state legislator, veterans organ-



and received his bachelor's de-
gree from Drake University.

Five Civil War diaries of
onetime Muscatine button man-
facturer were presented to the
State Historical Department
Des Moines Tuesday.

The diaries were kept by P-
vate Garrett W. Schreurs, who
served in the 7th Iowa Volt-
teers from July of 1861 un-
til late in 1864. He was wound-
ed twice at the battle of Bel-
mont in Missouri early in the war.
He also fought at Fort Don-
elson, Shiloh and Corinth.

family stopped in Des Moines

He received his law degree from the University of Chicago and took special legal training at the University of London. Diltz was admitted to the practice of law in 1916.

He enlisted in the infantry during World War I and received a first lieutenant's commission. He served in the Flanders, Argonne and St. Mihiel offensives.

After his release from the military service, he returned to Des Moines and began practicing law in 1919.

Diltz, a Republican, was the Polk County representative in the Iowa Legislature from 1923 to 1926.

He married the former Marguerite Lambert, of Nutley, N. J., in 1921. Mrs. Diltz survives him, as does a half-brother, Lt. Commander Albert Ellis, of the Barbados Islands.

Diltz was the first commander of the Argonne Post of the American Legion and was a member of the Legion's National Executive Committee and state legislative chairman.

Diltz was the attorney for residents of Bloomfield Township during their battle against annexation into Des Moines during the 1950's.

Diltz was named by Gov. Dan Turner as a legislative member of a committee investigating operations of the Marshalltown Soldiers Home.

Always interested in horses, Diltz raised a Shetland pony which sold for a national record price of \$25,000 in 1956. Two weeks ago he traveled to Indiana to buy ponies.

GRIMES VOTES TO SELL PLAN

Residents of Grimes voted Tuesday to sell the city's electrical-generating plant and distribution system to Iowa Power and Light Co.

They also voted to award a 25-year franchise to Iowa Power to service Grimes.

Vote for sale of the plant and distribution system was 206 yes and 135 no. Vote for the franchise was 199 yes and 133 no. A simple majority required to carry both issues.

Grimes has been using a generating plant only in emergency agencies. It has been purchasing electricity wholesale from Iowa Power and retailing it to customers.

Under the contract approved by voters, Iowa Power will supply the entire municipal system including generating equipment, power lines, transformers and meters—for \$190,000.
