G.M. Ludwig, 63, Dies; Funeral To Be Tuesday

G. M. Ludwig, 63, a former Johnson county representative in the Iowa legislature, died at 8 p.m. Friday at Mercy hospital. Death was attributed to a ruptured aorta sustained earlier in the day as he was attempting to free his car from heavy snow.

Mr. Ludwig was elected to the state legislature as a Republican in 1950 and re-elected in 1952.

He earlier had been superintendent of schools at Sharon for five years, Oxford for one year and Tiffin for 16 years. He went to Tiffin in 1930.

He made his home at Ludwigheim, his farm near Tiffin.

BORN IN Lancaster county, Pa., October 11, 1896, he was a son of George S. and Anne Renniger Ludwig. He was reared in Lancaster county.

Mr. Ludwig attended Mt. Union college, Ohio, Westmar college, LeMars, Iowa, from which he received his bachelor's degree, Western Reserve university, from which he received a master's degree, and Ohio State university. He also took additional graduate work at the University of Iowa in 1928 and in 1958-59.

He was ordained a minister of the Evangelical United Brethren church at Columbus, Ohio, in 1915.

FOR EIGHT years while Tiffin school superintendent, he wrote a farm column for the Press-Citizen and for the past 11 years, Mr. Ludwig has been a farm commentator for radio station KXIC.

Mr. Ludwig was married to the former Alice G. Heim June 22, 1923, at Dawson, Nebr.

He was a member of the Sharon E.U.B. church and the Iowa City Lions club.

SURVIVORS include his widow, two sons, George H. and Robert L., both of Iowa City, and three daughters, Miss Phyllis J. Ludwig, Redbird mission, Beverly, Ky., Mrs. Genevieve Merck, of Deep River, and Mrs. Nona L. Walker, of Iowa City. Also surviving are 10 grandchildren and four sisters.

He was preceded in death by one son, Dean, August 16, 1951.

Funeral services will be at 3 p.m. Tuesday at the Tiffin Methodist church with the Rev. William Tomlinson officiating and the Rev. Howard Marty, of the Sharon E.U.B. church, assisting. Burial will be in the Tiffin cemetery. Beckman's is in charge of arrangements.

Fight Fire in Bitter Cold

Iowa City firemen worked for about two hours in bitter cold Friday night to extinguish a fire in a small structure at the rear of the H. M. Black residence, 422 Brown street.

The department was called about 5:30 p.m. and finished the difficult job about 7:30 p.m. Considerable damage was done to the interior of the tri-level cabin and contents as the fire smoldered in the ceiling insulation.

Firemen said the blaze apparently started around the chimney of a wood-fired heating stove. The cabin sits at the brink of a deep ravine.

Mr. Brown said he built the structure out of six by six-inch oak timbers from a razed barn. He said his 16-year-old son used the house as a den and had clothes and other personal items in it. There was no one in the house when the fire started, he said.

At 11 a.m. today it was 14 degrees. Friday's high was 28 degrees.

Highway conditions locally and in the state were expected to improve rapidly today as the bright sun afforded the salt-sand mixture a chance to thaw the ice and snow cover that made driving hazardous. There were still many patches of ice on the roads as of noon today but crews were out again with sanding trucks.

Cold Spell Covers All Of Midwest

 A midwinter - sized cold spell knifed deeper into the midwest and plains today after easing its hold on the storm-battered northern Rockies.

Cold wave warnings were issued for Tennessee, Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio and lower Michigan.

The snowstorm, which buried sections of Montana in two feet of snow, diminished somewhat as it moved east and southward. But up to 15 inches covered upper Michigan and seven inches blanketed western Illinois.

THE MERCURY tumbled to 22 below zero at Valentine, in north central Nebraska, breaking a record of 18 below set in 1891. Le Mars, in northwestern Iowa, had 24 below, and it was 19 below at Rapid City, S.D. Subzero readings were general from Montana into Minnesota and Iowa and throughout the northern half of the plains.

The stormy weather and unseasonable cold have been blamed for at least 21 deaths, including eight in Montana, seven in Illinois, five in Iowa and one in Kansas. Driving conditions were reportedly extremely hazardous in many parts of the country hit by snow and freezing rain.
