ar in Johnson told Miss Kitt the lack 1967 Social Security Act provided millions of dollars for day care centers to help working parents. Johnson suggested, "You all tell me what you think" about the problem, as he left.

Miss Kitt said mothers don't want to raise sons to see them sent off to Vietnam. She said "the boys of this country are doing everything they can to avoid being drafted and the mothers are helping them do it."

She said youths have the attitude that they must "enjoy life as best I can because I may not be here tomorrow." If they go to school and get a diploma they may not have a job, she said, and "boys I know across the nation feel it does not pay to be a good guy today."

"If you're a bad guy you get thrown in jail, get arrested, and the government takes care of you," Miss Kitt said.

"They don't get sent to Vietnam to get shot. It pays to be a bad guy."

She wound up her speech, directed largely at Mrs. Johnson, by saying that people who don't want the war can't come and talk to the President, or "to arrest you."

The wife of New Jersey's governor, Mrs. Richard Hughes, replied that she felt "morally obligated" to speak out, that she had

Past Judge of District Court Dies

Ralph Pritchard

Also Presided

in Municipal Court

Judge Ralph C. Prichard, 73, Parkview Apartments, 104 24th St., former judge of the District

and Municipal Courts here, died Thursday evening at a hospital.

Judge Prichard was a District Court judge from 1941 to 1958 and a Municipal Court judge from 1932 to 1934. He also served as Woodbury County attorney from 1930 to 1932, and as assistant county attorney from 1927 to 1930.

He was a member of the Iowa House of Representatives from 1924 to 1927.

Judge Prichard was born March 17, 1894, at Ticonic, Iowa. He came to Sioux City from Hornick in October, 1921, as a young lawyer after receiving his law degree at the University of Chicago Law School. He received his A.B. degree from Morningside College in 1915.

He was in the military service during World War I, from 1917 to 1919.

He was a member of the Methodist Church, Landmark Lodge 103, AF&AM, Sioux City Consistory and AbuBekr Shrine

Other indicators that tend to show North Vietnam does not really want peace talks, the U. S. officials said, include:

—The North Vietnamese have made quite a public show of their new line that they will enter into discussions if the United States stops bombing the North. Previously Hanoi had said only that a bombing halt "could" lead to negotiations.

Washington strategists believe that if the Hanoi regime is in earnest about a diplomatic move, it operates through private contacts without publicity.

—Hanoi has publicly rejected the notion that it should reciprocate with a military scaledown if the United States stops the air attacks.

—The Communists have promoted the idea in the past, among their forces in South Vietnam, that at some point fighting and negotiations will be carried on simultaneously as part of the Red format for eventual victory.

Washington officials will be scanning newly captured Viet Cong documents to see if they contain an upswing in the fight-and-talk theme.

On the plus side showing possible sincerity by North Vietnam, administration authorities note Hanoi's repeated efforts to make plain its change of position on the peace talks question.

Also, the Communists have indicated they would be ready to start discussions in a few days following a bombing halt.

In the view of U. S. authorities, however, many still-unanswered questions have to be cleared up before negotiations could be entered into.

The officials made plain that the United States does not intend to call off the bombing just to get talks started.

Union, Yards Officials Set Meet Today

A meeting between officials
of the Sioux City Stock Yards
and the Stockhandlers Local
176, UPWA, has been scheduled
for 12 noon today in an effort
to resolve an apparent jurisdic-
tional dispute which caused 94
union workers to leave their
jobs Thursday.

L. Van Kuhl, general manager
of the Stock Yards, said union
members would work today and
business would be carried on as
usual.

The afternoon shift did report
at the usual time, 4 o'clock,
Thursday afternoon although
scale foremen were reported to
have arrived from an hour and
a half to two hours later than
usual.

Ninety-four day-shift union
workers left their jobs at 12:30
o'clock Thursday. Livestock was
handled by Stock Yards super-
visory personnel throughout the
afternoon.

It was learned from market
sources that the dispute in-
volved practices at commission
firm's hog alleys. It was report-
ed that the alleys were covered
deeply with manure Thursday
and that persons other than
union workers loaded the ma-
nure onto a cart for removal.

A union source alleged this
was a contract violation.

The last strike at the yards
lasted nearly a month, but that
resulted from a breakdown of
contract negotiations.

On March 22, 1965, 156 mem-
bers of UPWA left their jobs in
a dispute over a pension plan.
St. Paul Union Stockyards Co.
(South St. Paul), Union Stock
Yards (West Fargo, N.D.) and
Sioux City Stock Yards Co. were
involved in that strike.

The strikers returned to their
jobs on April 18 that year after
a contract agreement was
reached.

Ex-Judge Dies In Sioux City

SIOUX CITY, IA. (AP) —
Former District Court Judge
Ralph C. Prichard, 73, of Sioux
City died Thursday night at a
hospital here.

He served two terms in the
Iowa House of Representatives
(1925-28), as a Sioux City Muni-
cipal Court judge and as Wood-
bury County attorney before his
District Court career from 1941
to 1958.

Two brothers survive.
