5 WPA PROJECTS IN CITY TO HALT

Lack of Funds to Curtail Work.

Work will stop Friday on five WPA projects sponsored by the city streets and parks departments because of lack of city funds to complete them, it was announced Tuesday.

The projects include:

Construction of Riverside drive along the north bank of the Des Moines river from the Sixth ave. bridge northwest to the Euclid ave. bridge. This \$100,000 project is now two-thirds completed.

Grading at Grand View park and golf course, and at McHenry park, begun several weeks ago under a new WPA project, but no funds were provided by the council.

Graveling of city streets.

Grading and graveling of the Holcomb ave. extension between Sixth and Second avenues.

Under the graveling project 90 miles of streets have been improved, and 10 more miles were included in the program.

90 Pct. Completed.

The Holcomb ave. project is 90 per cent completed.

It may be possible to haul additional dirt to the site in connection with the Sixth ave. widening project started Tuesday.

The reason for the city's difficulty is a recent government ruling requiring sponsors of WPA projects to put up 20 per cent of the total cost, instead of about 10 per cent previously required.

Sewer Project.

The remaining streets department funds available for financing WPA projects are being allocated to the outfall sewer project and the bridge and dam construction

Driscoll Dies; State Senator Ill 2 Weeks

State Senator T. F. Driscoll, Democrat, of Farmington, Ia., died Tuesday night at Mercy hospital.

He had been at the hospital since the evening of Feb. 9 when he suffered a heart attack at Hotel Fort Des Moines. Senator Driscoll was recovering from influenza at the time of the heart attack. Last week he was believed to have been recovering from the heart ailment.

Monday his condition took a turn for the worse after it had been expected he would be discharged from the hospital this week and be ready to resume his seat in the upper house.

Young Member.

Senator Driscoll, who was 40 last November, was one of the youngest members of the Iowa senate. He came to the senate from Lee county in 1935, after defeating former State Senator Joe R. Frailey (Rep.), Fort Madison, in the 1934 election by 325 votes.

Frailey had served in the legislature 20 years until he was defeated unexpectedly by Driscoll. The senate seldom heard from Driscoll, in contrast to the many witty speeches for which Frailey was widely known.

A recent parks department plea to the council for an additional \$13,000 to finance its WPA projects was ignored.

One Solution.

Streets Commissioner John MacVicar said the city's WPA program still could be financed, despite the government's new ruling, if the legislature would permit state emergency relief funds be used for works projects.

More than 400 men, now employed on the projects to be discontinued, will be transferred to other WPA projects or placed on direct relief.

SENATOR T. F. DRISCOLL DIES, WAS BORN AT BELFAST IN 1896

Kraschel To Call Special Election To Fill Vacancy

The body of the late Senator T. F. Driscoll, whose death occurred in Des Moines last night, will be brought to Keokuk today and taken to the Greaves Mortuary. No funeral arrangements have been made as yet.

DES MOINES, Feb. 24.—(P)—Gov. Nelson G. Kraschel said today he will call a special election to fill the vacancy in the senate caused by the death of State Senator T. F. Driscoll, democrat of Belfast, last night.

Senator Driscoll, 40, one of the youngest members of the senate, died at Mercy hospital here from a heart attack suffered while he was recovering from influenza. He was taken to the hospital February 9.

He was elected to the senate in Lee county in 1934, defeating former Senator Joe Fraley, republican, Fort Madison, by 325 votes. Fraley previously served in the legislature for 20 years.

Advocated Higher Exemptions.
 He was the co-author of a bill now pending in the legislature to raise state income tax exemptions on incomes to \$1,000 for single persons and \$1,800 for heads of families.

Driscoll served in the 46th and 47th regular sessions and the extra session which enacted the state un-employment compensation law.

A co-author of the Irwin-Driscoll income tax bill placed before the senate in January, 1937, the Lee county democrat has frequently urged lower state income tax rates. Consideration of the bill by the leg-

Rarely Entered Argument.
 Although he frequently took decisive stands on controversial issues up for debate in the legislature, Driscoll rarely entered into argu- ment on the senate floor.

He was born at Belfast, Iowa, No- vember 18, 1896, and always lived on a farm in Lee county. In brief biographical notes prepared by sen- ators he described himself as being of "Irish parentage."

Driscoll attended grade schools and high school at Farmington, Ia., and was a world war veteran. After returning from the war he entered democratic party work in south- eastern Iowa.

Besides farming, Driscoll has been interested in banking and the pro- duction of stone products.

His wife, three sons and six daughters survive.

DRISCOLL RITES TO BE FRIDAY

Services for Senator at Keokuk.

Funeral services for Senator T. F. Driscoll of Farmington, Ia., will be held at 9 a. m. Friday at St. Peter's church at Keokuk, Ia., with burial at Spring Prairie cemetery at Belfast, Ia.

Senator Driscoll, 40, and father of eight children, died in Mercy hospital in Des Moines Tuesday night. A heart attack, aggravated by influenza, caused death.

Resolution.

A resolution extending the deep and profound sympathy of the senate to the family of Senator Driscoll will be adopted in the Iowa senate this morning.

Upon adoption of the memorial resolution, Lieut. Gov. John K. Valentine will appoint a committee of three senators to represent the senate at the funeral.


The memorial resolution, drafted Wednesday by Senators Mason, Irwin and Beardsley, was ordered drawn by the senate which adjourned for the day immediately upon convening.
