Hundreds Attend Young Funeral

Last Rites for Frank C. Young Held This Afternoon

Funeral services for Frank C. Young were held at the Bloomfield Church of Christ Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The funeral address was given by Rev. George E. Purdy, of Chillicothe, Missouri, a former pastor of the local church.

Interment was made at the I. O. O. F. cemetery, where local Masons conducted the burial service of the Masonic order. The burial service was in charge of H. C. Brown, past worshipful master of Franklin Lodge, of which Mr. Young was a member for many years.

Rev. J. R. Adams, pastor of the local Church of Christ assisted in the service at the church. Rev. Adams read from the 15th chapter of First Corinthians. W. J. Steckel played appropriate piano selections while the friends of the deceased and his family, were gathering at the church. Many hundreds of people from this city and county attended, while quite a number from other cities and towns were also present.

Rev. J. R. Adams, Mrs. Della Powers, of Bloomfield, read an obituary of Mr. Young, and paid him highest tribute as a citizen and as a friend. A male quartette from Pulaski, consisting of John and Gilbert Whisler, Fred Park and Earl Davis sang appropriate selections, with Mrs. J. I. Sell, of Milton, as accompanist at the piano.

Pallbearers were Mr. Young's two nephews, Eph and Clyde Young, H. L. Sprowls, J. B. Vaughn, W. T. Creel, Ray B. Baumgarten, S. E. Rowe and John J. Ethell. Honorary pallbearers were George W. Leyda, W. T. Dunlap, J. H. Ford, B. B. Burchett, P. T. Grimes, O. D. Wray and S. F. McConnell.

Mr. Young died at his home in Bloomfield shortly before 10 o'clock Sunday evening. He had been seriously ill for several days, and had been in ill health for a number of months.

Mr. Young had a wide acquaintance in Davis county and throughout the state of Iowa. He served Davis county as its sheriff for four years, being elected first in 1897 and again in 1899. In 1918 he was elected state representative, and was re-elected to that position in 1920, and served his state as a member of the two general as-

Immediate action to include a route to the new state lake at Bunch in the state primary highway system will not be possible, it was learned when a delegation of Davis and Appanoose county officials and interested parties in Unionville and Moravia petitioned the state highway commission at Ames Tuesday on the proposition. The proposed road would run from Moravia, by way of Unionville and Bunch to the new state lake and continue to Drakesville, eventually connecting with U. S. highway No. 63, north of Bloomfield.

Supervisors A. T. Dahlgren, T. H. Welch, Supervisor-elect Arthur Wray, and County Engineer Arnold Krane represented Davis county at the session with the commissioners Tuesday. W. E. Fimmen, county attorney-elect, who was attending a convention of county attorneys in Des Moines, accompanied the local delegation to Ames for the meeting.

Although the commissioners were in sympathy with the arguments presented by the petitioners, they declared shortage of road funds would prohibit immediate action on the project. Many routes, already included in the state primary system, have not been improved due to the lack of sufficient funds to do the work, commissioners pointed out. Only 20 miles of roads have been added to the state primary highway system during the last three years.

The delegation was given assurance by the commissioners, however, that if traffic to the new state lake near Bunch warranted the road to be included in the primary system, and providing sufficient funds were on hand to improve the roads at that time, then the project would probably be completed.

After serving the next four years as sheriff of Davis county, he engaged in farming, and continued in that business more or less actively the remainder of his life. For many years he was a partner of his brother, Charles E. Young in the grocery business in Bloomfield. He was publisher and editor of the Bloomfield Democrat in 1901.

Helped Organize Bank

Mr. Young was one of the charter members of the Davis County Savings Bank, helping organize that institution. He served as a member of its board of directors for many years, was vice president for a number of years, and served as its president for about three months following the death of George W. Phillips last January.

He was a member of the Davis County Farm Bureau and took an active interest in all farm organization matters. In politics he was a democrat, and was a leader of the local Democratic party from the days of his youth until the last election. In the recent campaign he made a number of speeches throughout the county, and on the Saturday preceding the election led the parade at the big Democratic rally at Bloomfield.

Operated Stores

In addition to his farming, grocery and banking connections, he operated a jewelry store in Bloomfield for several years, purchasing the store from Mrs. Della Burgess, widow of the late John Burgess, pioneer Bloomfield jeweler, and an associate of Mr. Young in the Davis County Savings Bank.

Mr. Young served as secretary of the Davis County fair for about 10 years, and had an exceptionally successful record in handling the affairs of the fair society. The attendance of the fair reached its all-time peak during the years he was at the helm of the local society.

EPIDEMIC BRINGS EARLY VACATION

School Closes for Christmas Week Early Because of So Much Flu

Prevalence of an epidemic of influenza caused authorities to close the Milton public schools a week earlier than had been anticipated for the Christmas recess. The classes were dismissed until January 2, this Monday morning, when it was found that classes were being decimated by a steady stream of absences. Although the main illness is diagnosed as a mild influenza, the prevalence of colds has also made class gatherings inadvisable and added to school distractions.

About 25 students were out Monday, the list including three of the instructors. Supt. R. B. McComb had gone back to bed with a relapse of sickness; nearly all of Prin. John Holland's family were ill; Miss Nedra Atkins, of the grade school faculty was sick.

It was felt that the doubling up of teaching work and the frequent absences would demoralize school work, particularly so as the Christmas vacation was only a matter of a few days away.

County Road Crew Drives Ahead on Lebanon-Douds Road; Nearly Through

Despite the extremely cold weather of last week the Van Buren county road crew north of Lebanon worked on the improved road to Douds and is now in position to complete it soon. Interim Group Urges 4-Year Governor Term

Recommends That No Appropriation Be Made For Fair

Reorganization of the state government so that responsibility for all administrative departments will rest solely with the governor is recommended in the final report of the legislative committee on reduction of governmental expenditures. Specifically the committee suggested:

Twelve consolidations of state departments.

A four-year gubernatorial term. Legislative consideration of a two-year suspension of the state tax or withdrawal of appropriations.

Limitation of legal publications.

"Although we have not formulated any definite plan, the report said, we suggest in general that the state be reorganized along the line of making the governor the actual administrative head of the state government so that responsibility of shortcomings in any department or activity can be definitely placed on his shoulders.

Concludes Committee Work

The report concludes the work of the committee which began its study of taxation problems nearly two years ago. Copies of the final report, supplementing one published recently, were submitted to Governor Turner and Governor-elect Herring late Friday.

Relative to a four-year gubernatorial term, the committee observed that at present many appointed executives hold office longer than the governor. The effect is that some members of various boards and commissions appointed by one governor continue to hold office when a new executive assumes office.

As a result, the committee stated, of the two-year term of the governor, in theoretical control of these officers, he has little actual authority.

Urge Consolidation

Urging consolidation of state activities, the committee pointed out that there now are 11 supervisory or executive officials in the state government serving on various boards and commissions. The aggregate payroll of 7,120 employees in the state house, board of education, board of control and highway commission was \$11,102,000 in 1931.
