# W. HUNT IS TAKEN BY DEATH THURSDAY

## Community Leader for Generation Passes

G. W. Hunt, for more than  
generation Guttenberg's  
Clayton County's fore-  
most citizen, died about noon  
Thursday at his home  
Cresco. Death was due  
a heart attack.

Funeral services for Mr.  
Hunt were held at the First  
Congregational church in  
Cresco on Saturday after-  
noon with Rev. Robert Cleve-  
land officiating. Burial was  
at Riverside cemetery at  
Seville. Pallbearers were  
Werton K. Warner, Curtis  
Hoble, Dr. F. O. Luehr,  
Jack Degnan, Dr. J. C.  
Holling and Arnold Baker.  
Honorary pallbearers were  
Charles Millham and C. H.  
Hoben.

Mr. Hunt came to Gut-  
tenberg to join the faculty  
of the Guttenberg Community  
Schools in 1911 and left in  
1914 after having been sup-  
intendent to take the post  
of head of the Postville pub-  
lic schools. After serving  
abroad in World War I, he  
returned to Guttenberg in  
1922 to practice law.

During the next forty years  
Mr. Hunt was involved in  
every major community pro-  
ject and in many statewide  
programs. Literally hund-  
reds of projects for the com-  
munity were planned in his  
life with the help of other  
community leaders.

stepson, Lester Fields.


## FARM BUREAU POLICY DINNERS SET

He returned to Guttenberg in 1927 to practice law.


In 1961 Mr. and Mrs. Hunt left their home in Guttenberg about half the year and spent the remainder of the year in Scottsdale, Arizona, the remainder of the year. Mrs. Hunt died here in 1962.
