Services for Frank J. Swanson, 76,
of Akron, Ia., who died Friday in
his home of a heart ailment, were
Monday at 2 p. m. in the English
Lutheran church at Akron with Rev.
E. G. Swenson officiating and bur-
ial in the Riverside cemetery there
directed by the Ross funeral home
of Akron.

Born October 19, 1865, at Stockryd,
Jonkoping Lan Smoland, Sweden,
Mr. Swanson came to this country
with his parents at the age of 6
years. He lived on a Union county,
South Dakota, farm until 1901, when
he became a resident of Akron.

During his 40 years at Akron, he
was active in the furniture, hard-
ware and real estate business and
was president of the local bank.
From 1918 to 1923 he served on the
city council and in 1928 he became
a member of the Iowa legislature,
representing Plymouth county. He
also was a licensed motician and
managed a funeral home in Akron
until 1937 when he retired.

Mr. Swanson, who founded the
English Lutheran church and built
the Akron hospital, held a KCCCH
rank in the Sioux City Consistory
and was a member of the Akron
Freedom lodge, AFAM.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs.
Tillie Anderson of Elk Point, S. D.,
and a brother, Victor of Clark, S.
D. His wife died in 1937. He was
married in 1890.

Frank J. Swanson Former Solon Passes Away

Engaged In Many Enterprises During Long Life

Frank J. Swanson, 76, former representative for Plymouth county in the state legislature, died at his home in Akron Friday night of a heart ailment. He had been in poor health for some time. He had lived in this vicinity seventy years.

Mr. Swanson was born October 19, 1865, at Stockryd Jonkoping-Lan Smoland, Sweden. He came to the United States with his parents when he was six years old. His parents settled on a farm in Union county, South Dakota, where Mr. Swanson resided until 40 years ago, when he moved to Akron.

Engaged In Business

Mr. Swanson was engaged in many businesses. He began in the furniture and hardware business. Later he had a real estate office and was president of the Akron bank. At the time of his retirement four years ago he was operating a mortuary, having become a licensed mortician. He served two terms on the Akron city council, from 1918 to 1923, and in 1923 he was elected to represent Plymouth county in the state legislature. He was the builder of the Akron hospital.

Prominent Mason

Mr. Swanson was a past master of Freedom lodge, A. F. & A. M., at Akron and was a member of the Sioux City consistory, having a K. C. C. H. rank.

Surviving are a brother, Victor, of Clark S. D., and a sister, Mrs. Tillie Anderson of Elk Point. Mr. Swanson's wife, whom he married in 1890, died in 1937.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon in the English Lutheran church of which he was one of the founders at Akron. Rev. E. G. Swensen officiated at the service and interment was made in Riverside cemetery in Akron.

Are Ready To Seal Corn

The Plymouth County Corn Sealers have received instructions and material and are now ready to seal 1941 corn, Chairman R. L. Weidauer of the county AAA announces.

The requirements are practically the same as they were for 1940. Cribs must be in good repair. Corn must be leveled so that it is possible to get correct measurements, and cribs must be enclosed so that it will be necessary to break in in order to remove corn. Be sure to have this done before you notify the sealer to take samples. You may either notify the sealer or the county office when you wish to seal corn.

Eligible producers and landlords are those who have planted within their allotments. Sealers have been instructed not to seal corn unless these requirements have been met.

Henry A. Stryzewski was born in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, on July 31, 1897 to Emil and Hulda Stryzewski, one of ten children. He came to Akron to visit his uncle and aunt, the Rev. and Mrs. Fred A. Meske and liked Akron so well, he went into business with his cousin, Frances Meske, until she was married three years later to the Rev. John Langholz. Henry owned and operated the Variety Store for 53 years until his death on January 25, 1970.

Emma Gillmann Stryzewski was born on September 19, 1897 in Alvord, Iowa, one of 13 children. Her father and mother were the Rev. and Mrs. Emil Gillmann.

Mr. and Mrs. Stryzewski were the parents of three children: Ralph, born December 17, 1922, of Sioux Falls, South Dakota. He was married to the former Blanche Baily of Parker, South Dakota and they are the parents of five children: Mark, Scott, Grant, Lee and Ruth Ann. Ralph is a car salesman.

Esther of Carroll, Iowa was born March 4, 1924. She married John J. Rogers in 1950. They had one daughter, Ann Elizabeth born September 30, 1954. John passed away in July of 1960. Esther married Williams L. Chambers in 1965. He passed away in January of 1979.

ALFRED JOHN SWANSON

Alfred John Swanson was born in Edosa Skaraborgs, Lan. Sweden on May 14, 1872. He came to America April 15, 1892, took up residence in Chicago, Illinois and worked for a lumber company for several years. In 1908 he came to the Akron community. He farmed for years on the Schneiderhienze farm and remained there until his death on October 5, 1972.

Amanda Louisa Sand was born in Malmbeck Swolen, Sweden October 11, 1879. She came to America when she was 17 years of age. She met Alfred Swanson in Chicago. Amanda married Alfred on January 27, 1901 and came with him to Union county, South Dakota in 1908. They had seven children: Elsie (Carlson); Stanley; Arthur; Herbert; Antionetta (Buum); Walter (died April 3, 1931); and Leonard. Amanda died May 4, 1946.

C. A. SWANSON FAMILY

Carl August Swanson was born in Edasa, Sweden, October 7, 1868. He had six brothers and sisters. The family resided on the farm 'Sormon' near Edasa.

Carl came to the United States when he was 21 years of age. He lived in Connecticut for two years, then moved to Chicago where he worked for the Chicago

transit and Marshall Field department store. He and Gerda Linn were married in January 1915 in Chicago.

Gerda Linn was born in Simonstorp near Norkopping, Sweden, May 2, 1883. She came to the United States when she was 18 years of age, living in Chicago. She had ten brothers and sisters.

Carl August and Gerda came to the Akron vicinity shortly after their marriage. They farmed in Union county, South Dakota for a few years and then moved to the farm south of Akron, where their son, Roland still resides.

The couple had four children: Ralph, Lillian, Roland and Harriet.

Ralph lives in Miami, Florida. He and Bertilda Steensland were married in August 1930 in Chicago. They have two children: Joan and Craig.

Lillian lives in Akron. She and Robert Adams were married in September 1935. They have two children, Sylvia and Robert.

Roland married Esther Sand in November 1938. They have four children: Kenneth, Alyce, Keith and Lynn.

Harriet lives in Sioux City. She and Leonard Jensen were married in September 1943. They have one son, Dwayne.

Gerda passed away in January 1947. Carl August passed away in June 1952.

Frank J. Swanson was born October 19, 1865 at Stockryd, Jokoping Lan Smoland, Sweden. He came to the United States with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Swan Swanson, when he was six years old. His parents settled on a farm in Union county, South Dakota, where Frank grew to manhood and engaged in farming.

In 1890 he was united in marriage with Miss Betsy Johnson. For about three years after their marriage Frank and Betsy lived in Sioux Falls, South Dakota

re he conducted a shoe store. They again farmed in Union county for several years before coming to Akron.

About 1900, when rural route four was started out of Akron to the southeast, Mr. Swanson served as its carrier for a time. He afterward engaged in several business enterprises in Akron, first in the hardware and furniture business, later in the real estate business, and was one of the organizers and president of the First Trust & Savings Bank, of Akron. He attended S.D.U. two winters. Mr. Swanson became a licensed mortician and operated a mortuary until his retirement in 1937.

Mr. Swanson served two terms on the Akron town council, from 1918 to 1923. In 1928 he was elected on the Republican ticket to represent Plymouth county in the state legislature. He was a builder of the Akron hospital.

Mr. Swanson became a member of Freedom Lodge #434 AF & AM in 1906 and afterward filled several offices of the lodge, including that of worshipful master. He was also a member of the Sioux City Scottish Rite Consistory, holding the rank of K.C.C.H.

Frank Swanson was a charter member and one of the organizers of the Immanuel Lutheran church of Akron. He and his wife had a foster son, Harley C. Lewison of Akron. Betsy Johnson Swanson died in 1937 and Frank 1941.

LEONARD SWANSON

Leonard Swanson and Violet Anderson were married October 5, 1943 at the brides home in rural Beresford, South Dakota. They live on the farm known as the Schneiderheinze farm. Leonard was born there, they now own and farm it.

They had five children: Verdell; Eugene; Venita; Vivian (Hoops); and Linette (Reed), seven grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

THE ROLAND SWANSON FAMILY

The spring of 1921 was moving time for the C. A. Swanson family. Carl August, better known as August was moving a load of machinery. He was moving from the farm where Elmer Anderson now lives in South Dakota.

Along the way he met Laurence Fletcher who told him the Big Sioux river was bank full and the bridge had left the road about a foot. August was not about to go back. His trustworthy team, (Lady and Dick), set a steady foot on the bridge and took August and the wagon loaded with machinery safely across to Iowa. It was nearly dark when he arrived at the livery stable in Akron (located where Sheveland Welding is now) and someone told him the lower bridge went out. Being a little surprised he said, "I just crossed it."

It was in 1922 that Carl August, his wife Gerda and three children Ralph, Lillian, and Roland, settled in their new home two and one half miles south of Akron.

That year a fourth member (Harriet) was born to the family.

Ralph grew up on the family farm, married Esther Sand in 1938, and are still living there, making it home for 60 years.

The second generation grew up on this same farm. Roland and Esther's family: Kenneth, Alyce, Keith, and Lynn.

Kenneth, the oldest, married Betty Beitelspacher, is now teaching vocational agriculture in Le Sueur, Minnesota. They have two children: Angela and Roland.

Alyce is married to Marvin Toben. They live on the Toben farm, and have three children: Laura, Russ, and Joe.

Keith is married to Janice Carel, they live on the farm across the road from the "home" place, and have five children: Kristin, Stephen, Carrie, Kirk, and Carl.

Lynn, the youngest, married Linda Hansen, they live in Akron, Iowa and are farming the home farm. Lynn and Linda have three children: Lee, Heather, and Monica.
