**BUDD S. MOYLE
DIES AT AGE 78**

GRINNELL, IA. — Budd S.
Moyle, 78, former state repre-
sentative from Jackson
County, died

here Monday
after a long
illness. Serv-
ices will be at
2 p. m. Thurs-
day at the
James-Schalins-
ke Funeral
Home here.

Mr. Moyle
was born near
Washington
and received
his early edu-
cation at Lenox. He was
graduated from Tarkio Col-
lege, Tarkio, Mo., and re-
ceived his master's degree
from the University of Mis-
souri.

He was superintendent
of schools at Maquoketa
from 1918 until 1934 and
then was a salesman. He
was elected to the Iowa
House of Representatives
in 1940 and served two
terms.

He is survived by his wife,
the former Lenora K. Hart-
man of Marengo; two daugh-
ters, and three grandchildren.
His first wife, mother of the
daughters, died in 1940.

After serving in the Legis-
lature, Mr. Moyle became
public relations director of
the Iowa State Education As-
sociation. He retired from
that post in 1950.

Before moving to Ma-
quoketa, he had taught in
schools at Onslow, Anamosa
and LaPorte City.

Mr. Moyle, a member of
the Congregational Church,
died at St. Francis Hospital.
He had resided at the May-
flower Home since 1957.

Mr. O'Connor is a member and former president of the Dubuque Chamber of Commerce. He has given his influence and assistance in the promotion of worthy civic movements. He is a member of the Dubuque County, Iowa State and American Bar Associations and member of the Alumni Board of the State University.

He married November 24, 1904, Miss Mary Agnes McNevin. She was born at Cresco, Iowa, and for a number of years taught school in Minnesota. They were married at Indianapolis. The three sons of their marriage are: Gerald F., born September 4, 1905; Charles E. O'Connor, born March 30, 1908; and Francis John O'Connor, born March 29, 1916. Gerald graduated A.B. from the University of Iowa in 1928, and Charles E. graduated with the A.B. degree in the class of 1929 from the State University, and is now a law student there.

GEORGE McCLELLAND FOSTER, of Ottumwa, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. T. D. Foster, and reference is made on other pages to the prominent part his father had in the industrial life of Ottumwa.

The son was born at Ottumwa, May 16, 1887, completed his education at the University of Pennsylvania, and since leaving college has been identified with John Morrell & Co., of which he is secretary and assistant general manager. He married at Ottumwa, October 15, 1912, Miss Mary M. Slutz, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Slutz.

PETER H. VAN GORP, whose parents were among the original Dutch colonists of Pella during the 1840s, has lived in that community all his life, and for thirty years has been one of the chief instruments in building up Pella as a manufacturing center.

Mr. Van Gorp was born at Pella, in 1866, son of Henry and Jennie (Kempkes) Van Gorp. His parents came from Holland in 1847 and joined the colony on the lands selected by the committee in Marion County, Iowa. His father spent his life as a farmer. Peter H. Van Gorp had his growing-up on a farm, had few educational opportunities beyond the local schools, and his early youth and manhood were devoted to farming and dairying. After leaving the farm he was in the retail shoe business at Pella until 1898, when he became a manufacturer. Mr. Van Gorp for a number of years has been the active head of Pella's largest industrial organization, the Garden City Feeder Company, which he promoted and organized. This is today the largest independent feeder manufacturing plant in the world, making self feeders for threshing machines. They also manufacture grain weighers, and another department of the plant of more recent origin is devoted to the manufacture of the Woodrow washing machines. It is a prosperous, growing institution employing nearly 100 people, with a modern plant and with an office force of about twelve employes. There are eight buildings in the plant. Mr. Van Gorp in addition to being

general manager and treasurer of this company is president of the Garden City Feeder Company of Regina, Canada. His abilities are well known as a financier and organizer. For five years he was president of the Security State Bank of Pella and is now a member of its board and finance committees. He is president of the Pella Overall Factory and is member of the board of directors and the executive board of the Des Moines Life and Annuity Company.

Mr. Van Gorp married at Pella, in 1894, Miss Nellie Poss, who was born at Pella, and her parents were also members of the 1847 colony that settled in Pella. Mr. and Mrs. Van Gorp have two sons, both associated with their father in the Garden City Feeder Company. Harve married Nina Sadler, of Pella, and has two children, Virginia and Peter. Dick, the other son, married Miss Kate Johnson.

Mr. Van Gorp has served as a member of the City Council, and during the World war was local fuel administrator. He is a member of the Chamber of Commerce and he and his wife are active in the Baptist Church. Mr. Van Gorp's father in the early days hauled provisions for his family from Keokuk, 125 miles away. On first coming to Iowa the family lived in a dug-out, without a door, and many times at night when the wolves howled chairs and other furniture were piled at the door for protection.

BUDD S. MOYLE, superintendent of the city schools at Maquoketa, is a scholar and successful school administrator, and has accomplished some splendid results during the thirteen years he has been at Maquoketa.

He is a native of Iowa, born in Washington County, August 2, 1884, son of Joseph and Ida (North) Moyle. His father was a native of England and his mother of Ohio. Joseph Moyle on coming to America located in New York, and a short time afterward settled on a farm in Washington County, Iowa, where he lived until his death in 1888. His wife passed away in 1923. There were four children: Joseph Blaine, who died in 1924; William and Frank, both living at Canyon City, Colorado; and Budd S.

Budd S. Moyle made the best of his early advantages and earned his own way after graduating from the Lenox High School in 1902. In 1908 he was graduated from Tarkio College of Missouri, and received his Master of Arts degree at the University of Missouri in 1909. Since then he has taken post-graduate work in the University of Iowa, in the Iowa State Teachers College and the University of Chicago.

He has been in school work in Iowa since 1909, spending the first two years at Onslow, was principal of the high school at Anamosa, and for five years superintendent at LaPorte City. In 1917 he came to Maquoketa as superintendent of schools. He has worked steadily for increased standards and better facilities and in 1927 had the great satisfaction of seeing a junior college established. Maquoketa was one of the first among the county seat towns of Iowa to establish such

an institution of learning to supplement the work of the public schools.

Mr. Moyle is a Republican, a member of the Congregational Church, is a Royal Arch and Knight Templar Mason, member of the Knights of Pythias, and belongs to the Maquoketa Chamber of Commerce and is secretary of the Kiwanis Club.

He married, December 28, 1911, Miss Bessie Brown, daughter of William R. and Jennie (Bond) Brown. Her parents came to Iowa from Kansas. Her father was a salesman. Mr. and Mrs. Moyle have two children, Margaret Patricia, born in 1914, and Ruth Jennett, born in 1921. Mrs. Moyle is a woman of interesting literary accomplishments. For several years she has been a news correspondent and feature writer, writing for the daily newspapers of Eastern Iowa, and some of her feature stories have been used by publishers from coast to coast.

REV. VERNON L. SHONTZ. Among the many advantages that make Muscatine, Iowa, a pleasant place in which to have a home are its fine school facilities and its numerous church organizations, learning and religion permeating its business, civic and social life. The First Baptist Church of Muscatine, with a large and cultured congregation, is an example of church influence and is in a very prosperous condition under the pastorate of Rev. Vernon L. Shontz, whose sound church doctrine is very acceptable to his church members. Reverend Shontz is a man of broad mind, however, a man of learning and of unusual organizing ability, and perhaps, due to this gift, his field of active church service has been one of wider experience than often comes into the life of a clergyman in a similar space of time in regard to change of location and effective work done. He has long been considered one of the church's fine orators, and during the World War this talent was called into play on many occasions both in New York State and Canada.

Vernon L. Shontz was born at Kitchener, Canada, June 19, 1889, and is a son of J. E. and Elizabeth Shontz. His father, a highly esteemed citizen, was engaged for many years in the express business in Canada prior to his demise in 1907, and his mother still survives and makes her home in that country. Vernon L. Shontz received his early schooling at Kitchener, his native place, subsequently pursuing his collegiate and seminary courses in New York State. His first charge was the First Baptist Church of Chesley, Ontario, Canada, and in January, 1918, he accepted the call of the Sheridan Baptist Church, at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. In 1920 he became pastor of the Memorial Baptist Church at Williamsport, Pennsylvania, remaining there until 1925, when he was called to take charge of the First Baptist Church of Beckley, West Virginia, and in October, 1927, came to Muscatine as pastor of the First Baptist Church. Since his arrival he has done much to build up and enhance his pastorate in every way, and his congregation has shown a marked growth. He has

made numerous friends among men of all faiths and denominations and has cooperated with them in the furtherance of movements for the general welfare. He has likewise won the confidence and affection of his people, acting not only as their spiritual guide, but as a business advisor and personal friend. Reverend Shontz is a member of the Lions Club, the Thirty-three Club and the Geneva Golf and Country Club, and during the World War utilized his oratorical abilities as a four minute speaker. The beautiful church is located at 224 East Third Street, and Reverend Shontz occupies a pleasant home at 1009 Iowa Avenue.

On December 18, 1912, Reverend Shontz was united in marriage with Miss Bess Reitz, of Butler, Pennsylvania, a daughter of William D. and Mary (Reabuck) Reitz, Mr. Reitz being foreman at the Standard Steel Car Company's plant at Butler, where both parents still make their home, and where Mrs. Shontz received a grade and high school education. Reverend and Mrs. Shontz are the parents of two sons: Vernon L., Jr., born in 1917; and Robert R., born in 1919.

CHARLES M. DUTCHER has been engaged in the practice of law in Iowa City more than thirty years, and has made a record that places him among the leading members of the bar of Johnson County. He has been a resident of Iowa since his boyhood and his advancement has been won through his own ability and efforts. He has served as county attorney and also as a member of the State Senate and has a high reputation in the practice of his profession.

Mr. Dutcher is a descendent of a Holland Dutch family that was founded in the United States in the early part of the seventeenth century. He was born at Humboldt, Kansas, April 29, 1869, and is a son of Daniel N. and Adelaide (Beattie) Dutcher, the former of whom was born in the State of New York and the latter in Pennsylvania. Daniel N. Dutcher was young when he accompanied his parents to Iowa, in 1840, and the family became pioneer settlers in Clinton County, his parents having passed the remainder of their lives in this state. Daniel N. Dutcher served as a member of the One Hundred Twenty-sixth Iowa Volunteer Infantry during the Civil war and was made a sergeant of his company. He never lost interest in his old comrades in arms and in later years was actively affiliated with the Grand Army of the Republic. He was a farmer in Kansas, but followed the carpenter trade in Iowa. He was one of the honored pioneer citizens of this county, and died there in 1902, his widow surviving him by a decade, passing away in 1912. Of their three surviving children Charles M., of this review, is the eldest; Louis W. is a resident of Helena, Montana; and George B. resides in Iowa City.

Charles M. Dutcher gained his preliminary education by attending the pioneer schools of his native county and was nine years of age when he accompanied his parents from Kansas to Iowa County, Iowa, in 1878, the family home
