## SYLVESTER FLEMING

Sylvester Fleming, better known as Ves, was born on a farm south of Arbor Hill, Harrison Township, Adair County, Iowa October 4, 1874 and passed away Tuesday noon, June 11, 1963, at the Adair County Memorial hospital in Greenfield. Mr. Fleming had been a patient in the hospital in Greenfield, since January 24, this year.

Ves was one of the three sons of David and Charlotte Fleming. His twin brothers died in infancy, and also both of his parents and one grandparent passed away when Ves was but 17. He continued to live in the immediate vicinity of his birth, and it is a noteworthy fact that he had lived his entire 88 years within a radius of a mile of the home where he was born, with the exception of a very short time that he lived in Nebraska.

On April 4, 1899 he was united in marriage with Miss Clara Irene Moyers of Boone County, Iowa. Two children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Fleming, both of whom survive him.

Mr. and Mrs. Fleming were interested together in the worthwhile projects of Harrison township, and took an active part in the church and Sunday School services at Beulah, as long as services were held there.

On July 16, 1945 Mrs. Fleming passed away, and although lonely, Mr. Fleming carried on with that courage that dominated his character. He was always devoutly interested in politics from the township level through those of the nation. He served one term as state representative from Adair county, and of special interest, that fact that he served his township as school treasurer for more than 40 years, relinquishing that duty, only with the "School Reorganization" a few years ago.
