# GEO. L. VENARD DIED MONDAY

PASSED AWAY AT HOME OF HIS  
DAUGHTER IN SEATTLE

Was 78 Years Old and Former Member  
of Iowa Legislature.—Survived  
by Six Children

G. L. Venard, for many years a prominent resident of this city and community and a former Sioux county representative in the Iowa legislature, passed away at 7:10 Monday morning at the home of his daughter and husband, Dr. and Mrs. Harold G. King, in Seattle, Wash., where he had been since last June. Mr. Venard had been in gradually failing health for the past several years, being a sufferer from high blood pressure, and his physical condition declined perceptibly following the death of his wife 2½ years ago. He had been up and around until about a month preceding his death.

His daughter, Mrs. King, accompanied the remains to Hawarden from Seattle, arriving here early this morning. Arthur Venard of Tracy, Minn., a son, met Mrs. King at Aberdeen Wednesday and accompanied her here.

Funeral services will be held at the Methodist church at 2:30 this afternoon with Rev. Robert F. Chapler, the pastor, in charge, assisted by Rev. Robt. H. Forrester of Sioux City, former pastor here. Interment will be made in Grace Hill cemetery.

George L. Venard was born in Muscatine county, Iowa, August 7, 1860, so was past 78 years of age at the time of his death. He grew to young manhood in southeastern Iowa and on January 1, 1885, was united in marriage with Miss Bertha Bell at Wilton Junction, Iowa. For the first four years following their marriage they lived in Nebraska and then moved to a farm near Aurelia, Iowa, where they lived until 1901 when they purchased a farm in Buncombe township, three miles north of Hawarden, which they

retired from the farm and purchased a home in Hawarden. Mrs. Venard passed away August 22, 1936, also

Mr. Venard is survived by three sons and three daughters, Arthur Venard of Tracy, Minn.; Guy Venard of Hawarden; Mrs. Harold G. King of Seattle; Mrs. Willard T. Greene of Sioux City; Harry Venard of Des Moines, and Mrs. Earl V. Slife of Hawarden. There are eleven grandchildren and three great grandchildren. He is also survived by one sister, Mrs. Nannie Spratt of Sioux City.

During his long residence in this community Mr. Venard took a prominent and active part in church, social, civic and political affairs of the community, county and state. He was a long time member of the Methodist church where he was a faithful and earnest worker. He served for years as township clerk of Buncombe township and later served as assessor of the city of Hawarden. He was prominent in the affairs of the Sioux County Farm Bureau during the early years of its existence. During the war period he was active in Liberty Loan drives and served as a member of the County Council of Defense and in other civic positions devolving upon citizens in local communities in connection with the carrying forth of war imposed activities. In 1921 he was elected state representative in the Iowa legislature to fill the unexpired term caused by the death of D. O. Stone. He was re-elected in 1922, 1924, 1926 and 1928, after which he declined to again be a candidate. Later he served for a time as a cigarette tax inspector of the state treasurer's office.

During his long residence here Mr. Venard was always held in the highest esteem. To every task upon which he entered he devoted sincere conscientious service. Always the peacefulness of his home life, however, held for him the strongest appeal and he was never happier than when surrounded by his children and his loved ones. But many outside the family circle will mourn his passing.



They had moved to Cherokee Co., after homesteading in Nb., near Burwell. George and Bertha had grown up in Scott and Muscatine Counties near the town of Blue Grass, Ia.

George's great-grandfather and great-great-grandfather had fought in the Revolutionary War and the family homesteaded and farmed in Oh., and before his father moved to eastern Ia. George and Bertha farmed in Buncombe twp. and in 1903, they purchased a farm east of the Hodoway school. Their six children attended the Hodoway school and Hawarden High School.

They retired from farming in about 1915 and moved into Hawarden. George worked for the Farm Bureau organization primarily in S.D. He was elected to the Ia. House of Representatives and served for five terms. Later he was employed by the State of Ia., serving in the cigarette tax collection department.

George and Bertha raised six children. Arthur and Guy were born in eastern Ia., near Wilton Junction. Stella was born in Nb., and Mazella, Harry and Bernice were born in Cherokee Co., Ia. ## HONORABLE JAMES HARRISON VAN CAMP

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life service of the late Honorable James Harrison Van Camp, Muscatine county, Iowa, begs leave to submit the following:

James Harrison Van Camp was born June 20, 1860, on a farm home in Sweetland township, Muscatine county where he spent his entire life. He received his education in the rural schools near his home and attended Wilton Academy one year.

He married Edith Louisa Mesich on May 16, 1886, at Highmore, South Dakota, his wife preceding him in death on January 19, 1937. Five children were born to them.

Mr. James Van Camp's chief occupation was farming. He served as township assessor for six years and was a member of the township board of trustees for four years. He also took an active interest in farm work and was a member of the Farm Bureau for many years. Mr. James Van Camp was a member of the Masonic Lodge in Muscatine having taken the degree of Master Mason on July 31, 1885.

In 1918 and again in 1920, he was elected as a state representative from his county to the Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth General Assembly, respectively.

He sustained a paralytic stroke and complications which eventually caused his demise on October 18, 1937.

We suffer an irreplaceable loss with the passing of this son of one of Iowa's pioneer families. He was one of the men who helped to mold the future of Iowa in order that we of today might have a better place in which to live.

He practiced law in Toledo continuously from that year, with the exception of the years he was special assistant attorney general and judge.






