# Rev. Morrow Dies July 6 Following Heart Attack

Rev. Harry E. Morrow, 77, former  
 Buck Creek minister and widely-  
 known Monticello resident following  
 his retirement, died suddenly July 6  
 and was buried Saturday at 4:30 p.m.  
 at Conrad, Iowa.

He had attended a Methodist  
 church picnic at the city park earlier  
 in the evening, and died that night  
 of a heart attack. Funeral services  
 were held at Goettsch Funeral home  
 at 10:30 a.m. Saturday and at Buck  
 Creek Methodist church at 1 p.m.  
 Saturday. Rev. Sterling J. Baldwin  
 officiated at the services, assisted  
 at Buck Creek by Rev. Milton Bee-  
 man.

Rev. Morrow was born September,  
 1882 at Conrad, the son of William  
 and Rhoda Wheeler Morrow. He at-  
 tended the Conrad schools and was a  
 member of the first class to graduate  
 from Conrad high school in 1902.

He attended Iowa State college at  
 Ames and graduated from there in  
 1907. He later attended Garrett  
 Biblical Institute, Northwestern  
 University, Evanston, Ill., and while  
 there served as a student pastor and  
 organized the Calvary Methodist  
 church which this year celebrates  
 its 50th anniversary.

He then served the Yorktown cir-  
 cuit as a Methodist minister and the  
 following churches: Gladbrook, State  
 Center, Center Point, Kenwood  
 Methodist, Cedar Rapids, Monona,  
 Buck Creek and Winthrop.

During World War I he served as  
 secretary of the YMCA at Iowa  
 State college and from 1929 to 1931  
 served as executive secretary of  
 the Methodist Conference Claimants  
 fund commission at Cedar Falls.

He served two terms in the Iowa  
 House of Representatives as a  
 representative of Delaware county,  
 1937 - 1940. He was married to  
 Myrtle Person of Sibley Aug. 16,

He is survived by his wife and

 Boyd and two brothers, William and  
 Herbert.

## CHARLES ELMO LUCE

Charles E., son of Eugene E. and Addie Huntley Luce was born on January 3, 1874, in Middlesex, Vermont. The family migrated west and settled in Nashua, Iowa. Subsequently they lived at Greene, Iowa, and at Wadena, Minnesota, and then returned to Nashua where Charles graduated from high school in 1890. On June 10, 1897, he was united in marriage with Mabel Bird who preceded him in death.



The Reverend Mr. Luce attended the State University of Iowa and while a student there served as Minister of the Mission Church in Hills, Iowa. His first conference appointment was at Blairstown from 1907 until 1909. During the years he served the following churches: Central City, 1909 to 1913; Albion, 1913 to 1917; St. Paul, Waterloo, 1917 to 1923; Cresco, 1923 to 1928; Rockford, 1928 to 1932; Traer, 1932 to 1938; Center Point-Urbana, 1938 to 1940. In 1940 he retired from the active ministry and became associated with the Institutional Financing Board working in Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Iowa until 1943. In that year he returned to the ministry and served the Dike-Brandon charge until 1945 when he became minister of the Janesville - East Janesville charge. In 1946 he became pastor of East Janesville and served there until 1955 when he became associate minister of Grace Methodist Church, Waterloo.

During his active years in the conference he was noted for his fine singing voice and served as a member of the conference quartet for more than fifteen years.

The Reverend Mr. Luce was active up to the very end of his earthly life. The day before his death he called at the Waterloo hospitals, and gave the invocation at the city council meeting the evening before his passing. He died quietly in his sleep on June 21, 1960, without pain or struggle.

Survivors are one daughter, Mrs. Carl Speth, Waterloo, Iowa, and one son, Arnold E. Luce of Minneapolis, Minnesota, and four grandsons, also of Minneapolis.

## HARRY EARL MORROW

Harry Earl Morrow was born September 12, 1882, at Conrad, Iowa, the son of William and Rhoda Wheeler Morrow and the eldest of five children. His early life was spent on the farm near Conrad. From the high school there he was graduated in 1902 with its first class. In 1907 he graduated from Iowa State College at Ames and then was a Y. M. C. A. secretary at Valparaiso University at Valparaiso, Indiana. He took his theological training at Garrett Biblical Institute at Evanston, Illinois.

On August 16, 1911, he married Miss Myrtie Person of Sibley, Iowa, and their first home was established in the Methodist parsonage at Yorktown where the Reverend Harry Morrow was serving the Yorktown circuit.

Soon the Methodist Mission Board began corresponding with him concerning mission work in Mexico, and he and his wife were sent to Pachuca, Mexico, where he was pastor of an English-speaking church. Because of the revolution in Mexico, Americans there were returned to the United States in 1914.



At conference time Mr. Morrow joined the Upper Iowa Conference which later became a part of the North Iowa Con-

ference, and he and his wife served churches in Gladbrook, State Center, Center Point, Kenwood Park, Monona, Buck Creek-Ryan, and Winthrop. Following his retirement in 1948 their permanent home was made at Monticello. For three years he worked for the Iowa Temperance League and afterwards served the Hopkinton church as supply pastor. During World War I he served as secretary of the Y. M. C. A. at Iowa State College and from 1929 to 1931 served as executive secretary of the Methodist Conference Claimants Fund Commission with his home at Cedar Falls. In 1937 and 1939 he was a member of the Iowa House of Representatives as a delegate from Delaware County.

Death came suddenly in the evening of July 6, 1960. Besides his wife he is survived by two sons, Lynn of Waukon and Raymond of Wilmington, Delaware; five grandchildren and one sister, Mrs. Ella Sager of Eugene, Oregon. Services were conducted by the Reverend Sterling Baldwin at Monticello at 10:30, July 9, and at 1 P. M. at the Buck Creek Church assisted by the Reverend Milton Beeman, with interment at the Conrad cemetery.

His was a busy and a useful life. He had a happy faculty of making friends and was a lover of little children and flowers.

#### THEODORE ERNEST HOON

Theodore Ernest Hoon was born at Sycamore, Indiana, on March 20, 1884, the second of four children, son of the Reverend Frank T. and Hester Elizabeth Hoon. He died at the age of 76 years, October 29, 1960.



When a small lad, he with his family moved to western Nebraska. There he attended grade school and entered high school. The family returned to Paoli, Indiana, where his father was a minister.

At the age of seventeen his father gave him an exhorter's license for the Indiana Conference. In April of 1902 he received his local preacher's license. As a circuit rider, he with another pastor served nine churches in Crawford and Perry counties.

On June 21, 1903, he and Lillie May Senn of Mifflin, Indiana, were united in marriage. To this union were born four children, three sons and one daughter. Two sons, Joyce and Carl Vincent preceded him in death.

In 1904 he was appointed to serve in the Southern Illinois Conference, uniting with that conference on trial in the year 1905 and receiving his deacon's orders in 1907. He entered Garrett Biblical Institute, Evanston, Illinois, in the fall of 1909, financing himself by serving student charges. After graduation in 1912 he went to the Northwest Kansas Conference and was appointed to the Bennington charge. He also served the Beloit circuit. It was in the Northwest Kansas Conference in 1913 that he was granted his elder's orders.

He transferred to the Northwest Iowa Conference in 1916 where he served charges at Alden, Rolfe, Laurens, Lohrville, Alta, Garner, Merville, Hartley, Everly, Sioux Rapids and Dows.

His retirement from the active ministry came in 1949 when he made Spencer his permanent home.

In 1950 he returned to the effective ministry, serving at Rembrandt - Truesdale. It was here in 1952 that he observed his fiftieth anniversary in the Methodist ministry. In that year he retired to Spencer, but due to the scarcity of pastors he supplied the churches at Moneta and Royal during the next six years.

Besides his wife he is survived by one son, Clarence of Nashua; a daughter Lois (Mrs. Elwood Hahn) of Des Moines; four grandchildren; five great grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Hester Harper, Wood River, Nebraska, and a
