Insurance compan marrow transplan

NEW YORK (AP) —
Aetna, the nation's largest
health insurer, has decided to
drop coverage of bone marrow
transplants for women with
breast cancer unless they are
in a federally sponsored study,
a spokeswoman said today.

Aetna reversed its position
after it was disclosed earlier
this month that a South
African study of the treatment
contained falsified data.

"At this point in time there
is no credible evidence that
this approach is likely to be
better than a more convention-
al approach," said Dr. Arthur
Leibowitz, chief medical offi-
cer for Aetna U.S. Healthcare.
"We now have five well con-
trolled studies that show this
thing doesn't work."

The study was the only one
