Funeral Services For Alden Doud This Afternoon

Alden L. Doud, 63, former state senator, member of a pioneer Van Buren county family and a widely known attorney, passed away early Monday morning at the University hospital in Iowa City.

He had suffered a critical heart ailment at his office Tuesday, Aug. 22 and rushed to Iowa City where he failed to respond to emergency treatment.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. (CST) Thursday at the Pedrick Funeral Home in Douds.

Senator Doud has been prominent in the Republican party in Iowa for a number of years. He was first elected to the Iowa House in 1942, and in 1944 was elected to the state senate, and re-elected in 1948. He was a candidate for Lt. Governor in 1952.

While in the legislature he served on the second school code committee, special committee to study mental health, and the committee on retrenchment and reform, all committees which served between sessions of the legislature.

Harmony Largest With Total Of 720

Shows Increase Of 20 Over 1960 First Day

First day registration in the five high school districts of Van Buren county indicated a jump in total sign-up for the first day over last fall.

The total in these five districts Monday was 2249, an increase of 20 over the 1960 figure at this time.

Harmony again had the highest figure with 720. Of this, 223 registered at the high school in Farmington, 163 in the grades. At Bonaparte attendance center, 103 signed in for junior high and 139, kindergarten through sixth. Seventeen were registered for a special class. Hillsboro totaled 70, kindergarten through sixth.

Van Buren Community district grand total was 707, with the Keosauqua center showing 215 in high school, 124 in junior high and 222 kindergarten through sixth. The Douds center totaled 58 in junior high and 88 kindergarten through sixth.

Fox Valley registered a total of 362, with 106 at the Milton high school center and 138 kindergarten through sixth. Cantril showed a Monday total of 81 for sixth, seventh and eighth grades and 37 in kindergarten, second and fourth grades.

Stockport Independent totaled 217, with 81 in high school, 45 in junior high and 91 kindergarten through sixth.

Birmingham registered 243, with 74 in the high school and 169 in the grades.

He is a native of Douds, which was named after his family. He was the son of A. Lincoln and Cynthia Alice Doud. He graduated from the Keosauqua high school, Iowa Wesleyan college, the University of Chicago and the State University of Iowa. He was admitted to the bar the year he received his law degree at the University of Iowa in 1924. He had practiced law in Douds since that time.

He was the national secretary for the Delta Theta Phi, a law fraternity, with national headquarters located in his law office at Douds. Doud was a member of the Republican state committee from 1942 to 1950, and attended several GOP national conventions.

He is also a member of the BPO Elks, a 32nd Degree Mason, a member of the Shrine. Before starting his advanced education, he taught school in Van Buren County for a few years.

In addition to his wife, May, he is also survived by one son, who is with the Judge Advocate General's Department of the Army in Washington, D. C., and two sisters.

Doud first became ill at his office in Douds. He was taken to the Ottumwa hospital by ambulance where his ailment was diagnosed as aortic aneurysm. He was then rushed to the University hospital at Iowa City where he underwent emergency surgery.

He remained in critical condition and passed away early Monday morning.
