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of wages for a third employe in the office of the county extension director.

The federal government now pays \$2,400 of any county extension director's salary, \$2,600 of the second employe (in this county the home economist). The \$2,800 would have been available for a third employe which would be a youth assistant.

The Farm Bureau's role in the extension program is a two-fold one. First, it is the recognized farm aid association which, as stated in the state law, must be the sponsoring local agency for any county extension program. As the farm aid agency it receives from the county the annual appropriation which the Farm Bureau earmarks for extension work --- available to all whether they are F.B. members or not.

The Farm Bureau in its role as a farm aid group helps draw up the extension program and pays for a large part of the program through a formula based on its membership and dues. But in this county the Farm Bureau until this year has exceeded this recognized formula to provide more than its share of the funds. Directors point out that this overage has been paid in the past because of the interest in extension work. So the Farm Bureau has served as a sponsor and a loyal supporter of extension work among rural families of this county.

The board of supervisors after surveying other counties on the extra appropriation and after talking to county farmers decided that the \$5,000 allotment was sufficient.

George L. Parker, 72, died early Thursday morning, Jan. 31, in Chicago where he had gone for medical treatment.

Mr. Parker was born in Independence on July 31, 1879 and was educated in the Independence school and Drake university.

**He married Maude Lincoln August 30, 1901. She preceded him in death. Mr. Parker is survived by two sons and a daughter, Tom L. Parker of San Diego, Calif.; George L. Parker, Jr., Victorville, Calif., Mrs. Tam Holland, Independence.**

Mr. Parker was a druggist in Independence for 36 years. In 1934 he was elected a state senator, an office he held for eight years.

Funeral services have been tentatively set for Monday afternoon at 2 p. m. The People's Funeral home will be in charge.
