Government Material Yards

Franklin R. Beedle, 28, Sloan was killed about 7:20 a. m. Thurs day when the car he was driving was struck by a southbound Chicago and North Western passenger train about a half mile south of the Floyd Monument on a dirt road crossing.

Beedle's car was dragged about 1,025 feet by the impact and then tossed into a ditch. Beedle's body was behind the wheel of the battered vehicle when found.

Dr Thomas L. Coriden, Woodbury county coroner, said that Beedle suffered fractured legs, a crushed chest and right arm. Dr. Coriden said that Beedle was killed instantly.

Beedle, who apparently did not see the approaching train, was headed west toward the government material yards, where he was employed. The yards, located on the banks of the Missouri river, are a short distance from the crossing.

Beedle was driving an old model car which evidently was hit broadside by the diesel engine of the passenger train.

The train was traveling about 20 minutes late and had left Sioux City, about 7.12 a. m., a railroad spokesman said. It was held up about 45 minutes because of the accident. The train crew was composed of John Medsen, engineer, Alvin Glidden, Fireman, and Chas H. Sloan, Conductor.

The cars of sightseeing motorists were parked along highway 75 Thursday morning for about a half mile parallel to the ditch where the Beedle automobile was thrown by the collision. Many persons left their cars to surround the wrecked vehicle while the body was being removed. Sioux City police aided in handling the traffic on the highway.

W. J. Hennigan, assistant superintendent of the railroad, said that an investigation will be launched to determine the cause of the collision. He said that apparently the train's operation was normal, that there were no obstacles marring right of way vision at the crossing and that the weather was clear.

WELL KNOWN POLITICAL FIGURE DIED THURSDAY

EDWARD RAWLINGS, 85, FORMER STATE REP, AND COUNTY SHERIFF, DIED AFTER LONG CAREER OF PUBLIC SERVICE.

A plunge off tackle for the extra point failed and it remained a tie game the rest of the way.

Onawa failed to capitalize on two breaks in the final half, and with less than two minutes to play in the game, they marched down to Tekamah's eight yard line and it appeared as if they were going to pull the game out of the fire but they bogged down and lost the ball on downs.

This week the Bulldogs entertain Manilla. The Hawks have a fine club this year and boast plenty of size in their unbalanced line single wing attack. Heading their attack are two tackles, Behrend (175) and Grage (234). Also their center Jones, at 200 pounds, Grage also totes the ball from the fullback slot when needed.

It was then that his popularity was recognized and he was re-elected to that important office over three consecutive times or a total of 7 years.

This was just the beginning of Mr. Rawlings' service to the public. He gave freely of his time and knowledge to such organizations as the Onawa Board of Education. He served as president of the Monona-Harrison-Crawford Counties Fair Circuit, and he also served faithfully as president of the Monona County Farm Bureau. He was chosen treasurer of the Monona County Mutual Fire Insurance company and secretary and treasurer of the Illinois Central Elevator. Although having only a common school education Mr Rawlings was given the honor of representing his county in the legislature at Des Moines for two terms, and was given the honor while serving, to be selected on the powerful Agriculture Committee. Mr. Rawlings and his family moved to Onawa in 1903 and he has since that time made his home in this city, dividing his time between farming, civic and political duties. He was a member of the Methodist church.

Mr Rawlings was born at Plattsville, Wisc., on May 3, 1870. He moved to Monona County with his parents when about 5 years old and resided in the Castana community until 1903 when he and his family moved to Onawa. He was married to Effie Miller in 1896 at Castana. Mrs. Rawlings preceded him in death in 1929.

To the union were born four children, all of whom survive the father: They are Raymond Rawlings, Monona County Engineer, of Onawa; Atty Maurice Rawlings, of Sioux City; Richard Rawlings, also of Sioux City and William of Albuquerque, N. M. One sister, Mrs. Mary Bowers of Kansas and 6 grand children. Mr. Rawlings passed from this life on Thursday, October 20, 1955 at a Nursing home in Sioux City, Iowa.

Funeral services were conducted from the Pearson Funeral home on Monday afternoon at two p. m. with Rev. E. E. Epperson officiating. Services Held for Edward Rawlings

Edward Rawlings was born in Plattsville, Wisc., on May 4, 1870 and passed from this life after a long illness on October 20, 1955 at the age of 85 years.

He came with his parents to the Castana community when a young man, was united in marriage with Effie Miller at Mapleton in 1896. She preceded him in death on January 8, 1929.

Mr. Rawlings was a farmer by vocation but held several different offices in the organizations of the community. Some of the offices were: sheriff of Monona county for seven years, a member of the Onawa Board of Education, president of Monona, Harrison and Crawford counties fair circuit. He was a charter

member of the Monona county Farm Bureau. Treasurer of the Illinois Central Elevator Co. and served as state representative to the Iowa Legislature for two terms.

Survivors include his four sons, Ray of Onawa, Maurice of Sioux City, William of Albuquerque, N. M., and Richard of Sioux City; also one sister, Mrs. Mary Bowers of Kansas and six grandchildren.

Funeral services were held on Monday, October 24, at 2 p.m. at the Pearson Funeral Home with Rev. Everett Epperson officiating. 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
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terror to law breakers. Following his retirement from the office he engaged once more in the livery business at Onawa in 1911 and 1912. In the latter year he was nominated by the democratic party for the office of county auditor but was defeated. Since that time he has conducted business as a dealer in hay and feed, marketing the products in western Iowa and in Kansas.

On the 1st of April, 1896, Mr. Rawlings was united in marriage to Miss Effie Miller, her father being Chalmers A. Miller, a merchant of Mapleton, Iowa. Mrs. Rawlings is a devoted member of the Methodist church and by her marriage has become the mother of three children, namely: Ray A., born March 11, 1897, who was graduated from the Onawa high school with the class of 1914 and is now a member of the 1918 class in liberal arts at the State University of Iowa; Richard C., whose birth occurred on the 17th of August, 1901; and Maurice E., whose natal day was August 27, 1906.

Mr. Rawlings started out in life on his own account when seventeen years of age with nothing but good health as his capital. He has been thrifty, energetic, persistent and has accumulated a comfortable competence, while in the community he stands well both as a citizen and business man.

HOMER WESLEY JOHNSON.

The record which the American public holds in highest honor is that of the self-made man who gives proof of his character worth and of his ability in fighting life's battles and winning its victories single-handed. Such is the life history of Homer Wesley Johnson, now president of the Johnson Brothers Land Company of Sioux City. Starting out without capital or influential friends to aid him, he has steadily advanced step by step until his position in business circles is a creditable and enviable one. He was born upon a farm in Clarke county, Iowa, March 16, 1859, and is descended from Scotch-Irish ancestry, although for several generations the family has been represented on this side the Atlantic. His grandfather was a native of Virginia, in which state also occurred the birth of Allison Chord Johnson, the father of H. W. Johnson. Removing westward to Indiana, Allison C. Johnson there formed the acquaintance of and wedded Emily Brenton, a native of that state and a niece of Hon. Schuyler Colfax. They left Indiana in a wagon drawn by oxen in the year 1857, with Clarke county, Iowa, as their destination, and there they cast in their lot with its pioneer settlers. Mr. Johnson became a prominent and influential citizen of that locality and for two terms served as recorder of Clarke county and for one term as county sheriff. He was filling the office of postmaster at Osceola, Iowa, at the time of the outbreak of the Civil war in 1861. His last days were spent in Armour, South Dakota, where he passed away in 1899, and his wife died in 1895.

Homer W. Johnson was a pupil in the public schools of Osceola but at the age of sixteen years put aside his text-books and became assistant to his father in the office of county recorder of Clarke county, there remaining for four years, two years with his father and two years with the succeeding incumbent. On the expiration of that period he entered the Bank of Corning at Corning, Iowa, in charge of the land loan department, spending about three years in that connection. He next
