

McCLUNE IS DEAD, RESULT AUTO UPSET



James G. McClune, 69, of Keswick, former Oskaloosa resident who served Mahaska county as state representative and later was elected state auditor, died at Mahaska hospital here at 3:45 o'clock Tuesday afternoon from injuries suffered when his car overturned two miles north of Keswick at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Mr. McClune suffered a crushed chest and neck and head injuries and died an hour and a half after he had reached the local hospital. The body was taken to the Powers funeral home where it will remain until Friday morning when it will be moved to the White Oak church at Keswick for funeral services in the afternoon.

Italian Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano, Saburo Kurusu, Japanese ambassador to Germany; Marshal Wilhelm Keitel, chief of the German supreme command, and other Nazi leaders witnessed the signing.

STRONG DEFENSES SAVED ONE TOWN

BULGARIA CALLING UP HER RESERVES

Sofia, Bulgaria, Nov. 20.—Newspapers said today that the "day is not far off" when Bulgaria will play a role in the new order in Europe, and there were frequent indications that Bulgarian reserves were being called to the colors.

Reports circulated in Sofia said also that Turkey was moving increasing quantities of war materials and large numbers of men to the European part of Turkey, adjacent to Bulgaria and Greece.

250 Planes in Main Drive.

British sources estimated that more than 250 German planes participated in the main attacks on the Midlands, while others operated against London and other targets.

At Great Altitude.

Enemy war fleets raced over the London area at a great altitude about nine hours during the night and headed straight for targets in the Midlands, often escaping strengthened night fighter patrols in the capital sector although half a dozen or more German craft were shot down.

Two Cities Main Objectives.

Two midland cities were main objectives of the attacking air fleets, in all about a score of towns and villages reported bombs dropped intentionally or by chance as raiders sought to escape heavy anti-aircraft fire and defense planes.

Non-Military Targets Damaged.

British sources described the damage as largely confined to non-military targets.

Tempo Slow Over England.

The tempo of bombing was comparatively slow in London most of the night, but at the most heavily bombed points in the Midlands German craft were roaring over at a rate of one a minute for long periods and the force used by the raiders was said to equal that of the heaviest night of attack in London.

Good Roads Booster.

Swerves, Overturns.

Details of the accident are conflicting and vague. According to report at the Keokuk county sheriff's office, Mr. McClune was driving south on a narrow gravel road when he met a pickup truck near the crest of the hill. It is believed that he swerved to avoid a crash and lost control on the loose gravel. The car rolled over several times on the road and crashed into a ditch.

He was attended by Dr. C. D. Harlan of Keswick and then brought to the local hospital.

Surviving are his wife, the former Lenna Morgan, and two daughters, Mrs. Ted Reusser of Tucson, Ariz., and Mrs. Larry Schofield of Gary, Ind.

Born in Illinois.

Mr. McClune was born in Rock Island county, Ill., on May 3, 1871, and came to Iowa county, Iowa, in 1874, where he resided on a farm until 1889. He spent six months at Western Normal college at Shenandoah and three and a half years at Northern Indiana university at Valparaiso, where he graduated in law.

He was admitted to the bar in Indiana and Iowa and practiced law at What Cheer until 1897, then engaged in farming, mercantile business and banking until 1919 when he moved to Oskaloosa. He was especially active in the Oskaloosa lodge No. 58, Knights of Pythias, during his residence here and retained his membership in the lodge.

Gateway To Balkans.

The Axis powers' new ally is the gateway to the Balkans. A remnant of the old Austria-Hungary empire, ruled by a 72-year-old regent, Admiral Nicholas de Horthy, who drove the communist Bela Kun from power after the world war, Hungary has been growing for two years with German support, at the expense of her old world war enemies.

Hungary Enlarged.

In 1938, Hungary was a country of 35,875 square miles and 9,000,000 inhabitants. Then, at a Vienna conference, she was awarded 4,875 square miles and 1,000,000 population from Czechoslovakia. In August, 1940, again at Vienna, she was awarded 19,300 square miles and 2,600,000 inhabitants from Rumania, in north Transylvania.

Of Political Nature.

As an active ally of Germany, Hungary could throw open her borders and roads to German troops bound southeast for Rumania, where they already are well established, or could provide an easy route for German troops moving south to the Jugoslav border. All indications here, however, were that the alliance, as affects Hungary, was of a political nature—that Hungary merely was taking her place in the "new order" in Europe and Asia and Axis powers seek to create.

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Notes for James C. McClune

"James C. McClune of Oskaloosa, Mahaska County, Iowa owns large holdings of real estate in three Iowa counties, practices law, and raises pure-bred hogs and poultry. Born in Rock Island County, Illinois in 1871, his parents brought him to Iowa three years later. He was educated in Western Normal College at Shenandoah, and at Northern Indiana Normal School and Business Institute (now Valparaiso University, Valparaiso, Porter Co, IN). He practiced law at What Cheer, Iowa until 1897, when he removed to Oskaloosa, Iowa. [After several years practicing as a lawyer, he returned to the farm near Keswick, IA and farmed until 1918.] There are two daughters in the family. Last session was his first in the legislature." (The Davenport Democrat And Leader, "SIX ARE OUT FOR SPEAKER OF IOWA HOUSE," The AP, 3 Jan 1923).

JAMES C. MCCLUNE Representative from the Twenty-fifth District, Mahaska county, Iowa, was born May 3, 1871, in Rock Island county, Illinois. He came to Iowa county, Iowa, in 1874, where he resided on a farm until 1889. He spent six months in the Western Normal college at Shenandoah, Iowa, and three and one-half years in the Northern Indiana University at Valparaiso, Indiana, where he graduated in law. He was admitted to the bar in Indiana and Iowa in 1893. He practiced law at What Cheer, Iowa, until 1897, where he was elected and served as city attorney. He engaged in farming, mercantile business and banking until 1919, when he took up his residence at Oskaloosa, Mahaska county, Iowa, where he is engaged in breeding pure bred hogs and poultry. He was elected state representative in 1920. He was married to Lenna Morgan in Keokuk county, Iowa, on September 8, 1898, to which union were born two daughters, aged 11 and 15 years. He owns real estate in Mahaska, Poweshiek and Iowa counties, Iowa. He is a member of the Knights of Pythias and Masonic orders and the Oskaloosa Rotary club.

During the years they lived in Oskaloosa, he represented the 25th District, Mahaska County, in the Iowa State Legislature, 39th General Assembly, from 1/10/1921 to 1/7/1923, and also was elected as Iowa State Auditor on 4 Nov 1924, serving in that office from 1925 to 1927. He was a Republican.

James was killed in an automobile accident just north of Keswick, Iowa.
