George H. Mayne II, 75, 37 Bluff St., a longtime Council Bluffs attorney, died Monday at a local hospital after an extend-ed illness.

Mayne served as state repre-sentative in 1931-32, was assist-ant county attorney 1943-46 and city solicitor 1949 - 50.

Born at Crescent, he came to Council Bluffs in his early boy-hood. He was graduated from the Council Bluffs High School and attended the University of Colorado at Boulder.

Mayne was a member of the Pottawattamie County Bar As-sociation; Cobia Lodge 631, AF&AM; Joppa Council 15, Royal Arch Masons; Har-mony Chapter 25, Order of East-ern Star; was a past exalted ruler of the Elks Lodge, and was a member of First Preby-terian Church.
