75 AMERICANS TO BE FREED IN Tuesday Prisoner Exchange

PANMUNJOM, N.—The Communists freed 600 Allied war prisoners Monday—55 of them Americans—and promised their biggest shipment of the Korean POW exchange for Tuesday—475 Allied captives including 75 Americans.

Monday's group included the total number of Americans returned to 1,105. Just over one-third of the 1,315 the Reds have said they held.

The Reds also freed 75 British, 250 South Koreans, 1 Japanese who had served with U. S. forces as a houseboy, and 1 Japanese Korean who said he served with the South Korean Army although he was treated as a civilian.

The Americans and British jumped briskly from the Red trucks that rolled them down from the Red grouping center at Kaesong. They laughed as they moved into the Allied tents and appeared

in good health. A total of 1,177 Allied troops have been freed in 15 days of the exchange. The Reds have said they held 12,961.

As the Allied prisoners were handed over, truckloads of Communist POWs, including North, King and LeMay.

Members of the POW Command said four ships carrying 2,400 Red prisoners to the port of Incheon from Raik Island were forced back by light wind.

The POW Command said the delay would not affect Tuesday's delivery but may reduce Wednesday's shipment to 600. The U.N.C. has been sending back about 1,400 Reds at Panmunjom daily.

The Communists said their big shipment Tuesday would include 75 British and 250 South Koreans. They usually have been sending back about 100 Allied POWs a day.

Mr. O'Donnell, a member of St. Joseph's parish, had served as treasurer of the church for the last 21 years. He was also a member of the Holy Name Society of the parish.

He was a charter member of Charles Carroll Council, Knights of Columbus. If he had lived until August 30 he would have been a 50-year member of the organization.

A lifelong Democrat, he had represented Carroll County in the state legislature two terms, from 1929 to 1931. He had also held numerous county offices in the Democratic party.

George O'Donnell was born at Freeport, Illinois, on September 28, 1870. He passed away at Carroll, Iowa, on August 17, 1953.

He came with his parents to Carroll County as a young boy where he lived on a farm. His early education was received in the schools of Maple River Township and St. Joseph Catholic school, Carroll, Iowa. He was a member of St. Joseph's Catholic Church and charter member of Charles Carroll Council Knights of Columbus, Carroll, Iowa. He was a farmer and later was employed by the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad as superintendent of construction. He was a township trustee of Maple River Township for six years and was well known for his community service. He was elected State Representative from the fifty-fifth district of Iowa on the Democratic ticket from Carroll County to serve in the Forty-third and Forty-fourth General Assemblies.

Mr. O'Donnell is survived by two brothers, T. B. O'Donnell of Anthon, Iowa and E. J. O'Donnell of Sioux City, Iowa; also a sister, Nell O'Donnell of Carroll, Iowa.

MILTON PEACO

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Milton Peaco, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Milton Peaco was born at Belle Plaine, Iowa, January 23, 1878. He passed away at Clinton, Iowa, March 17, 1954, the victims of an automobile accident.

His parents were Thomas C. and Mary E. Peaco, and when he was two years old he moved with them to Clinton County.

He was educated in the Clinton public schools, and at 15 years of age entered the employ of the Chicago Northwestern Railroad Company as a machinist, continuing in that capacity for 37 years.

He was married on October 18, 1899, at Urbana to Sadie E. Cook, daughter of Robert E. and Nancy M. Cook.

He was elected Representative from Clinton County in 1931 and served in the Forty-fourth, Forty-fifth, Forty-fifth Extra and Forty-sixth sessions of the General Assembly. He was a Democrat in politics.

He served as State Labor Commissioner from 1937 to 1939; served on the Land Commission which operated in connection with the Mississippi River Lock 13, and was a member of the Clinton Bridge Commission from its formation.

He was a member of the Christian Church, a member of the Masonic Order, and was to have received his 50-year pin the Monday following his death. He was a member of the Eastern Star, the Izaak Walton League and the Clinton Boat Club.

Mr. Peaco is survived by his wife, Sadie, and several nieces and nephews.
