W. H. GISSEL, 68, KILLED IN ACCIDENT

W. H. Gissel of Hawkeye was killed last Saturday in an automobile accident near Indianola on his return from a visit in California. Three other persons were also injured in the crash: H. F. Ralston, 65, of Des Moines received severe head and face cuts; Otto R. Warner, 48, also of Des Moines, received a broken leg; and Forest Peck, 21, La Porte City, a broken arm. Mrs. Peck, 18, was not injured.

Mr. and Mrs. Peck, who were married the Sunday previous to the accident, in Yuma, Ariz., met Mr. Gissel in San Diego, Cal., where they arranged to return to Iowa with him.

William Henry Gissel was a former state representative from Buchanan county, elected in 1930 on the Democratic ticket. He was a member of the forty-fourth and forty-fifth general assemblies and the extra session of the forty-fifth assembly.

Mr. Gissel was born Sept. 6, 1872 in Buchanan county and married Emma J. Bantz in 1893. They settled on a farm near Independence. Mrs. Gissel died in 1936 and in March, 1938, Mr. Gissel married Mrs. Minnie Niewoehner. They moved to Hawkeye from Sumner last June.

Survivors include his widow; nine children: Murray of Sumner; Mrs. Wallace Stoakes; Mrs. Homer Miller and Leslie Gissel, all of Waterloo; Mrs. Richard Watkins of Anamosa; Mrs. Edgar Hood, Faye and Kenneth, of Independence, and Vivian of Toledo; 14 grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Emma Ray of Norfolk, Neb.; and one brother, George Gissel of Independence.

Funeral services were held at 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the Parker funeral home in Jesup with the Rev. Floyd Weed officiating. Burial was at Littleton.
