Ed Ove, Former Representative Dies In Iowa City



Ed N. Ove, who served one term
in the Iowa Legislature from
Grundy county, died last Tuesday
in a hospital at Iowa City, fol-
lowing a stroke. He was a con-
tractor, and resided in Dike for
several years. He was a resident
of Dike when he was elected as
Grundy county's representative in
the legislature as a republican.
He was born Jan. 1, 1891, in
Aalborg, Denmark. He attended
Aalborg Technical School in Den-
mark, where he became a cabinet
maker, bricklayer and civil engi-
neer.
In 1915, Mr. Ove came to the
United States and until 1940 he
was a contractor in the Dike and
Grundy County, vicinities. He was
in the State Legislature from
1935 to 1937. Later he was em-
ployed by the Corps of Engineers,
the Department of the Interior,
and the State Highway Depart-
ment of South Dakota. In 1962
Mr. Ove retired and moved to
Iowa City.
He was married Feb. 1919 to
Miss Ann Kristine Jensen at the
Fredsville Lutheran church. Later
they were divorced and on June
19, 1946, in Hutchinson, Kansas,
he married Gertrude Greer.
Mr. Ove was a member of the
First Church, the Eks Club and
the American Legion, all in Iowa
City.

He was a charter member and
first commander of American Leg-
ion Post 471 at Dike.
He was Past Master of the Mas-
sonic Lodge and Past Worthy
Grand of the Odd Fellows Lodge.
He was a member of the Eastern
Star of B'nai B'rith Lodge. Burial
services were held in a fu-
neral home at Iowa City.

Survivors include his wife,
Gertrude; two daughters, Mrs.
Barton Brian Minneapolis, and
Mrs. Larry Stout, Santa Cruz,
Calif.; four sons, Bernhard, Ce-
cile Falls, Edward J., Minn., No.
Dike, Paul, Fremont, Calif., and
David, Iowa City, and five sisters
in Denmark.

Fredsville Aid Plans Auction For April


The Fredsville Ladies Aid ma-

W. R. Gray, Dike Druggist 50 Yrs.

The issue of the Dike New Era for March 23, 1916, contained the following news item, "Wayland Gray of Cedar Falls, a registered pharmacist, began work last week for W. R. Wood in the drug store. He will remain here permanently."
Next Wednesday, March 17, Wayland will have the distinction of being a Dike druggist for 50 years. As the 1916 news item stated, he came here from Cedar Falls and began work for H. C. Wood Drug Store where Juel's Grocery is now located on March 11, '16. L. A. (Tug) Wood was also employed in the store. In due time the store was sold; "Tug" went to the army and in 1918 Gray went to work for the Dike Drug Store operated by Marius Andersen and J. C. Corsaut in the present location of the Gray and Wood Drug. Wayland at that time took the place of Marius Andersen who went to the Navy—selling out his partnership to Dr. O. E. York. A few months later Gray bought Dr. Corsaut's interest in the store and the Corsauts were moving to Cedar Falls.

L. A. "Tug" Wood returned from the army in 1919 and shortly thereafter he purchased Dr. York's half of the business. From that time until "Tug's" death in 1940 the partnership of Gray and Wood existed. The store still goes under that name.

Wayland became a registered pharmacist in June of 1907 at Iowa City and in 1957 received an honorary fifty year certificate from the State Pharmacy Board.

Robert C. Reilly was born August 5, 1904, in Dubuque, son of Thomas and Margaret Mahoney Reilly. He was graduated from Loras Academy in Dubuque and Marquette University in Milwaukee.

On June 8, 1941, he was married to Jean Moes at St. Columbkil's Church in Dubuque and of this union was born one son.

Mr. Reilly was a member of the Holy Name Society of St. Joseph's Parish; the Dubuque Business and Traveling Men's Association and the Pioneer Law Makers.

Mr. Reilly, a Democrat, served in the House of Representatives in the Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth sessions and in the Senate in the Fiftieth, Fiftieth Extra, Fifty-first, Fifty-second and Fifty-third sessions of the General Assembly representing Dubuque County. He was the first legislator to introduce a bill that would provide bus service for all school children.

Mr. Reilly died on November 2, 1968. He is survived by his widow and a son, Roger J., of Dubuque and a brother, Cletus R., of Wauwatosa, Wisconsin.
