School Interests To Ask \$100-Million A

The 1965 State Legislature will receive a joint proposal from Iowa's school-related organizations calling for \$100-million in aid to local school districts.

Blythe C. Conn, executive secretary of the Iowa Association of School Boards (IASB), outlined the plan to some 50 members of school boards at a three-county meeting here Monday night.

Conn is a member of a special committee which drew up the aid proposal and includes personnel from the Iowa State Education Association, the State Department of Public Instruc-

tion and similar education groups.

The joint proposal does not say where the increased money would come from, Conn admitted. While this brought a chuckle from scattered segments of the audience, Conn said finding a source for the money is the Legislature's job.

Monday night's meeting at Clinton High School was one of 18 such sessions being held throughout the state to acquaint local board members with proposals of the state association, and to discuss other common school problems.

The state aid proposal would demand nearly half of Iowa's current budget. Conn said it would send on the average some 10 to 15 mills in property tax relief back to the local school districts, by paying 40 per cent of operating costs.

Under the plan, an average per pupil cost of \$400 would be the basis for aid distribution. Districts with that exact per pupil cost would receive 40 per cent in state aid or \$160 per pupil.

The plan also includes an equalization provision that would shift higher aid benefits to poorer school districts, and

less aid to wealthy school districts. Conn said this could be figured on either property values or on taxable incomes.

Conn said the proposal includes, if property is used as the basis of wealth in a district, a system of market evaluation. This supposedly would eliminate the present differences in valuation methods used across the state.

"Everybody has been scared to say it," Conn said in speaking of substantial increases in state aid to schools. "Now Gov. (Harold) Hughes hints at a bigger state school assistance program. This type

of leadership should have come long ago."

Conn said the next general session of the Legislature will also have to draw up regulations and guidelines for the State Department of Public Instruction. Under a recent Supreme Court ruling, the Department is powerless to set standards to local districts.

The executive secretary said he was not in favor of asking the special session of the Legislature for state aid from surplus funds. Officials have estimated the state surplus for the biennium at \$26 million.

Leo McEleney Dies in West

Leo P. McEleney, 69, co-founder of McEleney Motors and a state representative from Clinton county for four terms, died this morning in Brentwood, Calif., where he had resided for the last 11 years.

Funeral arrangements are pending. Services will be held in Clinton later this week.

He was born June 1, 1895 in Clinton and with his brother, Emmett, established Clinton's first garage and automobile dealership on Main Ave. in 1914.

Mr. McEleney took an active part in a wide range of civic affairs while a resident in Clinton. He was a past president and director of the Clinton Chamber of Commerce, the Lyons club and the American Legion Building Co. He served two terms as a member of the Clinton Airport Commission.

As a member of the Clinton chamber's industrial development company he worked closely with the DuPont company in the selection of Clinton as the site for a cellophane plant.

He made his first appearance in the political arena in 1944 when he won the primary nomination for state representative in a field of eight candidates. He was elected that same year and served four consecutive terms in the House.

During his tenure as a representative he served on all the major committees.

He was a veteran of World War I and a member of numerous civic and fraternal organizations in Clinton.

Surviving are his widow in Brentwood; three sons, Warren J. McEleney and James E. McEleney of Clinton and Dr. Donald McEleney of Cedar Rapids; and nine grandchildren.
