## LAST RITES HELD AT OCHEYEDAN FOR H. C. HATTENDORF

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the Ocheyedan Lutheran church for H. C. Hattendorf, 82, who died at the Osceola hospital Saturday. Burial was in Zion Lutheran cemetery in Horton township.

A resident of Osceola county for over 60 years, Mr. Hattendorf had been in failing health since suffering a stroke in 1948.

H. C. Hattendorf was born March 6, 1867, near Crete, Ill. He moved to Horton township in 1887, and five years later was married to Louisa Glade. His home was in Horton township continuously until 1931, when he moved to Ocheyedan.

Mr. Hattendorf was always active in civic and political affairs. He served as Horton township clerk, Osceola county supervisor, mayor of Ocheyedan, and was for a time member of the Iowa legislature. He was also an active member of the Zion and Ocheyedan Lutheran churches.

Survivors include Mrs. Hattendorf and the couple's nine children. They are Alfred, Herman, Henry, Arthur, William and (Mrs.) Mary Schmidt, all of Ocheyedan; Walter, of Tripp, S. D.; (Mrs. Martha Schluttered, of Remsen; and the Rev. Gerhard attendorf, now a pastor in Liberal, Kansas.

Sixteen grandchildren and one one great-grandchild also survive.

the state group; several members of the state soil conservation Service; and representatives of the Farmers Home Administration, Iowa State college, and the Production-Marketing Administration.

According to extension director Olman Hee, who has played an active part in arranging for the meeting, representatives of these state and national organizations will be here to listen—not to talk.

They will be in Sibley to discover why 375 Osceola county petition signers feel that organizing a soils-district here would be a good thing.

They want to find out what the local problems are and what kind of help might be sought through the soils-district.

### Referendum Next Step

If, after the hearing Monday, the state committee approves organizing a conservation district in this county, the issue will be put to a vote of Osceola landowners. Approval of 65 percent of those voting in the referendum will then be sufficient to authorize setting up the new conservation district.

Operations of the district would be under the supervision of a three-man committee, to be elected at the referendum which may follow Monday's discussion.

Nominations for this county committee will be made at the hearing next week, so that names of nominees may be printed on the referendum ballot.

Members would have staggered terms of two, four and six years—so that two experienced men would always be on the job.

### District Operation

Local organizers say that the committee would receive requests from any Osceola county landowner, for assistance in setting up soil-conserving practices. When a sufficient number of requests had been received the committee would hire a conservation specialist.

The district technician's salary would be paid by the federal government—which is already financing such technical assistance for farmers in 96 of Iowa's 99 counties. His services—in planning, contouring, terracing, crop rotations, fertilizing programs, etc—
