## George W. Groves, Former State Representative, Dies

George W. Groves, 85, former  
state representative from Ham-  
ilton county, died at 7:50 Sat-  
urday evening at the Hamilton  
county hospital where he had  
been a patient for three days.  
He had been in ill health the  
past year.

Funeral services will be held  
at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday at the  
Foster funeral home with the  
Rev. R. D. Kitterman officiat-  
ing. Burial will be at Graceland  
cemetery.

George W. Groves, son of  
Jackson and Jane L. Groves,  
was born November 2, 1872 on  
a farm 10 miles south of Web-  
ster City. He attended the Sara-  
toga community rural schools.

Mr. Groves was united in  
marriage May 18, 1893 to Mary  
Alice Branch.

Mr. and Mrs. Groves farmed  
on the Groves home farm until  
1917 when they bought a farm  
one mile south of Webster City,  
the family home since then.

He is survived by a son, Don-  
ald B. Groves of Des Moines;  
two daughters, Mrs. J. E. (Hel-  
en) Gourley, who lives on the

Groves homestead, and Mrs.  
Allie C. (May) Olofson, who  
lives on an adjoining farm; nine  
grandchildren and ten great-  
grandchildren.

He was preceded in death  
by his wife, who died April 3,  
1956; one daughter, Mrs. Frank  
(Verna) Hunter, who died Au-  
gust 14, 1933; his parents; one  
brother, Jackson L. Groves, and  
a sister, Esther, who died in in-  
fancy. He was also preceded in  
death by several half brothers  
and half sisters.

Mr. Groves was a member  
of the Evangelical United  
Brethren church.

He served two terms as rep-  
resentative in the state legisla-  
ture, from 1935 through 1938.  
He was elected as a Democrat.

Mr. Groves was president of  
the Hamilton county Farm Bu-  
reau for six years and was pres-  
ident of the Farmers Grain  
company for two years.

He was also on the board of  
the Livestock Shipping associa-  
tion and had served as president  
of the former Hamilton county  
Warehouse Board.
