



**G. E. Maxfield
Former State
Legislator, Dies**

**Prominent Minerva
Township Farmer Suc-
cumbs After Long Illness**

G. E. Maxfield, prominent Minerva township farmer and former state legislator, died at 7:52 Monday morning at the Deaconess hospital where he had been a patient since last Oct. 28. He had been in failing health for some time and death was due to heart disease.

Mr. Maxfield represented Marshall county in the lower house of the state legislature in 1925-27 and also served in the extra session of 1928. Educated for the Methodist ministry, he gave up that career in 1905 to farm and had operated a farm in Minerva township since that time.

BORN IN ILLINOIS.
Glenmore Edward Maxfield was born Dec. 22, 1878, at Sycamore, Ill., a son of Fred C. and Minnie Cook Maxfield. In 1899 he came to Iowa as a student pastor at Minerva while attending Western college, later known as Leander Clark college, at Toledo. He was graduated from that school in 1905.

On Dec. 20, 1905 he married Grace Elliott at the farm home a mile and a half south of Minerva which became his home for the rest of his life. After the death of Mrs. Maxfield's father, Dec. 29, 1905, he gave up the ministry to operate the farm.

Altho farming remained his life work, he retained an active interest in the church and served as conference evangelist for the Upper Iowa conference of the Methodist church for a number of years. He was ordained a deacon in the Marshalltown Methodist church in 1902 and was ordained an elder at Cedar Falls in 1907.

AFFILIATIONS.

Mr. Maxfield was a member of the Minerva Methodist church and of the board of trustees of that church and served for many years as Sunday school superintendent of his home church and teacher of the adult bible class. He was a member of I. O. O. F. lodge No. 527 and Rel Rebekah lodge No. 294 at Clemons, a member of the Marshall County Farm Bureau, a director of the Iowa Valley Mutual Insurance association and secretary of the Marietta Cemetery association.

Surviving are Mrs. Maxfield; two brothers and two sisters, Dr. Fred M. Maxfield of Gilman, Gilbert A. Maxfield of Alhjon, Mrs. Raymond Cotta of Rockford, Ill., and Mrs. Ralph Talbot of Hilton, N. Y., and his stepmother, Mrs. Fred G. Maxfield of Rockford, Ill. His father, mother, one sister and one brother preceded him in death.

The body is at the Estel funeral home pending completion of arrangements for the services.

**25 Years Ago
In Marshall County**

(From Times-Republican Files.)
FRIDAY, DEC. 21, 1917.

"High school girls of the physical education department under the direction of Miss Ruth Foskette, have undertaken the 'adoption' of a French war orphan. The total amount necessary for the support of a French child from Jan. 1, 1918, to Jan. 1, 1919, is \$36.50, or 10 cents a day. The money is being contributed by the girls and in many cases represents real sacrifice. In addition to the money the girls plan to send a box of clothing each month. The garments will be made largely by the pupils themselves."

"Dr. H. W. Householder has traded on a contract his residence property at the corner of Fifth and Park streets to Clarence D. Smith, of Grinnell, a son-in-law of A. B. Shine of near Liscomb. Householder also traded a house and two lots at 1920 Jackson street on the deal for an 80-acre farm two miles north of the city in Taylor township. The farm figures in the deal at a price of \$250 an acre with the Householder properties at \$7,000, and with the Fifth street property at \$5,500."

"Actual results from the campaign in the city for 1918 members of the Red Cross as nearly complete as it was possible to obtain them, indicated that up to Thursday evening about 1,000 members had joined since the campaign opened Tuesday. At the membership headquarters of C. H. E. Boardman where two young women have been kept busy taking subscriptions and handling supplies, no effort was made to keep a record of membership. At the Iowa Savings bank a total of \$1,097 had been deposited for membership."

"The jury commission, which last month prepared the jury list for 1918, this morning drew the first panel to serve at the January term and the first to be drawn under a commission. J. B. Classen, Elias Bueghley and J. L. Wylie drew the panel in the presence of the clerk of courts and County Auditor W. E. McLeland."

**Each Worker Important
To Dressings Program**

Altho only three volunteers attended the Monday morning session at the Red Cross surgical dressings room at the "Y", in less than two hours they made 150 dressings, according to Mrs. H. G. Cartwright, chairman.

"Each worker means a great deal to the ultimate success of the program," the chairman pointed out in urging workers to help whenever it is possible for them to do so.

Attendance at the rooms Friday was unusually low with no one working in the morning, only seven in the afternoon and 25 in the evening.

**Volunteers To Be
Compensated If
Injured 'On Duty'**

Compensation for injuries received in the line of duty will be given to Marshall county residents who have volunteered for defense (protection) work in the local branch of that organization, the Marshall County Defense council announced Monday.

The order went into effect at the instigation of President Roosevelt and the money for such distribution was allocated out of the government appropriation entitled "Emergency fund for the President."

In total, the amount adds up to \$5,000,000 and is provided for "temporary aid necessitated by enemy action or otherwise, in line of duty, to civilians."

Aid to casualties may include money payments and medical or other services necessary for the protection of health, safety and welfare, the council stated. At present the national office of civilian defense is consulting with the federal social security agency in the preparation of instructions and procedures for making payments out of the fund.

Claims for injury compensation must be filed with the local office within a specified time limit, the council announced.
