Sen. Humbert died Tuesday morning at the Iowa Lutheran hospital in Des Moines of a liver ailment.

A lifelong resident of Corning, Humbert was widely known as a breeder and importer of Percheron horses.

He was elected to the Iowa house of representatives in 1946, and to a four-year senate term in 1948 from the district including Adams and Taylor counties.

Under a rotation plan observed by the two counties, he did not seek reelection this year, but ran again for his old house seat. He was defeated in the June primary by Oliver Turner of Corning.

Mr. Humbert had been ill for several weeks. He was taken to the Des Moines hospital about a week ago.


Haying is in full swing with showers interfering with curing and necessitates close contact with the weather man.

Silage can be put in soon after cutting which eliminates the loss of nutrients due to rain. More farmers are turning to silage due to this season.

Samples of wheat were collected from fields throughout the county for a Hessian-Fly survey being taken.

Wheat is turning very rapidly and will soon be ready for harvest. A large yield is expected.

Oats are also turning, but some fields are still fairly green. Heads are filled out well in most cases.
