Grave side service for Thomas H. Brodersen, 87, of St. Paul, Minnesota will be held at Midway Cemetery on Thursday Oct. 1, 1964 at 1 p.m.

Mr. Brodersen passed away Monday, September 28, 1964.

Thomas H. Brodersen was born July 27, 1877 in Schleswig Holstein, Germany. He came to America in 1880 with his parents, Thomas T. and Dorothea Brodersen.

He was the youngest of eight children namely five boys and three girls.

In 1900 he married Magna Martin. They lived near Battle Creek. She died in 1934. In 1936 he married Mrs. Gertrude Roloffs. She died February 8, 1964.

Mr. Brodersen was a former member of the Presbyterian church of Battle Creek and a 50 year member of Preservance Lodge No. 446 AF & AM of Battle Creek, Ia. He also served two terms as a member of the Iowa Legislature as a representative of Ida County in the late 30's. Soon after Mr. and Mrs. Brodersen moved to St. Paul, where they made their home.

Survivors include five stepchildren of St. Paul, one sister-in-law, Mrs. Ella Brodersen of Odebolt and several nieces and nephews.
