Last Rites for W. J. Kilpatrick

William Joseph Kilpatrick, youngest son of Samuel H. and Elizabeth Kilpatrick, was born near Randolph, Ia., on Sept. 8, 1889 and departed this life at the Clarkson hospital in Omaha July 6, 1954.

He attended public school in Randolph and the Metropolitan Business college in Chicago, Ill.

Except for 16 months spent in the service of his country during World war I, he has spent his life farming north of Randolph.

He entered military service in September of 1917, as a member of the first draft from Fremont county. After a nine month training period at Camp Dodge, near Des Moines, he was transferred to Camp Taylor, Louisville, Ky., to enter officers candidate school. On Sept. 25, 1918 he was commissioned a second lieutenant of Field Artillery. He then served the remaining months with a training



He is survived by his wife, three sons and five grandchildren. The grandchildren are William J. 3rd, Timothy John and Kevyn Naomi, sons and daughter of William J. jr., Harry Paul and Mark Allen, sons of Paul. He is also survived by one brother, Francis Thomas Kilpatrick of Randolph and two nieces, Mrs. Marty Heathman, Indianola, Miss; and Mrs. Grace Kelly, La Honda, Calif. He was preceded in death by one brother, George Kilpatrick, and one sister, Mrs. Bertha Hall.

He was baptized in the Presbyterian church at Randolph and later joined the Randolph Methodist church. He was a trustee and has been a member of the official board of the church since joining. He was a member of Crown Lodge No. 439 A. F. & A. M., a member of the Des Moines Consistory and a member of the Randolph Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star. He was a Past Grand Sentinel of the Order of the Eastern Star in Iowa.

He was a member of the American Legion Post at Sidney, Ia., and served as president of the Fremont County War Dads during World war II. He served as a member of various civic boards throughout his life. He was Fremont county Representative to the Iowa House of Representatives for the 51st and 52nd general assemblies.
