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DEATH CLOSES PUBLIC LIFE OF REP. KNOWLTON

Death ended the public career of State Rep. W. P. Knowlton, 58, when he died of a heart attack at 11:15 p. m., Thursday, August 17, in the local hospital.

Funeral services were held on Monday at 2 p. m., at the Olson-Iverson Funeral Home and at 2:30 p. m., at the Decorah Methodist church, with the Rev. Floyd Weed in charge. The pallbearers were: Atty. Parnell Shea, C. C. Roderick, Leland McCord, A. J. Headington, E. J. Weigle and Charles Altfillisch.

The floral bearers were Lucille Ellefson, Mrs. Arthur Solheim, Nadine Fischer and Mrs. Arlene Strum with Mrs. Robert Olson in charge. The beautiful florals, pieces of which there was a large number, were distributed among the patients at Decorah hospital, and the Aase Haugen home and the Costello Nursing Home.

Official Cortège.

A group of representatives appointed by Speaker of the House, Henry W. Burma, attended in a group. They were: Rep. Elmer Peiper, Wautouk; Rep. George Scott, West Union; Rep. Arthur C. Blatti, New Hampton; and Rep. F. E. Sharp of Elkader. Lt. Gov. Robert Blue appointed Senator Ed Vrba of Howard county to represent the state senate. Jesse Parker, state superintendent, and a group of educators from the state department of education were also present in a body, as well as Frank Josef of Chicago, representative of the Follette Book Co.

Burial was in the Phelps cemetery.

Rep. Knowlton served three terms in the Iowa legislature and was running on the Republican ticket unopposed for a fourth term.

Independent Thinker.

Always a fighter for what he believed was right, even though he often was the underdog, Rep. Knowlton was being considered in some quarters as a potential candidate for the speakership of the 1945 Iowa house of representatives.

He was one of eight representatives who fought the bill suspending 50 per cent of the state income tax, on the grounds it was an economically unwise policy for the state in the long run.

As chairman of the house schools committee in 1943, Rep. Knowlton sponsored the school code revision bill drawn up by a special commission. The bill, longest ever presented to an Iowa legislature, failed to pass, but inspired the appointment of a new commission which included many of the bill's provisions in a group of new bills now being prepared for presentation to the 1945 legislature.

In School Work.

In school work for five years in Iowa, Rep. Knowlton also was familiar with the dictatorial policies practiced a few years ago by George A. Brown, as executive secretary of the Iowa High School Athletic association, and he was

Pvt. Casterton volunteered last October and began training as a paratrooper at Fort Benning, Ga. In a trail jump from a tower he hurt his foot and was transferred to the infantry, for which he received training at Camp Roberts, Calif.

His parents received a letter from Arland, dated June 14 in New York City, which was sent from England so it is doubtful if he was in the invasion.

He has one brother, Vernon Lee, and two sisters, Faith Delaine, and Nelda Lou. He is a grandson of Mrs. Henry Casterton of Canton.

one of the legislators who pushed legislation which would have placed the association under the state superintendent of public instruction.

The legislation failed in the house after passing the senate, but it was kept alive until Brown's resignation from the association was forced.

Rep. Knowlton also was extremely interested in all taxation bills and took an active part in discussion revolving around them.

Rep. Knowlton was born Oct. 17, 1885, in Bluffton, attended public schools and was graduated from Decorah high school in 1905 and from the University of Iowa, where he played halfback on two football teams, in 1911.

Four Children.

He was married to Violet Irene Palmer of Wellman, June 12, 1912, and they became the parents of three sons, Robert E., Will P., jr., and Thomas E., and a daughter, Mrs. Marjorie Williams, all of whom survive.

Robert and Will, jr., are in service, the former with the marines in the South Pacific, the latter in the same area with the army. Other members of the family are at home.

Robert, a former all-state high school football player, and a grid potential at the University of Iowa when he entered service, has seen action in many rugged battles, including the landing at Tarawa.
