Henry Wichman Rites Saturday

Henry Wichman, 89, of Malcom, former state representative, died Wednesday evening at St. Francis Manor here where he had been a patient since Oct. 2.

The son of John D. and Anna Catherine Haase Wichman, he was born Dec. 30, 1882 at Victor. His family moved to the Malcom area in 1883. He attended Marcey country school and Malcom High School from which he was graduated in 1901. He attended the engineering school of the University of Iowa.

Mr. Wichman married Nell G. Wilcox, the daughter of Dr. V. S. Wilcox, Dec. 18, 1907, at Omaha, Neb. In 1908 he started farming on the Wilcox farm; he continued until April of 1966.

In 1932, President Herbert Hoover appointed Mr. Wichman to the P.A.C.C. Reg. Agriculture Credit Corp., which originally served two counties but later was increased to include nine counties.

Mr. Wichman was elected to the Iowa House of Representatives in 1939. He later served as secretary to the Iowa Executive Council during the period 1948-1950, under Governor Robert Blue.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church, a 50-year member of the Elks, and a 50-year member of Lilly Lodge No. 254, A.F. and A.M.
