Former Governor Leo Elthon Dies

Represented Worth County As State Legislator For Many Years

Leo Elthon, 68, longtime legislator representing Worth County and Lt. Governor for one term, passed away Sunday evening at a Mason City hospital following a long illness. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the Fertile Lutheran church, burial was in the Brush Point Cemetery.

Mr. Elthon was elected Lt. Governor in 1952 and served as Governor for 52 days following the death of Governor William S. Beardsley in an auto accident late in 1954.

Mr. Elthon was first elected to the Iowa Senate in 1932. He served in the Senate until his election as Lt. Governor and was Republican floor leader for three sessions of the legislature.

In 1963 he was re-elected to the Senate after an absence of six years. He served then as Senator of the Howard-Mitchell and Worth district until suffering a heart attack in 1964.

A lifetime resident of Worth county, he was born June 9, 1898 at Fertile. After graduation from the Fertile High School, he attended Augsburg Seminary, Iowa State Teachers College and Hamilton College. He went into the teaching profession at the Clear Lake school and later serving as principal at the Fertile High School.

He was active in community affairs throughout his life. He had served as president of the Fertile school board, a member of the Worth County Board of Education, mayor of Fertile, to which he had to resign when re-elected to the Senate in 1963. He was also active in the quarry business.

He was married in 1922 to the former Synneva Hjelmeland. She died in 1963.

Surviving are two sons, David and Allen, both of Fertile; four daughters, Mrs. Ed (Dorothy) Davis, Milwaukee, Wis.; Mrs. Les (Irene) Nelson, Mason City; Mrs. Wendell (Amy Lou) Mahoney, Mondamin; and Mrs. James (Sykvia) Lemon, Geneva, Ill. A brother, Thelan Elthon of Fertile; and three sisters, Miss Mabel Elthon and Mrs. Louis (Esther) Vanberg, both of Fertile, and Mrs. Arthur (Ruth) Nyhus, Fergus Falls, Minn., also survive.

of 68.

A Republican
leader in state
government,

been ill since
suffering a
heart attack
three years ago.
He underwent
surgery last
December at Rochester, Minn.

Mr. Elthon served as gover-

"First Love"

39 Trucks Collect Rest Of Rubbish

City crews, unable to complete a special trash pick-up on the city's west side last Saturday, were attempting to get the job finished Monday.
