J. W. Frizzell Rites To Be Held Today

Died at Grinnell Hospital Monday After Long Illness

Last rites for J. W. Frizzell, 81, life-long resident of the Brooklyn community will be held in the Brooklyn Presbyterian church this (Thursday) afternoon at 2:30 with the Rev. M. A. Robeson, pastor of the church in charge. He will be assisted by the Rev. E. W. F. Holler. Miss Thursia Manatt will be at the organ and play a number of hymns.

Mr. Frizzell died at a Grinnell hospital Monday morning. He had been in ill health for some time. Interment will be in the Brooklyn I. O. O. F. cemetery. Members of the local I. O. O. F. lodge will attend the service in a body and conduct their burial ritual at the grave. Pallbearers will be: Frank Talbot, Earl Holley, Will Holley, Harry Bickford, Harley Burch, Roy Regd. The son of Thomas and Margaret Frizzell, John Wilford Frizzell was born Jan. 10, 1865, at Brooklyn. His death occurred at a Grinnell hospital April 22, 1946.

He was married to June Slegel Feb. 17, 1892 and the couple made its home on a farm west of Brooklyn until moving to Brooklyn in 1915. Except for short intervals he had since made his home here.

Surviving are a son, Wayne Frizzell of Brooklyn; two daughters, Mrs. Frank Ritter of Grinnell and Mrs. Charles Reading of Kansas City, Mo.; two sisters, Mrs. G. W. Murrison and Mrs. J. W. Silcott of Brooklyn; and six grandchildren, Fern Frizzell of Brooklyn, Carma Frizzell Householder of Montgomery, Alabama, Dennis and Richard Ritter of Grinnell, and Jane and Thomas Charles Reading of Kansas City.

His wife died in 1935 and a son, Thomas Lee, also preceded him in death.

Mr. Frizzell had been active for many years in the affairs of the community and had served on the town council and as Poweshiek county supervisor. He also represented Poweshiek Co. in the lower house of the state legislature for three terms. He maintained an active interest in the Democratic party.

Mr. Frizzell was also active in Iowa fraternal circles. He was a member of the Brooklyn I. O. O. F. lodge and four years ago received the order's 50-year pin. In the state organization he was a past department commander of the Canton and past grand patriarch of the Encampment. He had also been a representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

He was a member of the Rebekahs, the Grinnell Elks Lodge and the local Presbyterian church.

Soybean Contest Renewed Here

Soybean growers in Poweshiek County may compete for \$500 in cash prizes to be awarded in the 1946 Iowa 5-acre Soybean Yield Contest, L. D. Brown County Extension Director, announced this week.

The state soybean yield contest was started in 1941. In 1945 it was suspended because of war conditions. Sponsor of the state contest and 12 district contests is the Iowa Corn and Small Grain Growers Association. This group, in addition to offering \$500 in cash, will present the state winner with the John Sand trophy, a master soybean growers medal to each district winner and a certificate to the winner of each local contest. Cash awards include \$50 to the state winner; \$15 to the district winner; and additional prizes for other district place winners.

Entry blanks and copies of the rules and regulations for both the county and state contests may be obtained at the county extension office.

One-hundred eighty three Christmas cards and handkerchiefs were mailed from the local chapter to service men and women from local community. An ash tray and scarf was sent to Knoxville at Christmas.

Articles made by members included 41 bed pillows; 23 chair pillows; 28 bed pillow slips; 20 chair pillow slips; 73 garments for the Philippines; 2 tee shirts; 2 swimming trunks; 13 robes; 28 pair slippers; 2 afghans; 262 handkerchiefs; 125 wash clothes; 3 quilts; 19 pants; 19 sunsuits; 9 slips; 9 girls dresses and 9 women dresses.
