★ Life Story of —

ART GREENE

Arthur C. Greene, the son of Cornelius and Charlotte Greene, was born January 22, 1881. His parents were pioneers in the community, and it was here that he received his education in the Denison grade and high schools, and later he graduated from Denison Normal and Business college.

As a student he was active in athletics and other extra-curricular interests.

Following the completion of his formal schooling he became associated with his father, Cornelius Greene who was owner and operator of the Denison brickyard, located at the time just a mile east of the city. Later, he became a partner in the ownership of the business, and the products which were manufactured there are still to be found in many homes and public buildings of this and neighboring communities.

On November 18 1903, he was united in marriage to Zella M. Hoover, whose family had come from Mitchell, S. Dak., to make their home here. To them were born five children.

Continuing through the years to make their home in Denison, Art became a strong booster for the things that would make Denison a better place to live. In these efforts he was elected as an alderman to the City Council where he served for six years, during which time his labors

as chairman of community improvements which came into being.

For the next six years he served the community as its night marshal, seeing to it that property was protected and that wrong-doers were brought to justice.

In 1919 he was encouraged to run for public office and through the loyal support of his friends and neighbors he was elected as their County sheriff, where for the next 18 years he served the county. Crimes and criminals of all descriptions were his lot and his daily fare, sometimes even to the point of personal injury at the hand of his charges.

He was elected by the voter in 1939 to the office of State representative to the Iowa legislature where he served for three successive terms. In the course of his duties there, Art Greene, was soon recognized by his colleagues on Capitol Hill and placed in positions of responsibility as chairman of the Fish and Game committee for six years, and as a member of the Judiciary committee, the Agricultural committee, the Social Security committee, the Conservation committee, the Mines and Mining committee and the National Defense committee. On two occasions his was the honor and privilege of ser-

ving as chairman of Judiciary committee of the House and Senate.

At the close of his third term of office in the Legislature, Greene chose to retire with a record of more than 35 years as a public servant to city, county and state. In retirement he responded again to public call and came to serve in a position with the Iowa Highway Patrol in Denison.

Being preceded in death by his wife, Zella, in 1952, and by their daughters, Marion in 1935, and Lois in 1956, A. C. Greene's final call came on June 10th, when he was more than 77 years of age.

Surviving him now are his three sons, Pershing and Clarion, both of Denison, and Leonard of Des Moines, and their families, including 4 grandchildren.

MRS. ED BUTTS

Mrs. Ed Butts, a resident of Dow City for many years, died at I.O.O.F. Nursing home, Mason City June 4 at the age of 91 years and six months.

Mrs. Butts was the daughter of Alfred and Elizabeth Busby. She

December 4, 1866. When five years of age, her parents moved to Winona, Minn., and in 1872 came to Dow City. She was the youngest of 11 children.


February 14, 1889, she was married to Ed Butts. Mr. Butts died August 12, 1933.

Graveside services were held at the Dow City cemetery, June 7 with Raymond E. Butterworth of the L. D. S. church in Dow City, a long time friend officiating.
