrolled as a student at Wayland University from 1863 until 1867. In the late fall of 1867, he moved to Boone County, Iowa, and taught in the public schools of that county. In May, 1870, he moved to Malvern, and for some years was employed as bookkeeper and salesman. Later he engaged in the hardware and implement business in Malvern, and continued in this line until 1888, when he engaged in farming and located on the farm which he occupied at the time of his death.

On the 23d day of December, 1875, he was married to Hannah A. Summers, who survives him. To this union were born six sons.

Ira Joy Swain was for more than half a century one of the most active pioneer settlers in building up this community to its present high stand-
