Morse E. Crosier, 86, of 112 N. Third St., Coggon, died Saturday morning in St. Luke's Hospital, Cedar Rapids, following a lingering illness.

He was born Sept. 9, 1901, in Manchester, and married Carol LaRue Coulter, Sept. 10, 1924, in Iowa City. She died in 1979. He married Rose M. Jordan July 1, 1981, in Cedar Rapids. Mr. Crosier owned and operated the Coggon Monitor from 1922 until 1972. He was elected to the State Legislature in 1948, serving two terms. In 1952 he organized the Safety Patrol of Iowa and was commander until 1974. Mr. Crosier was a member of Zion Presbyterian Church, Coggon; Marion Chapter 10 R.A.M.; Cedar Rapids Consistory; El Kahir Shrine Foot Patrol; 50-year member of Mecca Lodge 523 AF & AM; and past master of Patmos Commandery of Marion.

Surviving are his wife; a stepson, Richard Jordan of Swisher; a stepdaughter, Elaine Fulton of Cedar Rapids; seven stepgrandchildren; and seven stepgreat-grandchildren.
