SUDDEN DEATH OF HON. D. H. MILLER

REPRESENTATIVE EXPIRES IN A HOTEL ROOM

Acute Attack of Indigestion Brings on Fatal Stroke for Prominent Adel Citizen

Hon. D. H. Miller, Dallas county's representative in the state legislature, died suddenly at his room in the Hotel Savery in Des Moines last Thursday night, January 20th. The end came while he was talking to his wife, who had been notified during the day that he was not feeling well. An attack of acute indigestion had apparently brought on a stroke of apoplexy.

Not in years have the people of Adel and Dallas county been so shocked and grieved as they were at the announcement of Mr. Miller's sudden death. He was apparently in the best of health and during the day had taken part in the work at the state house, one of his last acts being to direct a party of Waukee school children through the Capitol building.

Mrs. Miller talked with her husband during the day and in the evening went to Des Moines. He told her of the indigestion, but apparently thought little of it and was recounting the events of the day when he suddenly gasped and expired before a physician could reach the room.

The body was brought to Adel Thursday morning and the Miller home on West Main street was converted from a place of happiness and contentment into one of deep sorrow. Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Barrett, the latter a daughter, and his son, Robert Miller, arrived from Kansas City Thursday evening. To them and to the wife, hundreds of friends offered earnest sympathy and comfort and there was not a resident in Adel who did not feel he had lost a friend.

An adjournment of the House was taken Thursday and the sessions were not resumed until after the funeral services which were held here at the Christian church Sunday afternoon. The big crowd of people and the beautiful flowers which covered the casket and rostrum attested the popularity and esteem in which he was held.

The services were in charge of Rev. C. N. Bigelow, who spoke feelingly of Mr. Miller's life and activities. Two solos were given by Mrs. Lila Hamm-Couch. The active pall bearers were E. W. David Hardman Miller, son of Marston W. Miller and Elizabeth Wills, is the last of a family of thirteen children to pass from this life. He was born October 19th, 1865, at Des Moines Iowa, and in that city he spent the first seven years.

At the age of seven he moved to Adair county and spent the balance of his boyhood days in Adair and Guthrie counties. Mr. Miller was a graduate of the Menlo High School, and upon completing that course spent five years teaching and saving money to enter college. HARRY RICKERSON

Harry V. Rickerson, a native of Adel, was born January 9, 1867.

His father was Chauncey G. D. Rickerson, born in Indiana.

Harry had two brothers Glenn C. and Guy H. Rickerson. In January 1893, when he was twenty six years old, he began business on his own account as a dealer in clothing, men's furnishings, boots and shoes.

He was a member of the Iowa retail Merchants association.

On February 23, 1893, he was married to Miss Mary E. Jolley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Jolley.

LON B. SMITH

Lon B. Smith, son of Joseph and Melinda Smith was born March 10, 1863, in Williamsburg, Pennsylvania. He came to Adel in 1883 and entered the business circles here as a salesman in the grocery store of J. W. Bly, with whom he remained for eight years. In partnership with his brother-in-law he purchased Mr. Bly's interest and in four years the business was conducted under the name of Smith and Kain. Then in 1900 he became the sole owner. He built the brick block where Iowa Power and Gambles stores are now located.


Mr. Smith's wife was Emma Farlow, daughter of I. J. Farlow. They had two sons, Byron and Lowell who spent most of their lives in the west but were well known in Adel.

FAMILY OF ATTORNEY DAVID H. MILLER

In the year 1895 David Hardman Miller, a young attorney and graduate of one of Drake University's first law school classes, came to Adel to set up a law practice.

Mr. Miller had an interesting family background. In 1690 his great-great-grandfather, Solomon Miller and wife came from Germany and settled in Pennsylvania. They were of the Brethren Church. Their children and grandchildren migrated to Ohio, then Indiana. Their son Elder David Miller aided in organizing the county government and the first German Baptist Church in Joseph County Indiana. This church was later known as the "Dunkers."

Among their thirteen children was Martin Wise Miller. He lived in Indiana on a farm until "The Great Gold Excitement" of 1850 when he left for the gold fields of California. His story of that trip is a fascinating one. In it he tells of camping near the State Capitol at Iowa City for two weeks, then passing through "Ft. Demoin" where

they paid one dollar per bushel for corn. He wrote "Leaving Demoin we traveled up the old Stage Route through where Adel is now located, thence up the Coon Bottom to Redfield. In those days it was called Irish Town." After many trials and tribulations the company did reach California, but they did not strike it rich, so he returned to his home in Indiana. In 1865 he emigrated to Polk County, Iowa, where he farmed. Among his 13 children was David H. Miller. Another of the children was Susan Miller who married Joseph Ulery. They were grandparents of Hazel Ulery Lewellyn of Waukee.

The family then moved to Guthrie County where Dave attended the Public Schools. He lived in Menlo when he registered at Drake University in 1888. He taught country school while earning money to attend law school and was graduated in June 1895. He started his law practice in Adel soon after.

In 1897 he married Laura Simcoke, a teacher in the Redfield schools. The story is told that Miss Simcoke was engaged to marry a Redfield man and was going to Des Moines on the Milwaukee train to buy her trousseau. Mr. Miller got on the train at Adel and sat beside her. As a

result her trousseau was used for her wedding to him instead of the man in Redfield.

From there on Laura worked with him in his law office as his stenographer. She was one of the charter members of the Adel Women's Club. Dave was an active member of the Hobby Club and other organizations in town. He served as Dallas County Attorney at one period of his career.

Dave and Laura had two children, Beatrice and Robert. Both were born while they lived in a little house south of the Milwaukee Railway Station. In 1908 they built a new home on Main Street. The Methodist Parsonage had been across the street from them in their old home and within a year was moved to the property east of them on Main

Street. However the family attended the Presbyterian Church till its demise, then they went to the Methodist Church. In his later years, Mr. Miller became a member of the Christian Science Church in Des Moines.

Laura could not enjoy their new home very long. She became ill with cancer and after a long illness died in June 1910. She left two motherless children, Beatrice aged 10 and Robert aged 6. Mr. Miller gave up many of his activities and devoted his spare time to being both Mother

and Father to the children, along with the help of their long time housekeeper Mrs. Flora Edwards.

Both children attended and were graduated from Adel High School. Beatrice attended Grinnell College and was graduated from the University of California in 1921. The following year she was Engineering Librarian at Iowa State College. In October 1922 she married Mr. Wayne Barrett, a returned World War I navy veteran and a graduate of Iowa State College. Mr. Barrett worked for the Straight family at the Adel Clay Products Company as a Ceramic Engineer. When that firm was purchased by the United Clay Products Company of Kansas City they moved there. Robert Miller joined them there in 1925 working for the same company.

In June 1926 Mr. D. H. Miller married Dr. Laura Cousins. The following November he was elected a Representative from Dallas County to the Iowa State Legislature. He had just begun his first term and had been placed on several important committees when he died very suddenly of a heart attack in his hotel room at the Hotel Savery on January 20, 1927.

The following June "Bob" married Mary Akes, a teacher in the Redfield Schools. The marriage took place in the Barrett home in Kansas City. Soon they returned to Adel where he was active in many civic organizations, but died January 9, 1953, also of a heart attack. His wife, Mary Miller, taught in the Adel Schools for a number of years until her retirement two years ago.

Beatrice and Wayne Barrett moved from Kansas City to Galesburg, Illinois, then to Cleveland, Ohio. They returned to Des Moines, Iowa, in 1944 and have lived in West Des Moines since 1948. Until his retirement Wayne was with the Goodwin Companies in charge of new plant development.

The Barretts have three sons: Wayne E. Barrett, Jr., a chemical engineer and computer expert with Dow Corning Co. in Midland, Michigan. He and his wife Barbara have four daughters, two of whom are now married. David Miller Barrett, a Mechanical engineer is with

General Electric Co. in Milwaukee, Wisconsin in the X-ray design division. He and his wife, Agnes, have three children, one now married. Dr. Roger L. Barrett practiced with Dr. Allan Felter in Van Meter for a year. He has been a pediatrician with the Memorial Clinic in Olympia, Washington, for twelve years. He and his wife, Norma, have six children.

All three of the Barrett sons served for Uncle Sam, the two older ones in the Navy during World War II and Roger in the Air Force at Castle Air Base in California. So the saga of the Miller family moves along, with new generations carrying on the family traditions.

THE JOHN COOK FAMILY

John Cook was born in Botelourt County, Virginia, on December 29, 1827. He moved with his parents, Joseph

and Elizabeth Cook, to Hancock County, Indiana when he was four years old. The following year his parents, with him moved to Montgomery County, Indiana. He was married to Elizabeth Thomason on July 5, 1849. In 1856 they united with the Christian Church. They moved to Dallas County, May 3, 1864, locating S. E. of Adel about 5 miles on what was known as their home farm where they lived over 30 years. The brick house built by Mr. Cook is still standing. There were fourteen children in the family.

William Lewis born July 14, 1850; Mary Evaline (Phillips) born November 27, 1851; Harriet Lucinda (Crow) born December 11, 1853; George Washington born September 26, 1855; John Wesley born January 25, 1858; Melissa Jane (Snyder) born Dec. 13, 1859; Joseph Edgar born September 23, 1861, and Sarah Caroline (Jasper Jolley) born Sept. 20, 1863.

The above were all born in Indiana and the following were born in Dallas County, Iowa: Charles C. born January 8, 1865; Ida May born January 5, 1867; Samuel M. born December 7, 1868; Alphonso F. born November 26, 1870; Ralph R. born April 29, 1872 and Mabel Clare born December 29, 1873.

this home, three of whom are now deceased, Agnes, Blanche and Anna Grace. Surviving the father are three daughters, Mrs. L. H. Gunderman and Mrs. Victor Pasera, both of New Orleans; Mrs. William Horton of Bayard, and four sons, Edward S., William P., and Charles P., all of Bayard, and Robert Emmett of Yale, South Dakota.

He was a very successful farmer, at one time operating twenty-five hundred acres of land. Although always a very busy man, he was very active in public life. He served two terms as sheriff of Guthrie county, two terms in the Iowa legislature (1880 and 1896), was a member of the Iowa State Fair Board for fifteen years, and commander of the G. A. R. of Iowa for one term. He also served as mayor of Bayard.

One of the greatest delights in Mr. McDonald's life was his membership in the local Masonic lodge.

Following his retirement from active farming he engaged in the grain business, and also banking. He organized the Bayard Savings Bank and for many years was its president. Mr. McDonald was always looked upon as a leader in all public meetings. He was always on the square with everyone, and his word, once given, was most sacred. He was always ready to help any worthy person in time of need, and many young and middle aged people of the community secured their start in life only through his aid and assistance. He did not wait to be asked, but volunteered help to many a poor boy.

Following his marriage to Mrs. Jennie Jewett in 1912, he resided a short time at Biloxi, Mississippi. He later made his home with his daughter, Mrs. May Gunderman, in New Orleans. His last wish that he be laid to rest in Chalmette National Cemetery was complied with on June 14, 1926. The burial service was conducted by his beloved Masonic order.

Hon. David Hardman Miller, who represented Dallas county in the Forty-second General Assembly, was born October 19, 1865, at Des Moines, Iowa. At the age of seven years he moved to Adair county. He was a graduate of the Menlo high school. He spent five years teaching school to obtain money for a college education.

In 1891 he entered the law department of Drake University and graduated in 1894. He commenced the practice of law at Adel, Iowa. In 1903 he was elected county attorney and served three terms in that office.

On June 3, 1897, he was united in marriage to Laura Simcoke, and to them were born two children. The wife passed away June 8, 1910. He was later married to Laura E. Cousins, July 18, 1926, who survives him.

He was elected State Representative on the Republican ticket November 3, 1926, and was serving in that capacity at the time of his death, which occurred at the Savery Hotel in Des Moines, Iowa, January 20, 1927.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Forty-third General Assembly, That in the passing of the Hon. David Hardman Miller, the state has lost an honored and valuable citizen, a man of high ideals in Christian living and useful citizenship.

HON. HORATIO PITCHER

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life and service of the Honorable Horatio Pitcher, late of Cherokee county, beg leave to submit the following memorial:

Horatio Pitcher was born in the town of Monroe, Maine, January 23, 1839, the son of Horatio Gates and Anna Leonard Pitcher, both of Puritan stock. The family moved to Bangor, Maine, when Horatio was a small boy and there he acquired his early education in the public schools and later attended academies in Maine and Massachusetts. He was for a time a student at Oberlin College, Ohio.

After completing his studies he turned his attention to the grocery business, following this line of work until 1861 when at twenty-two years of age he enlisted in the First Regiment of the Second Maine Volunteer Infantry. After the Battle of Bull Run he was made quartermaster sergeant, serving in this capacity until after the Penninsular campaign, when he received a commission as quartermaster of the Eighteenth Maine Volunteers. In 1864 he was ordered to Albany, New York, to buy horses for the army. He continued thus until the close of the war when he was mustered out with a creditable military record at Bangor, Maine, in the spring of 1865, having served through the entire Civil War. After receiving his discharge, Mr. Pitcher went to Savannah, Georgia, where he conducted a mercantile business for several years. He then moved to Boston, Massachusetts, where in partnership with his brother he engaged in the same business until 1868. In that year he came on a trip to Iowa
