the government of the United States."

Higens said the regents should make every student sign an agreement before enrolling that the student would not "disrupt the campus, try to close classes or join with others in an attempt to overthrow the government of the United States."

"I may get shot standing here," he said, glancing at a long haired youth behind him. "But I would also ask that every student sign an agreement that he is not a member of a student organization that has as its stated goal the overthrow of the government of the United States."

which for the most part finance the non-public schools, have increased, but have not been sufficient to keep pace with the rising costs," McCarthy said.

Whenever a child leaves a non-public school which has been closed, they do not vanish McCarthy observed. "They must go to school somewhere else, which means the public school. This means that the child's education which had been supported by contributions must now be supported by the taxpayer."

The four Catholic diocesan school systems, he said, are requesting assistance for the non-religious aspects of their education program, such as math and science courses.

"Remember that the duty of the state is to provide a secondary and elementary education to every child in the state. This duty is being assumed by the non-public schools McCarthy remarked.

The Iowa Catholic Conference is specifically seeking state aid in the form of partial compensation for the teaching of non-religious courses.


Good Neighbor Deed for Farmer While He Was Ill
