County Received \$2,013 at Sale Monday Morning

Allison in Class by Itself, With No Delinquent Real Estate on Treasurer's Auction Block

Allison was the only town in Butler county, which had no real estate offered for sale at the delinquent tax sale held at the court house Monday morning by Paul C. Schaeffer, treasurer.

The total receipts of the sale was \$2,013.45, the smallest in a number of years, according to Mr. Schaeffer. Of this amount, \$1,843 was realized from the regular sale, and \$170.14 from scavenger sale. There were but eight bidders present.

Originally there were 233 pieces of property in the county listed for sale, but by time for the sale Monday, there were but 82 pieces delinquent and offered for sale. The value of the original property listed was around \$10,000.

There were but 31 pieces of the \$2 sold, 25 at the regular sale, and six at the scavenger sale.

Six townships, Fremont, Pittsford, West Point, Jackson, Ripley and Monroe, and one town, Allison, had no delinquent real estate offered for sale.



Clarksville Physician, Surgeon Served in Two Terms of State Legislature for Butler, Bremer Counties. Practiced 35 Years in Butler County.

Senator C. Colfax Smith of Clarksville, age 70, a practicing physician in Butler county for 35 years, died at his home yesterday afternoon following an illness of several months.

It was during the forty-seventh general assembly, which concluded last May, that his condition was first regarded as serious. During the assembly his failing health necessitated two trips to the Mayo clinic at Rochester, Minnesota, for treatment.

After the adjournment of the assembly, his condition gradually became worse and for the past two months he was unable to leave his room.

Senator Smith, who was a prominent Butler county Republican, represented this county in the Iowa house of representatives during the forty-sixth general assembly, and the thirty-ninth senatorial district, comprising Butler and Bremer counties, in the forty seventh general assembly. He was elected representative in 1934 and senator in 1936.

The legislator was born in Adair county in 1868, where he was educated in the Harlan public schools, and later taught in rural schools. He attended Highland Park college, Des Moines, two years, and accepted a position of superintendent of schools at Fountaineille.

He resigned his post as superintendent to enter Northwestern university school of medicine, Chicago, Illinois, from which he was graduated in 1904. Immediately after completing his medical course, Senator Smith started practicing at Clarksville, where he was since located.

He is survived by Mrs. Smith and two daughters, Louise Smith who is city librarian of Toledo, Ohio, and Mrs. Arthur Ollphant of Hampton. There are two granddaughters, one brother, Dr. Herman C. Smith of Liberty, Texas, and one sister Mrs. Guy Neal of Clear Water Florida.

Funeral services are being held tomorrow afternoon at 2:00 o'clock at the Community church at Clarksville. Burial will be in Lynwood cemetery.



**State Senator From Butler-
Bremer District**

Dr. C. Colfax Smith, 71, prominent Clarksville physician and State Senator from the Butler-Bremer district, died at his home here at 2:30 Tuesday afternoon, December 5, 1939. Dr. Smith had been in poor health for some time. He was taken suddenly ill in Des Moines this spring while attending his senatorial duties during the closing days of the recent session of the state legislature and went immediately to the Rochester clinic for examination and treatment. After returning home he improved in health and took an active part in the meetings of the state legislature's interim committee on retrenchment and reform, of which he was a member.

He made several trips to Des Moines to take care of his work with this committee and later returned to Rochester for further treatment. For the past two months he had been unable to be about.

Dr. Smith was born in Adair county on November 28, 1868, and was educated in the public school and high school of Harlan, Iowa. He taught for several years in the rural schools of Adair county and then entered college for a two years teachers course, and following his graduation was elected superintendent of schools at Fontanelle, Iowa.

He resigned this position to take up the study of medicine at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, and received his degree in 1904. He came immediately to Clarksville where he started the practice of his profession, which he continued for thirty-five years.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church, and of the Masonic and Odd Fellows lodges. He always took a great interest in the affairs of his community, state and nation. Dr. Smith served as a member and president of the local school board for a number of years and was active in other civic duties.

In 1934 he was a successful candidate for the position of state representative from Butler county, running on the Republican ticket, and in 1938 was elected state senator of Butler-Bremer counties.


New Members Added to Roll

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life, character, and public service of the late Honorable C. Colfax Smith, begs leave to submit the following:

C. Colfax Smith was born in Adair county, November, 1868. His early education was obtained in the public schools, and the high school in Harlan, Iowa. He taught for a short time in the country schools, then took a college course and became superintendent of schools in Fontanelle, Iowa. Resigned this position to enter Northwestern Medical School, where he finished in 1904. Married to Rachel Corrough of Malcom, Iowa, and has two daughters: Louise, a librarian in Toledo, Ohio; and Marian Elizabeth (Mrs. Arthur) Oliphant of Des Moines. He was a Mason and Odd Fellow and a member of the Presbyterian church.

C. Colfax Smith was a member of the Senate during the Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth General Assemblies from the Thirty-ninth District, Butler and Bremer counties, and had been a member of the House during the Forty-sixth General Assembly from Butler county.

During the last few months of his life he was in poor health, intermittently confined, and gradually grew worse until his death which occurred December 5, 1939, at Clarksville, Iowa, where he resided.

servant and the people a real friend; and we extend to Mrs. Smith and family our sincere sympathy.

Frank E. Ellis, son of Honorable J. W. and Mary Forbes-Ellis, was born on a farm in Jackson county, March 12, 1879, and passed away at his home in Maquoketa, February 6, 1941. He taught in the public schools for two years, then engaged in the insurance and real estate business. He expended great effort in collecting and maintaining the Frank Ellis Museum of archaeology and anthropology in Maquoketa, housed in a beautiful fireproof building which he erected in 1930, and which is free to school children.

He was an honored member of the Senate in the sessions of the Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth General Assemblies. In politics he was always affiliated with the Democratic party, although he numbered among his friends the adherents of all political parties. He enjoyed the confidence, respect, and esteem of all who knew him, irrespective of political affiliation. On all moral questions his voice and vote were always on the side of righteous living.
