In 1914 moved to Clarion, where he continued the practice of law, as a member of the firm of Nagle & Hill. Served as city attorney of Clarion for ten years. Served in the World War and is a member of the American Legion, Rotary Club, and I. O. O. F. Married Genevieve Johnson of Belmond in 1914; father of two children, Betty Marie and George Raymond, Jr. Elected to the senate in 1936 to fill vacancy caused by the resignation of Senator I. H. Knudson. Re-elected in 1938.

HUNT, G. W., Guttenberg *Republican*
36th Senatorial District—Clayton County

Born in Riverside, California, June 19, 1891. Graduated Wheaton College, Illinois, and later took post-graduate work in University of Chicago. After a teaching career, during which he served as superintendent of schools at Guttenberg and Postville, Iowa, he entered the practice of law at Guttenberg in 1921. World War veteran with overseas service. Served as county attorney of Clayton county, 1925-1929. Past district governor of 11th District of Rotary International. Past president Iowa State Society for Crippled Children. Married Margaret Sherwood of Sioux City. Father of one son, Robert S. Elected to the senate in 1940.

JOHNSON, Oscar E., Kanawha *Democrat*
43rd Senatorial District—Cerro Gordo, Franklin and Hancock Counties

Born March 22, 1894, at Dayton, Webster county, Iowa. After graduating from high school he attended Highland Park College, Des Moines, where he studied pharmacy. Became a registered pharmacist in 1915, locating at Kanawha shortly thereafter and has subsequently been in the drug business. Married to Nora Nelson of Belmond, Iowa, in 1927; has two sons, James Owen and William Roger. Served twelve years as mayor of Kanawha; five years chairman of the Hancock county welfare board. Served as a member of House of Representatives in the 46th, 46th extra, 47th and 48th general assemblies; and first term in the senate.

Judge G. R. Hill Dies at Daughter's Home

Death came suddenly Friday, April 29, 1966, to Judge G. R. Hill, 77, well known Clarion, resident, during a visit in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Curtis Jones of Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Services were held Monday, May 2 at 2:00 p. m. at the Eyerl Funeral Home. Rev. Calvin Milan officiated.

Pallbearers were Jack Manos, Robert Blecker, James E. Houser, Newt Draheim, George Wright and Harlan Larson.

George Raymond Hill, son of Mordecai and Emma Mather Hill, was born November 7, 1888, in Woodburn, Iowa. He attended school in Woodburn, graduating from Woodburn High School in the class of 1905.

He attended Drake University from 1907 to 1911, one year as a Liberal Arts student, then majoring in law graduating with a law degree in 1910, when he was admitted to the Bar. He began his long years of law practice in Belmond from 1912 to 1914 and practiced in Clarion from 1914 to 1947 when he became a judge in the 11th Judicial District.

His community service included many years as city attorney. He served as State Senator from the 37th Senatorial District from 1936 to 1947 and was Senate Majority Leader from 1943 to 1945. During his years in the Senate he served on many

committees, among them: Labor, Ways and Means, Appropriations, Cities and Towns, Motor Vehicles, and as chairman of the Judiciary Committee. He was a member of the Legislative Interim Committee serving as Vice-chairman and Chairman. He was a member of the State Industrial Commission in 1945 and 1946.

Judge Hill served the 11th Judicial District from 1947 until his retirement. As a member of the Iowa District Judges' Association he served as Vice-President and President.

Judge Hill was a member of the Wright County Bar Association, the Iowa Bar Association, and the American Bar Association. He served as president of the Drake Law School Alumni in 1948 and 1949. For fifty years he was a member of The Independent Order of Odd Fellows Lodge 124, holding the title of Past Grand. He was a charter member of the Clarion Rotary Club and served as Vice President and President.

George Raymond Hill married Genevieve Johnson of Belmond, Ia., Feb. 22, 1914. Three children were born to this union: John Donald, who died in infancy, Bette Marie and George Raymond Jr.

He was preceded in death by his parents, his sister, Violet, who died in infancy, his sister, Mrs. Lou Hillery, and one brother, C. E. Hill.

He is survived by his wife, Genevieve of Clarion; one daughter, Mrs. Curtis Lee Jones of Grand Rapids, Michigan; one son, Dr. G. R. Hill Jr. of Fresno, California; one brother, M. C. Hill of Colorado Springs, Colorado; and nine grandchildren: Clayton, Douglas, Stephen Ray, and Alan Jones; Cathy, George Raymond, Holly, Wendy, and Jon Hill.

Robert W. Harvey was born at Magnolia, Iowa, on February 10, 1875. He was graduated from Logan High School and was a member of the graduating class of the State University of Iowa, College of Pharmacy, of 1897. On June 7, 1905, he married Vera A. Foss of Missouri Valley, Iowa. He was the father of a son, G. Edward Harvey, presently of Missouri Valley.

At the time of his death on September 29, 1965, he was the oldest living alumni of the College of Pharmacy of the State University of Iowa. For 61 years he owned and operated a drug store in Missouri Valley and that family tradition is still being carried on by his son.

Mr. Harvey had wide and varied acquaintances in both state and local Republican political circles. He was elected a State Senator representing the 34th Senatorial District in 1938 and served the citizens of Crawford, Harrison and Monona counties as well as the citizens of the State of Iowa with distinction through 1946.

He was active in community affairs as evidenced by his membership in the Masonic Lodge, the Royal Arch Masons, the Scottish Rite and the Shrine. He was also an active member of the Presbyterian Church and a charter member of his local Kiwanis Club. In addition, he was a past president of the Iowa Pharmaceutical Association and president of the Druggists Mutual Insurance Company of Algona, Iowa.

G. R. Hill was born on a farm near Woodburn, Clarke County, Iowa on November 7, 1888 and died on April 29, 1966 at the home of his daughter.

He graduated from Woodburn High School and Drake University and in 1910 was admitted to the bar. After farming for a year, he entered the practice of law at Belmond, Iowa. In 1914 he moved to Clarion and continued in law as a member of the Nagle and Hill firm. He was city attorney of Clarion for 14 years.

Mr. Hill was elected to the Senate in 1937 from the 37th District, comprised of Hamilton, Hardin and Wright Counties. He served as Republican floor leader for the 51st General Assembly.

After ten years of service to the Senate he was appointed District Court Judge from the 11th District where he continued until retirement in 1964.

Mr. Hill was formerly President of the Iowa Judges Association and President of Drake University Alumni Association. He also belonged to the American Legion, Rotary Club, and I.O.O.F.

Mr. Hill was survived by his widow, Genevieve; son, Dr. G. R. Hill, Jr.; daughter, Mrs. Curtis Jones; a brother; and nine grandchildren.

Mr. Frank D. Ickis was born at Afton, Iowa, December 12, 1872, and was a lifelong resident of the Creston and Afton communities. He was the son of A. F. and Ella Pott Ickis. He was married in Highland Township, June 3, 1896, to Grace Bowman and preceded him in death on November 10, 1964.

Mr. Ickis was an active member of the Republican party and served with distinction in the Iowa Senate from 1926 until 1932.

He was one of the organizers of the Spizzerintum club in Highland Township which was dedicated to the betterment of the community through improved social and business relations. This club, which was the forerunner of the Union County Farm Bureau, observed its 50th anniversary two years ago. He was also a charter member and a past president of the Union County Farm Bureau.

He was a member of the original board of directors of the Farmers' Cooperative Company of Creston and served as treasurer of this organization for eight years. He also served on the board of directors of the First National Bank in Creston and was a member of the Rotary Club there for many years. He was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Mr. Ickis died June 5, 1967, and is survived by a son, Ralph B. Ickis of Des Plaines, Iowa; two daughters, Mrs. E. J. Moore of Pompano Beach, Florida, and Mrs. Margaret Jones of Creston; six grandchildren and seven great grandchildren; also a brother, Charles S. Ickis of Denver, Colorado.

Mrs. McNichols died in 1850, leaving two children—Adaline Elizabeth and Franklin. Dr. McNichols was again married August 3, 1851, to Ketura Kirby, of Morgan County, Ohio. To this union have been born four children—Nathaniel W., T. E., M. G. and C. K. The doctor has always taken an active interest in politics. In 1856 he represented Morgan County, Ohio, at the State Convention held at Columbus the year the Republican party was organized. The doctor and his wife are members of the Society of Friends.


MORDECAI HILL was born in Putnam County, West Virginia, June 26, 1847. When he was nine years of age he came with his parents, Jonathan and Sarah Jane (Foglesong) Hill, to Van Buren County, Iowa. In 1865 they moved to Mahaska County, where the mother died in 1869. August 30, 1877, Mordecai Hill married Miss Emma Mather, daughter of Edward Mather. She was born in Illinois. Mr. Hill became a resident of Putnam County in 1880. He owns a homestead

of 120 acres on section 36, Jackson Township. In 1886 he also worked 160 acres of rented land on section 1, Franklin Township. To the parents of Mr. Hill were born nine children, eight of whom arrived at maturity, Mordecai being the eldest. The others are—Mary, living in Mahaska County; Sarah J., a resident of Marion County; Mrs. Elizabeth Vameer, also a resident of Marion County; Allius, deceased; Jonathan, a resident of Jackson Township; Charles and Mattie (twins); the former lives in Marion County, and the latter is the wife of Arthur Metz. JOHN W. HOOD is a native of North Carolina, and a son of John K. and Mahala (Hood) Hood. In 1833 his parents moved to Indiana and located in Rush County, where his father bought a tract of wild land, which he improved and made his home until his death, which occurred in the year 1881. The mother died in 1880. They had a family of nine children, six sons and three daughters—Louisa, John W., James, Alfred B., Lizzie C., Richard M., Martin K., Amanda and Lafayette. When a young man, in 1852, our subject came to Iowa on a prospecting tour, and being pleased with the outlook bought and entered claims in Clarke County to the amount of 280 acres, the land office being at Chariton. He then returned to Indiana and was married to Miss Martha Prine, daughter of Mathew and Elizabeth Prine, both of whom are deceased, the latter living to the advanced age of ninety-two
