Former Mason Cityan Herman Knudson dies

Herman M. Knudson, 90, former Ma-
 son City businessman and Iowa legisla-
 tor, died Thursday morning in a Glendale,
 Calif., hospital. He had been retired al-
 most 30 years and lived at Glendale.

A memorial service in Mason City will
 be held at 3 p.m. Saturday in the Willson
 Chapel of the First Congregational
 Church. The Rev. Robert Stone, pastor,
 will officiate.

Graveside services are to be at 10 a.m.
 Saturday at Riverside Cemetery in Mar-
 shalltown. Memorial services at Glendale
 are being planned for next week.

Mr. Knudson, a native of rural Or-
 chard, was employed as a young man at
 businesses in Manson and Marshalltown.
 He came to Mason City in 1919 as superin-
 tendent of Iowa agents for Mutual Life
 Insurance Co. of New York.

For many years he owned and operated
 the Kemble's greenhouses at Mason City,
 New Hampton and at Prairie du Chien,
 Wis. He was a charter member and direc-
 tor of Mutual Federal Savings and Loan
 Association here.

Later he headed Klippto Printing and
 Office Supply Co., serving as its president
 from 1932 to 1948, when he retired from
 active business. He then lived in Clear
 Lake for some years, before moving to
 California.

He was a Mason City councilman for
 eight years, served four terms in the
 Iowa House as representative from Cerro
 Gordo County and 12 years in the Iowa
 Senate representing Franklin, Hancock
 and Cerro Gordo counties.

He was active in a variety of civic activi-
 ties and fraternal and governmental
 groups. He was a past president of the
 Mason City Chamber of Commerce, Ma-
 son City Retail Merchants Association,
 Mason City Kiwanis Club, Society of
 Iowa Florists and Iowa State Horticul-
 tural Society. He was a former moderator
 of the Congregational-Christian Churches'
 North Central Association and a past gov-
 ernor of the Iowa-Nebraska District of
 Kiwanis International.

He is survived by two sons, Ted, in
 Glendale, and Bob, Norwalk; six grand-
 children and two sisters, Mrs. Nellie
 Markham, Mason City, and Olga Steffen,
 Columbus, Ga.
