Tunis H. Klein dies Sunday a.m. services Wed.

T. H. Klein, well-known Pella resident, died early Sunday morning in a Sioux Center Hospital at the age of 76 years. He had been visiting his son, Donald, and daughter, Bonnie, Mrs. John Smith at Rock Valley, Ia., when he took ill. He had been an active officer in the Security State Bank at Pella in earlier years; served as State Senator in the 51st and 52nd General Assembly from the 5th district representing Marion and Monroe counties; was mayor of Pella for a number of years and in private law practice in Pella until his active retirement just last year. Surviving are his wife, the former Jessie Forsyth, his son and daughter and 5 grandchildren. He leaves one sister, Mrs. Luella Van Dusseldorp of Pella and a sister, Gertrude, Mrs. Harry Autry of Tomah, Wis. Funeral services will be held Wednesday, February 24, 1965, at 2:00 p.m. at the Chapel of the Van Dyk-Duven Funeral Home. The Rev. Harmon Wierenga will officiate. Complete obituary will appear in a later issue of the Chronicle.

The movie was the first of an eagerly awaited series based on the repertoire of the Comedie Francaise, and gives a rare and absorbing insight into French theatre. The movie is not an adaptation for the screen, but rather a replica of the actual stage production.

Louis Seigner plays the nouveau-riche M. Jourdain, who, in his quest for gentility is exposed to the subjective whims of a series of mercenary instructors, a parade of human folly that gives a remarkably talented group of actors every chance to exploit the full rein of the author's brilliant satire.

"The Story of Monsieur Seguin's Goat" is an 18-minute short based on the story by Alphonse Daudet. It is a story of a goat who wished for freedom.

Albuquerque, New Mexico. He graduated from the Northwestern Classical Academy of Orange City, attended Hope College, Holland, Mich., and graduated from Grinnell College in January, 1900. He took graduate work at the University of Iowa and the University of Chicago. He was a teacher of Latin, English, French and German in Tecumseh, Nebr.; Parker and Watertown, S. D.; the Academy at Orange City and was Superintendent of schools in Scranton, Iowa, before purchasing the Orange City Herald in 1911. Later he was editor and publisher of newspapers in Hubbard, Armstrong, Kellogg, Kiron, Olin, Lawler and Wesley, Iowa. He retired in 1945 and moved to Iowa City, Iowa. He has lived with his daughter in Rockford, Ill., since 1947.

Mr. Hospers was preceded in death by his wife, Gertrude Huizenga in 1940.

He was a member of the American Reformed Church of Orange City.

Memorial services were held in Iowa City Monday with the Rev. Roelof Duiker, a nephew, of Eddyville, Iowa, officiating.

Funeral services for Mr. Tunis H. Klein, longtime Pella Attorney and 76 years of age at the time of his death, were conducted on Wednesday, February 24, 1965 at the chapel of the Van Dyk-Duven Funeral Home by the Rev. Harmon Wierenga, minister of the Second Reformed Church in Pella. Burial was made in the Oakwood Cemetery.

Tunis H. Klein, died Sunday, Feb. 21, 1965 at the age of 76 years at the Sioux Center Community Hospital. He was a lifelong resident of Pella, Iowa. A graduate of the University of Iowa and Drake University Law School in 1913 when he was admitted to the bar and practice of law in Iowa. He practiced law for more than 50 years in Pella, during which time he was a member of the Iowa State Bar Association and the Masonic Lodge. He was a member of the Second Reformed Church for many years.

He served as Iowa State Senator in the 51st and 52nd Sessions and as Mayor of Pella for 9 consecutive years commencing in 1949 and ending in 1958.

On December 3rd, 1913 he was united in marriage with Jessie M. Forsyth of Humboldt Ia. They had two children: Donald F. and Mrs. John H. (Bonnie) Smith, now both of Rock Valley, Iowa. Surviving beside his wife, Jessie, his son and daughter, are 5 grandchildren and two sisters: Mrs. James (Luella) Van Dusseldorp of Pella and Mrs. Harry N. (Gertrude) Awtry of Tomah, Wis. Tunis was born March 14, 1888 to Antonie T. Klein, and Jennie Akkerman Klein, one of 5 children. He is predeceased by his parents and two brothers, John and Roland J.

CONSERVATION

WINDBREAKS

Recent sleet and ice which covered the ground and vegetation created a period that made it extremely difficult for song and game birds to secure food. At such times we find many of these birds moving in closer to the trees and buildings of the farmstead to secure shelter and food where livestock might be feeding. Windbreak plants that include conifers are found excellent in protecting buildings and feed lots from the prevailing winter winds and indirectly also furnish cover for birds during storm periods.

Many people feel that conifers take too long to mature to a size where they will benefit during their life. However, this is not true, as has been shown by many plantings observed in the country during the span of 23 years that I have been traveling and down the roads. True, they take longer than some deciduous trees that are in many cases used, but the added
