R. B. Eckles Dies At His Aplington Home

Throughout Butler county there is sadness, caused by the sudden and unexpected death of our prominent citizen, friend and neighbor, Raymond Bruce Eckles. Stricken Saturday at 4:00 p. m., he lived but a few hours, passing away at 3:00 a. m. Sunday. He was about and in usual health till the fatal stroke came upon him.

Mr. Eckles was three times elected to represent Butler county in the state legislature and was a candidate for senator last year. He was a citizen of the highest type and enjoyed the esteem of all who knew him. He served 20 years as a member of the school board at Aplington, was vice president of the county farm bureau and secretary of the farmers elevator at the time of his death.

He was born in Marshall county August 6, 1876, thus being but 56 years, 5 months and 2 days old. He was educated in the rural schools and graduated at Iowa State College in 1896. He taught for a time and in 1899 was married to Ena M. Burnham at Aplington. The widow, two sons and one daughter survive him. The children are Lester of Grand Rapids, Mich., Gordon and Dotha of Aplington.

Funeral services were held yesterday at the Presbyterian church at Aplington, the church of which he was an elder and superintendent of the Sunday school for many years.

Changed Money Value 1872 Holds Prices Down

Although the Federal Reserve System has carried the ordinary methods of credit control to extremes never heard of before, the effect in raising the general price level has been nil.

The reason is that the forces of deflation are too powerful and widespread for the ordinary methods of bank credit inflation to take effect and not that the control measures are faulty.

The fifth circular on the agricultural emergency in Iowa published by the Agricultural Economics Department at Iowa State College sums up the credit policies of the Federal Reserve System during the depression in the foregoing words. The circular "Control of the General Price Level," is written by Geoffrey Shepard and Wallace Wright. Professor Shepard also gave a radio talk on that subject Tuesday, January 10, over WOI, the college station. A subsequent publication will deal with other proposals for inflation.

The unstable value of money is one of the gravest weaknesses of our economic system, the circular says. When the value of money (in terms of commodities) increases, as during the present period, our whole economic machinery is thrown out of line. The producer of raw materials is the heaviest sufferer, because he cannot reduce his production to meet the reduction in demand. Also, his costs of distribution do not decline as rapidly as other prices.

Since the value of money is subject to changes in supply and demand, the same as any other commodity, it would seem that regulation of the supply of money would go a long way toward preventing the violent fluctuation in prices which disorganize business. And under ordinary conditions this is in large measure true, the circular says. The Federal Reserve System with 12 banks located throughout the country is the agency which is best able to control credit in the United States.

Jacob Wolff was born the son of Gerrelt Saathoff Wolff and Swanjte (Dieken) Wolff in Grundy County on June 26, 1884. His parents had immigrated to America from Germany in March 1883, settling in Grundy County. Dena Frey was born in the Ackley area on October 3, 1891, to Heinrich "Henry" Frey and Alije (Lukes) Frey. Her parents also immigrated to America from Germany.

Jake and Dena were married in the home of her brother, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Frey, on February 24, 1916. They started farming south of Aplington next to the Butler/Grundy County line just across the road from where Jake had been living in Grundy County. There they farmed their 160 acres until they retired to Aplington at 1103 Howard Street in June 1946.

R. B. ECKLES, STATE REPRESENTATIVE

Raymond Bruce Eckles of Aplington was elected by the people of Butler County to the Iowa State House of Representatives in 1924. He served in 1925, 1927, and 1929 during the 41st, 42nd, 42nd extra, and 43rd sessions. They were held in January, February, and March. (A special session was held in 1927.) He was usually able to return to Aplington before spring fieldwork started on his farm west of town.

He was chair of the Claims Committee. He also served on the following committees: Motor Vehicle and Transportation; Fish and Game; Dairy and Food; County and Township Organization; Public Utilities; and Public Health and Appropria-

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ella Dena Wolff. Jacob died May 7, 1966, at the age of 82 at his home in Aplington. Dena died February 15, 1983, at the age of 96.

RAYMOND BRUCE AND ENA ECKLES

Raymond Bruce Eckles was born August 6, 1876, in Marshall County. He was the son of Robert and Susan Eckles. Raymond was an 1896 graduate of Iowa State College. He was a professor of agriculture and dairy at the National Farm School for Boys in Doylestown, Pennsylvania, for two years.

Ena (Burnham) Eckles was born April 20, 1878, in rural Aplington. She was the daughter of Julius J. and Mary Burnham. She was one of the first women to graduate from Iowa State College in 1898. On June 20, 1900, she married Raymond Eckles at her parents' farm one mile west of Aplington.

Raymond and Ena had three children. Lester was born in 1902 and married Dora Shaw in 1924. He was a graduate of Iowa State College in electrical engineering. Gordon Bruce was born in 1907 and married Dorothy Allen in 1931. He was a graduate of Iowa State University in animal husbandry. Dotha

was born in 1911 and married George Willis in 1935. She was a graduate of Iowa State College in home economics.

Raymond Eckles moved to Aplington in 1901 and farmed until his death in 1933. He was a member of the Aplington School Board for over 20 years, serving as board president at the time of his death. Elected to the House of Representatives in 1924 by the people of Butler County, he served during the 41st, 42nd, 42nd extra and 43rd sessions. At the time of his death, he was secretary of the Farmers Elevator, vice president of the Butler County Farm Bureau, superintendent of the Presbyterian Sunday School, and a member of the Church Session. He also served as a justice of the peace.

Ena Eckles was a descendant of early pioneer families in Aplington. She was a lifelong member of the Presbyterian Church that her grandparents (G. B. and Eliza Smith) had been instrumental in organizing in 1869. Mrs. Eckles was a longtime Sunday School teacher. She died in 1956.

Mary (Mrs. Leland) Meyer, Jim Willis and Paul Willis are three of their grandchildren who still live in rural Aplington.
