Fred Voightmann Dies at Age 80; Services Sunday

MARENGO — Services will be held at 1:30 Sunday in St. John's Lutheran church in Marengo for Fred Voightmann, 80, who died Thursday morning at the Marengo Memorial hospital after a 10-month illness.

He was born Jan. 21, 1889, in St. James, Minn. He was married to Louise Steinkraus on Sept. 12, 1908, in North Prairie, Wis. He has been a resident of Marengo since 1943.

From 1921 to 1943, he was a parochial school teacher and an organist at St. John's Lutheran school in Lincoln township, Victor. Prior to this he taught in Louisville, Neb., and at the Emmanuel Lutheran church school in Milwaukee.

He was an active member of St. John's Lutheran church in

Marengo. He was overseer of the poor in Marengo and also co-chairman of the county Red Cross chapter for many years. He was state representative from Iowa county for three terms in the 1950s, chairman of the polio foundation of Iowa county for 25 years, secretary of the Marengo Chamber of Commerce and an honorary member of the Iowa Sheriff's Assn.

He enjoyed woodworking and was widely-known in the area for his wooden crosses.

He is survived by his wife; five sons, the Rev. Fred of Jackson, Tenn., Norman of Clearwater, Fla., Orris of Marengo, LeRoy of Tucson, Ariz., and Paul of Tucson; two daughters, Mrs. Clark Hinrichs of Guernsey and Mrs. Frank Koehn of Victor; two brothers, Charles of New Brownsfels, Texas, and Robert of Tucson; four sisters, Mrs. Augusta Moeller of Tacoma, Wash., Mrs. William Glawe of Mokena, Ill., Mrs. Everett Gibbs of Ashville, N. C., and Mrs. Andruss of Kenilworth, Ill.; 24 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.


