Local businessman, Ted Clark, dies

Ted D. Clark, 59, a resident of Mystic, died at his home Friday, May 3, 1980. He had been a long-time businessman in Appanoose County, operating the Ted Clark Thermogas Company for many years.

Born June 12, 1926, in Detroit, Mich., he was the son of Doyle W. and Edna McGrann Clark. He was married to Gracie Mae Frost in Unionville, Mo., March 22, 1937, and she survives.

Mr. Clark and his family operated the Ted Clark Thermogas Company in Centerville for many years. He was a member of the Mystic Methodist Church, Masonic Lodge, White Shrine, York and Scottish Rites and was a Shriner. He was also a member of the Centerville Elks Lodge and the Mystic Booster Club.
