S. A. Brush, Chelsea Merchant, Is Dead at 78

S. A. Brush, 78, Chelsea merchant since 1914, died at noon Saturday, Sept. 8, 1951, in St. Luke's hospital, Cedar Rapids. Death was due to diabetes and cancer of the liver.

Mr. Brush had been losing weight for the last three years and entered St. Luke's hospital six weeks ago for a check up. His illness was diagnosed as diabetes. He spent five days at the hospital and then came home. After a week at home, his illness became worse and he returned to the hospital, spending another week there. Then he came home for eight days. On Sept. 4 he returned to the hospital and upon the advice of four physicians, he underwent surgery at noon on Sept. 7 for an interior growth on his right side. The operation disclosed the growth to be cancer of the liver.

Mr. Brush seemed to be recovering from the operation, but next day, Sept. 8 at noon, he suddenly died while eating his dinner.

The diabetes and cancer had progressed rapidly before the operation. During the last month the dosage of insulin for diabetes had to be doubled within a few weeks.

Large Crowd at Funeral

A large crowd attended the funeral which was held at 2 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 11, 1951, at Hrabak's funeral home. Rev. Paul Heath of Belle Plaine officiated.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Horrigan sang, "Jesus Lover of My Soul," and "Nearer My God to Thee," with Mrs. E. F. Polson playing the organ accompaniment.

Pall bearers were George Veit, Charles Veit, James H. Musel, George Benda, Walter Rich, and Charles Hrabak. Burial was in Rector cemetery.

Brush Born In Winneshiek County

Was State Senator 1927-31

Besides serving on school boards in the rural districts and in Chelsea, and on the town council in Chelsea, he served as mayor of Chelsea from 1914 to 1918 and again from 1932 to 1936. He served as state senator from Tama-Benton district from 1927 to 1931. He was also a director and president of the Chelsea Savings Bank from its founding in October, 1936, until the time of his death.

Planned to Retire In 1947

Brush had planned to retire from the grain business in 1947 and leased the elevator to Richard Holland. Brush then went to McAllen, Texas, with his wife, but after not quite a year there, he returned to Chelsea and resumed management of the elevator. Brush was happiest when occupied with work.

Mr. Brush was a member of Zenith Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Chelsea, and a member of Chelsea Methodist church.

His marriage to Cathryn Wilkinson occurred August 8, 1900 at her home south of Chelsea.

To this union six children were born. One son died in infancy and the twin brother, Burnell, died in 1934.

His wife and four children survive, namely, Mrs. H. B. (Marie) Cobet, Cecil W. Brush, Merle B. Brush and Mrs. J. B. Brush.



Taught In Rural Schools

Due to the principle of the resuscitator, it adjusts itself to the patient's lung whether the patient is a premature infant or a full grown adult.

The instrument automatically inhales and exhales for a patient at a near normal rate. It supplies oxygen at all times. It will breathe at the rate of a newborn baby or the rate of a child or adult patient.
