Services for Earl T. Hoover, 85, of Friendship Haven, formerly a resident of Mount Ayr, will be at 9:30 a.m. Saturday in the Chapel on the Hill with Dr. Clarence Tompkins, executive director, and the Rev. Willis McLaughlin, chaplain of Friendship Haven, officiating. Interment services will be at 2:30 p.m. in Rose Hill Cemetery, Mount Ayr. Friends may call at Bruce's Funeral Home until 8:30 a.m. Saturday.

Mr. Hoover died Thursday morning at the Health Center where he had been a patient for the past two years.

Surviving are the widow, Elizabeth; six grandchildren; three great grandchildren, a brother, S. W. Hoover, Redding, and a sister, Mrs. Warren Statler, Keota.

Mr. Hoover, father of the late Dr. E. E. Hoover, prominent Fort Dodge orthodontist, was born near Redding in Ringgold County and was reared in that community. He attended Drake University and for many years was associated as a banker with the Citizens Savings Bank, Mount Ayr. In 1907 he married Elizabeth Donahoe in Des Moines. He served as Ringgold County treasurer for 20 years, then as state representative in the Iowa legislature for three terms. He retired in 1958. Mr. and Mrs. Hoover came to Friendship Haven five years ago.

Mr. Hoover was a member of the Mount Ayr Christian Church, and the Masonic Lodge and Order of Eastern Star, both of Mount Ayr.

### EARL T. HOOVER

Earl T. Hoover was born July  
23, 1883, near Redding in Ring-  
gold county and departed this  
life July 17, 1969, in Friendship  
Haven in Fort Dodge at the age  
of 85 years.

Mr. Hoover was reared in the  
Redding community; attended  
Drake University in Des Moines  
and for many years was associ-  
ated with the Citizens Savings  
Bank in Mount Ayr. He served  
as Ringgold county treasurer  
for 20 years and three terms as  
state representative in the Iowa  
Legislature prior to his retire-  
ment in 1958.

In 1907, he was united in mar-  
riage with Nellie Donahoe in  
Des Moines, and they were the  
parents of one son, Dr. Elton  
E. Hoover, a prominent Fort  
Dodge orthodontist, who preced-  
ed them in death.

He was a member of the First  
Christian Church of Mount Ayr;  
Faith Lodge No. 179, A.F. &  
A.M. and Mount Ayr Chapter  
No. 356, Order of the Eastern  
Star.

Mr. and Mrs. Hoover had re-  
sided in Friendship Haven for  
the last five years.

He is survived by his widow,  
Nellie; a daughter-in-law, Mar-  
tha, of Fort Dodge; six grand-  
children; three great-grandchil-  
dren; a brother, Stuart W. Hoo-  
ver of Redding, and a sister,  
Mrs. H. Warren Statler of Ke-  
ota.

Funeral services were held  
Saturday morning from the  
Chapel on the Hill, with Dr.  
Clarence Tompkins, executive  
director, and the Rev. Willis  
McLaughlin, chaplain of Friend-  
ship Haven, officiating. Music
