He was born in Bremer county. He came here with his parents from Iowa Falls in 1875. They settled on a farm in Lincoln township and Mr. Morton continued to live there until eight years ago, when he and his sister moved to their present home in Clarion.

Mr. Morton has long been prominent in civic circles. He helped to organize the Wright county Farm Bureau, the Clarion Farmers Elevator Cooperative and the Farmers Mutual Insurance company. He was a director and president of the Farmers Mutual Insurance company for over 50 years. He also was a former teacher in the Wright county schools. He served as a member of the state legislature as representative of Wright county. He was a regular attendant of the Methodist church until his recent illness.

Obituary

O. P. MORTON

Oliver P. Morton was born Aug-
ust 1, 1860, near Jefferson in
Bremer county. In 1861 his father,
Wm. C. Morton enlisted in the U.
S. military service and was sta-
tioned at Ft. Randall, S. D., where
the family joined him the follow-
ing year. In 1864 they moved back
to Iowa, making the trip to Iowa
Falls in an ox-drawn cart, and in
1875 they came to Wright county.

Mr. Morton has lived a busy,
active, productive and full life. He
married Miss Anna Birdsall in
1892. They purchased the family
farm southeast of Clarion, which
was then open prairie. He planted
the fine grove of trees, which now
beautify it, with walnuts from Mt.
Vernon and one of the few creep-
ing junipers in this country.

His interest included his farm-
ing, his classroom work as teacher,
the educational needs of those
early days, the welfare of farmers
as shown by his participation in
Farm Bureau, Farmers Elevator,
Farmers Mutual Insurance. Back
in 1931 and 1932 he served in a
session of the general assembly of
Iowa, entering the problems and
channels of law making as they
help develop a country's life and
character.

Mrs. Morton died in 1927 and
since that time his sister, Mae has
lived with him and has been the
homemaker.

His long career of hard work
was eased by retirement and mov-
ing into Clarion. His wide interests
continued through his unusually
long life. Numberless days, until
he was no longer able, Mr. Morton
sat at his window, seeing from the
sidelines the world in which he
had so long been an active partici-
pant. Quietly he moved on into
the unseen world Wednesday
morning, March 12, leaving behind
a well worn path along the ways
of service.

OLIVER P. MORTON.

Born in Black Hawk county, Iowa, August 1, 1860, Oliver P. Morton, a well-known farmer of Lincoln township, Wright county, Iowa, where he owns three hundred and twenty acres of splendid farming land, is the son of the late William C. and Sarah Jane (Vaneman) Morton.

Mr. Morton's father and mother were natives of Beaver county, Pennsylvania, but which is now a part of Mercer county, Pennsylvania. The late William C. Morton was reared on the farm and was educated in the county schools of Mercer county. He quit school at the age of eighteen and worked on the farm with his father, where he continued until twenty-one years old, in the meantime having charge of one hundred acres. After attaining his majority Mr. Morton learned the shoemaker's trade and worked at his trade in Zenianople, Butler county, Pennsylvania, until 1853, when he moved to Illinois. He lived on the western border of the state, having come part of the way by boat on the Mississippi river. Later he moved to Black Hawk county, Iowa, driving overland with an ox team. After his arrival in Black Hawk county, he purchased a farm of eighty acres and remained in Black Hawk county until the Civil War broke out, when he enlisted in the Forty-first Regiment, Iowa Volunteer Infantry.

William C. Morton served four years and nine months in the Civil War. Shortly after his original enlistment, he was transferred to the Sev-

enth Iowa Cavalry and served in that regiment until the close of the war. The Seventh Iowa Cavalry was detailed to duty against the Sioux Indians in South Dakota. In the spring of 1862 Mr. Morton moved his family to Ft. Randall and later to Ft. Sully, in South Dakota, where he lived until the spring of 1864, when they moved to Iowa Falls, making the journey overland with an ox team. Mr. Morton, however, served in the army until June, 1866, when he moved to Iowa Falls and operated a shoe shop until 1875, at which time he purchased one hundred and sixty acres of land in Lincoln township, Wright county, Iowa, paying five dollars an acre for the land. There were no improvements on the farm and it was necessary to haul lumber for building purposes from Iowa Falls. William C. Morton lived on that farm until his death, on October 15, 1905. His wife died on November 14, 1913.

Of the eight children born to William C. and Sarah Jane (Vaneman) Morton, Robert L. is a farmer in the state of Wyoming; Dr. William M. is a physician and surgeon at Pasadena, California; Rebecca is now Mrs. John Overbaugh, of Wright county; David V. died in 1875; Anna is now Mrs. Monzo Overbaugh, but her husband is deceased and she makes her home on the farm with her brother, Oliver P.; Edward B. died in 1892; and Harriet M. is deputy treasurer of Wright county.

Oliver P. Morton received his education in the Iowa Falls schools. Mr. Morton quit school at the age of fourteen years and, until he was eighteen years old, remained at home on the farm with his father. At the age of eighteen years he began teaching school and taught for twelve winters in Wright county. He rented land from his father and continued to live with him until his father's death. In 1885 Mr. Morton purchased one hundred and sixty acres of land adjoining his father's farm, and for this he paid fifteen dollars an acre. When his father died the farm was left to Mr. Morton with the understanding that he was to pay the other heirs their share of the estate.

Mr. Morton has invested twenty thousand dollars in improvements of all kinds. The farm is well tiled and the fences are all well constructed and in a good state of repair. In 1909 a new barn, forty by one hundred and fourteen feet, with twenty-foot posts and with cement stalls and a forty-by-ninety-foot cement floor, was built on the farm. This barn is electric lighted, as is also the house. Mr. Morton's house and his tenant's house are heated by hot water. Everything on the farm is kept in the very best possible condition. The Morton farm is indeed a magnificent estate and one of which its owner has every reason to be rightfully proud.

On December 20, 1892, Oliver P. Morton was married to Anna Birdsall, the daughter of Benjamin and Anna (Hyde) Birdsall. Mrs. Morton's father was a pioneer of Wall Lake township. Mrs. Morton received her education in the public schools of Alden and Iowa City, Iowa. She was compelled to quit school at the age of eighteen years and remained at home with her parents until her marriage, at the age of twenty-five. Mrs. Morton was one of a family of ten children. Mr. and Mrs. Oliver P. Morton have no children.

For twenty-five years, Oliver P. Morton has served as secretary of the local school board. He also served as school director for one term. He is a director in the Farmers Insurance Company, and was one of the organizers of the company. He is a member of the finance committee, and takes a pardonable pride in the fact that he has never missed being present at the annual meeting. He is ex-secretary of the Clarion Creamery Company and is now serving as its treasurer. Mr. Morton is a director in the Farmers Elevator Company, and for one year served as its president. He is a director in the Wright County Fair Association and has held a director's position since the fair association was organized. He was one of the organizers of the Clarion Savings Bank, in 1901, and has been vice-president since its organization. Oliver P. Morton belongs to the Independent Order of Odd Fellows. He joined the lodge in 1884 and has passed through all of the chairs. Mr. and Mrs. Morton attend the Methodist church, although they are not members. Mr. Morton is politically identified with the Republican party. He was a delegate from the third Iowa district to the Republican national convention held in Chicago in 1912.

ROBERT HIRT.

Robert Hirt, surveyor and well-known citizen of Woolstock, Wright county, Iowa, was born in La Salle county, Illinois, on January 11, 1875, the son of Paul and Rosa Hirt.

Robert Hirt was educated in the public schools of Woolstock township, and after completing his early education he engaged in the dry-goods business, in partnership with his brother, Martin, for seven years and then selling his business, took up the profession of a surveyor, the duties of which occupation he now follows. Mr. Hirt is also the owner of a splendid farm

Mr. McFerren was also an ordained minister, having served at Duncombe and surrounding vicinity.

He was united in marriage August 3, 1885, to Minnie A. Clockman, and to this union were born three sons and one daughter—Donald, Robert, Maynard and June.

Mrs. McFerren preceded him in death July 9, 1927, and Maynard was killed in Germany in 1942, during World War II action. He was also preceded in death by his parents, one brother and two sisters.

Mr. McFerren was author of the book, "Distribution," published in 1940, and also had written a book of poems. A champion of the cause of the farmer in the days of the 1920's, he organized the National Farm League. He was always interested in matters of progressive citizenship, and his public spirit was often manifested in many ways.

Surviving are two sons and one daughter—Donald and Robert, both of Webster City, and Mrs. Ralph (Jane) McClure of Iowa Falls. Also surviving are three grandchildren, Terry Ann McFerren of Britt and Peter and Mary McClure of Iowa Falls.

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable O. P. Morton, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Mr. Morton was born in Bremer county in 1860. He spent the years 1862 and 1863 with his parents in Fort Randall and Fort Sully, South Dakota, where his father was stationed as a member of the 7th Iowa Cavalry. He lived in Iowa Falls from 1864 to 1875, when he, with the family, moved to the farm in Wright county.

He attended school in the country and at Iowa Falls. He taught school during the winters from 1878 to 1891. He helped to form and carry on many of the farm organizations of the county.

Mr. Morton was a director and member of the executive board of the Farmers Insurance Company of Wright County since its organization in 1890. He was always interested in schools and was secretary or treasurer of the local school board since 1896.

He was married to Anna H. Birdsall in 1892. Mrs. Birdsall died in 1927.

He was a member of the I.O.O.F.

Mr. Morton served as Representative from Wright county in the Forty-fourth Session of the General Assembly.

He passed away March 12, 1951.
