## Howard Buck

Funeral services will be held today (Wednesday) at 10:30 a.m. for Howard Buck, 85, of State Center, prominent farmer and Iowa legislator. Mr. Buck died at State Center Manor Sunday afternoon.

The Reverend Richard Fitch will officiate at the First United Methodist Church in State Center. Burial will follow in Hillside Cemetery.

A memorial fund has been established. The Wensel-Perrin Funeral Home in State Center is in charge of arrangements.

Born October 10, 1899, in Marshall County; he was the son of E. W. and Lena Miller Buck. He was graduated from the State Center schools in 1916. On March 12, 1920, in LaMoille, he was married to Erma Newton; she preceded him in death in May, 1979.

Mr. Buck had been engaged in farming since 1920 in the Melbourne area, and was also in the grain and feed business during that time. He served four terms in the Iowa House of Representatives,

representing Marshall County, and two terms in the State Senate, retiring from the legislature in 1964.

Mr. Buck was a member of the First United Methodist Church in State Center, the Melbourne Masonic Lodge, Farm Bureau, State Center Community Club, Marshalltown Noon Kiwanis, Marshalltown Senior Citizens, State Center Rose Society, and had been active in the Marshall County cribbage tournaments.

Survivors include three daughters and a son: Wilma (Mrs. Gene) Baker, State Center; Dorothy (Mrs. Ted) Campbell, Cedar Rapids; Marilyn (Mrs. Clifford) Nobriga, Kailua, Hawaii, and Wayne Buck, Melbourne. Also surviving are a sister, Pauline Buck of State Center, 13 grandchildren, and 19 great grandchildren.

Preceding him in death, in addition to his wife, were three sisters and two brothers.

Services will be at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday at the First United Methodist Church in State Center with the Rev. Fitch officiating. Burial will be in Hillside Cemetery.
